



Shape MT Site Visit

For the past two years BES has had the Shape Mt grant. Under the grant, BES agrees to: Collect data regarding the outcomes of the pilot, including pre and post data in Math and ELA, and provide 150 minutes of Physical Education per week. BES Shape Mt grant teachers will attend summer SHAPE Montana Conference. SHAPE Montana agrees to: Provide training, technical assistance, and all necessary materials for the pilot school to implement the 150 Initiative. This will consist of monthly contact with the pilot school and at least one inperson site visit between the SHAPE Montana liaison and Pilot teachers in each pilot school during the school year. SHAPE Montana agrees to pay pilot school up to \$500 for performance of the services described above. We had our site visit Feb 18, and Ms. Jeckell and Mrs. McClellan both showed us their class's spelling aerobic routines. Ms. Jeckell's class showed us their dice multiplication relay. Also observed was our class recesses. Reg Hagman, Shape Mt consultant, was impressed with the amount of physical activity our students are receiving during the day and week.

What's New and Exciting at BES Library?

Real Library Cards:

New this year, we have implemented "real" library cards for each student. The library cards not only help the library staff keep book check out easy, they also help the students with their testing, and make help them to responsible for their own reading and learning. Each card has the students' school ID which also serves as their password for most of our testing sights including Accelerated Reader. The Barcode help the library staff and students check out their books with ease so that they can get to reading their new books more quickly. The colored dots, help students pick out a "just right book." After taking the STAR Reading Test, students are given a Reading Range based on their STAR Reading Scores. The Reading Range assists students in finding a book that is not too easy, not too hard and is Just Right for them to read. Most books in the library are also labeled with an AR sticker that corresponds to the Reading Range Color. Blue-1st grade, Red-2nd grade, Green-3rd, Brown-4th, Yellow 5th. Orange-6th and Purple-7th.



Punch Cards:

The Philosophy in our library is that students should not be punished for lost books. There are a lot of different reasons students lose books and most are outside of their control. Additionally, we believe that if a student doesn't return a book and it stays in their home, we are actually providing books to homes, and maybe just maybe, someone else will pick up that book and read it.

Yes, they need to learn responsibility and it would be great if all library books were returned. However, we know that is not always possible. We also do not encourage students to pay library fines with money. Instead students are asked to "read off" their fines. The students come into the library during their lunch recess and read. For every time they come in, they get their ticket punched. When they have as many punches as dollars owed, the fine is deleted and students can resume book check out. We are also allowing students to "read off" recorders for music class as well. If students are unable to pay the \$8 for their required music recorder, they join us in the library and pay off the recorder the same way book fines are paid off!



Little Free Libraries:

With the help of our friends from Reading Nation, awesome donors and a little bit of work; we now how 3 Little Free Libraries up and running in the district. One near the entry way of KW Bergan, one in the entry way of BES and another at the annex to serve the young mothers and Child Care students. The idea behind a LFL is that students and parents can take a book from the LFL and read it. If they bring them back, great. If they choose to keep them, then that's ok too. The whole idea behind the LFLs is to saturate the homes in our community with books for readers of all ages!
