

AMS History, Vision, and Impact

The AMS Story



In 2002, Ms. Tatyana Chayka founded the first Academy of Math and Science with a vision of creating a school for her son that offered education in Math and Science while incorporating well-rounded programs and electives at no additional cost to parents.

AMS started its first year with 30 students total. As the school year progressed, Ms. Chayka was concerned that the school wouldn't financially survive the end of the first year. Determined not to cut important aspects of a well-rounded student experience, Ms. Chayka forged ahead.

Serendipitously, Ms. Chayka received a visit from Cathy Lund from the Walton Family Foundation. Impressed with what the school offered, Ms. Lund urged Ms. Chayka to continue building her vision. With the contribution from the WFF, AMS was able to complete the year successfully.









AMS Little Rock Model




AMS Little Rock

- Purchase agreement in place for former David O. Dodd elementary school for sale by Little Rock School District.
- Site improvements to include brand new indoor sport field and performance stage along with 7 classrooms, full length outdoor soccer field, and new play facility for K-3.
- Break even student enrollment for this campus would be approximately 300 students.
- Building to be owned by non-profit support organization and funded through public bond issuance with no obligation of school or state in the event of charter non-renewal.
