

ATTENDANCE MATTERS (Parent)

For the month of October our current enrollment was: Pre-K 54, Kindergarten 139, and First Grade 167 students. Student attendance on our campus for Pre-K was 93.29%, Kindergarten was 83.69%, and for First Grade 87.84% with an average of 86.12%. Students at KW/Vina are getting closer to reaching the Superintendent's goal of 90% attendance! In October we had 12 pre-k students (21% of total) have perfect attendance! 26 kindergarten students (19% of total) had perfect attendance! 29 of the 1st graders (17% of total) had perfect attendance!

In the First Grade there are 55 students whose attendance is being monitored because they had 40 or more days absent in Kindergarten last year (2016-2017). You may have noticed that there were originally 58 students; some of them have transferred schools or were retained. Of the 55 students from the kindergarten class last year:

16 are in Tier 1: 3 days or less absent (blue)
10 are in Tier 2: Possibly two absences/combined with several tardies (red)

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

Data from Infinite Campus is being used to monitor the attendance for the focus group from kindergarten attendance last year. My reports are ran weekly to monitor daily attendance, along with consecutive days missed, average daily attendance reports, and teacher referrals. I've noticed a pattern; on Fridays student attendance decreases. (The daily attendance will be shared with the board at our campus board meeting at the end of the month.)

The daily attendance data is displayed on a bulletin board under, "Attendance Matters" in the buildings so parents have a visual, monthly calendars are also in the parent centers that show the daily attendance rates (which will be updated monthly), and the data was also presented to the School Leadership Team.

During my home visits (18 for October), I also share a letter from Attendance Matters with families about the importance of being in school. I share student attendance records and grade level word lists that the students are learning to express the urgency of having their children attend school regularly.

In October I did one court referral and they have been attending more frequently. With our two campus events we have had great family participation; Family Fun Friday brought in 135 parents/guardians and our Halloween Activities 122 parents/guardians. THANK YOU PARENTS!






The above Grade Level Distribution Reports show the number of students performing in ranges

ability. Comparing the two graphs shows; students are moving up tiers and that the "actual distribution" is getting closer to the "expected distribution". Students are progressing. Teachers use their Class Distribution report as one data point in determining their Intervention groups. Intervention groups consist of 6 students who are are "on the bubble" of moving up a Tier. These students receive both the core reading instruction as well as a 30-minute targeted intervention, using our new ELA curriculum's intervention component, WonderWorks, which focuses on the foundational skills of reading.

The graph below shows the Tier movement of our first group of 53 Intervention students who started intervention September 18 and ended November 2. Teachers recently analyzed their data and determined who will exit intervention and who will continue to receive the intervention for 2nd quarter.

53 Kindergarten students are receiving intervention.

Students who are not receiving intervention instruction are pulled out by our specialists during their classes' intervention block. They receive 10 minutes of phonemic awareness instruction and 15 minutes of activities related to the specialist's content area (Music, NAS, PE).









First Grade ISIP Reading Data (Submitted by: Sandi Campbell)


1st Grade - November 2017

All Grades - Overall Reading






Looking at the distribution report we have 32 Tier 2 students who can roll over into the Tier 1 and 21 Tier 3 students who can move to Tier 2.

The Immersion students will also be doing a short phrase on their grandpa. Amao'ka naaahsa aanistawa GeorgeAanistawa Tsaots Omahkinaa aipaisskaawa ainihkiwa aawaatsimoi'kaawa Iikaahsitapiiwa nitsiikakomimmawa. Kii anoh ksisstsiko amoahksi pookaiksi aitsinski.
