As of today, 580 school districts have adopted the Resolution Concerning High Stakes, Standardized Testing of Public School Students. They represent 57 percent of Texas school districts and those districts serve 3.5 million students – 70 percent of all Texas schoolchildren.

Together, these districts have captured the attention of lawmakers, business leaders, parents and the news media, not just in Texas, but also around the nation. Similar objections to overemphasis on testing have been raised in states across the country and a national dialogue is underway.

But it's not enough. If change is our goal, we need all districts to stand united in this effort. We're setting a goal of 80 percent passage by the first day of the 2012-13 school year. That means we need at least 237 more districts to adopt the resolution in August – and your district is one of them.

Let's kick off this school year by sending a message to Austin that educators want what's best for students and the over-reliance on standardized testing is crippling our ability to provide that. Let them know that superintendents and school trustees are advocating for children and for a system that is student-centered and fosters creativity, innovation, problem-solving skills, collaboration and critical thinking.
