MAP TESTING THIS WEEK!

This week, starting January 14th, all students will participate in taking the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) Assessment. MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) is a computerized adaptive assessment that measures your child's knowledge of reading and math. All students are asked the same number of questions, but the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answers all the previous questions. As the student answers correctly, questions become more difficult. If the student answers incorrectly, the questions become easier and then become progressively more challenging. This enables the assessment to precisely identify the full spectrum of a student's strengths and weaknesses. MAP tests are aligned to the national Common Core Standards.

MAP assessments are used to measure student progress and growth in reading and math. These assessments will help teachers understand your child's areas of strength and areas for growth and provide appropriate instruction.

MAP TESTING TIPS FOR SUCCESS

As we approach the week of MAP testing, we want to share some important tips to help ensure our students perform their best:

- 1. **Rest Well:** Ensure your child gets plenty of sleep each night leading up to the tests. A well-rested mind is more alert and focused.
- 2. **Healthy Breakfast:** A nutritious breakfast is key to providing the energy needed for a successful testing day. Encourage your child to eat a balanced meal. Students will be provided a snack at school prior to taking the MAP assessment.
- 3. **Stay Hydrated:** Remind your child to drink plenty of water and stay hydrated, as this can help with concentration.
- 4. **Positive Mindset:** Encourage your child to approach the tests with a positive attitude. Remind them that their best effort is what truly matters.
- 5. **Arrive on Time:** Ensure your child arrives at school on time to avoid any last-minute stress. Thank you for your support in helping your child prepare for testing. Together, we can make this a successful week!

MONTHLY TEAM UPDATES

Here is a space where Turner staff will offer families a glimpse into classroom activities, special projects, and important milestones, fostering collaboration and communication between home and school. This dedicated space allows parents to stay informed about their child's learning environment and the exciting developments taking place throughout the school.



K/1- Mrs. Goolish

Literacy: Students are working on answering WH- questions along with learning about authors and illustrators. We continue to work on identifying letters, sounds, and the formation of the letters. We then take the sounds to help blend and read words.

Math: Students are showing 1:1 correspondence for numbers up to 20. They are also working with simple addition and subtraction problems. We continue to work on identifying coins and parts of a clock.

Functional: With cold and flu season we are working on using a Kleenex and washing hands. We are also working on personal space and walking in a line.



Kindergarten

Kindergarten students have been working in their Zoology Science unit, learning all about different animal groups. In math, kindergarten students have been identifying numbers 0 to 10 and have started to look at teen numbers. We have also worked in our geometry unit, learning different 2D and 3D shapes. Students should be about to count to 40 or above by now. Students are continuing to write new CVC words (for example: cat, pig, web, sun, hot). Students are working on writing a simple sentence with new "heart words" (sight words) and CVC words.



1st Grade

When we return from break, First Grade students will finish their study of animals. They will also complete their study of needs and wants. All will continue working on learning long vowel sounds in English. Students working in Spanish will continue working with open and closed-syllable words and consonant blends. All first-grade students will work focused on reading fluency.

In Math, first graders will begin their third math module focused on ordering and comparing length measurements as numbers and will have it completed by the end of the month.



2nd Grade

In literacy, we finished our unit on Greek myths. The students wrote their own myths about winter animals. Our next unit is the War of 1812. We will learn about U.S. history and how we gained our independence and maintained it.

In math, we are continuing to learn how to add and subtract 3-digit numbers with regrouping. This is an important skill that students need to master in second grade. Please practice with your child at home.

Please remember to have your child read each night for 20 minutes. Students in second grade should begin to read short chapter books.



3rd Grade

Literacy

Third graders recently wrapped up their Amplify unit on Ancient Rome. They were able to read about the rise and fall of the Roman Empire and produce their own writing on Rome's greatest contributions to the world. We are looking forward to a unit on light and sound.

Math

Students finished a unit where they studied the different properties of multiplication, using these properties to solve several types of problems. After break, we are beginning a new unit where students will study area and perimeter.

Social Studies

Students studied leaders in their community, developing an understanding of how they can inspire and create change in their own community.



4th Grade

4th Grade Literacy

Students finished their ARC animal research lab and web page project! Coming soon! American Historical Fiction genre lab. Please read with your student each evening. Discuss the text together.

4th Grade Math

Students continue to work on Module 3. Coming soon! Module 4: angle measure and plane figures. Please send your student to school with a protractor. This math tool is required for Module 4. 4th Grade Social Studies / Science

Students will soon transition from science to social studies. Students will learn about the establishment and development of Illinois.



5th Grade

5th graders have started investigating ecosystems diving deeper into the research process and developing their informational writing skills.

In math, students are beginning Module 3 which covers fractions, in particular with addition and subtraction with mixed numbers with like and unlike denominators. Furthermore, students are beginning to develop oracy and presentational skills through modeling problems for their peers and explaining step-by-step how they got their solutions.

In social studies, students are learning about the causes of political revolutions and analyzing the American Revolution, in particular.

Finally, it is crucial that over break, students take time to relax and enjoy time with family and friends. Likewise, we hope that they also take some time over break to refine their foundational skills in math and literacy. We have our winter MAP testing soon after the break, and as we continue our data discussions, we want to ensure that they are continuing to make the gains necessary to excel.



Art

Kinder- Created snowy polar bears using paint, chalk pastels, and oil pastels.

1st Grade- Created pine tree collages using oil pastels, tempera cakes, and construction paper.

2nd Grade - Created Northern Light collages using chalk pastel, tempera paint, and magazines.

3-5th Grade- created a collaborative art piece that will be displayed on a large bulletin board in the 3-5th grade hallway. The artwork will be a "Gingerbread house Village".



SEL/Health

All grade levels completed their units on health, hygiene, and/or body systems. **K, 1st, 2nd, & 4th grades** have all started new SEL units about emotions, while **3rd & 5th grades** have begun an 8 week unit on life skills training.

Kindergarten students are learning to recognize and name emotions, as well as learn ways to demonstrate self-control and coping strategies.

1st graders are learning how our emotions should only take over our thinking when we are in dangerous situations (i.e. We see a coyote in our yard and run into our home right away to be safe.) and any other time, we need to use the thinking part and emotional part of our brain together to make good decisions.

2nd graders are learning strategies to recognize and regulate their emotions in different settings/situations.

4th graders are learning how to verbally express emotions appropriately in various life situations.

3rd & 5th graders were introduced to West Chicago Police Officer O'Neill, who is team-teaching with Mrs. Castro for 8 weeks. The students just began with a lesson on self-esteem.



Music

Kinder students are exploring different classroom percussion instruments. We are learning to play different instruments and using body percussion to perform and show a steady beat to songs of different tempos (speed level). We had fun showing a steady beat and playing bells and wood blocks to the song Sleigh Ride and showing the form (pattern) of the song in body movement.

1st grade students have been introduced to eighth-note rhythm patterns. We have been exploring playing classroom percussion instruments to a song called Ta Ti-ti Tango. We have been identifying one or two sounds in different fruit rhythm words like apple (2) and grapes (1).

2nd Grade students have been learning about the story and music from Tchaikovsky's The Nutcracker. We have explored musical elements like high/low sounds, tempo (fast/slow), and dynamics (loud/soft).

3rd Grade students are starting to learn about the time signature 3/4. These songs have a waltz feel and we will learn how to make rhythm patterns of 3. We recently have been having fun learning a partner clapping game to the rhythm chant Alligator Pie.

4th Grade has been reviewing different melodic solfege notes of Do-Re-Mi-Sol and La. We read about the creation of the music staff and have been playing instruments and singing to different solfege patterns. We also have been exploring different classroom percussion instruments and rhythm patterns!

5th Grade has been reviewing melodic patterns of Solfege like Do-Re-Mi-Fa-Sol-La-Ti-Do'. We read about the creation of the music staff and have been playing instruments and singing to different solfege patterns. This last week before break, 5th-grade students went caroling around the school to different classrooms.



Physical Education

(Grades K-2) Students have been playing holiday-themed games (Home Alone Tag, Snowman Tag, Snowman Bowling, Fetch the Presents, The Grinch) that include a variety of dodging & fleeing, throwing, rolling, and teamwork.

Library

Way to go Turner! We have checked out a total of 3,900 books so far this year!

Kindergarten has been reading classic and contemporary picture books about bears such as *Brown Bear, Brown Bear What Do You See., Corduroy,* and *Mother Bruce.*

First Grade finished up our author study on Julia Donaldson. We had a great time learning about rhyming words and sequencing events in stories.

Second Grade has been having a great time learning about "just right" books and fun fantasy chapter book series.

Third Grade has been working on Library Location Skills, specifically a basic intro to the Dewey Decimal System.

Fourth Grade read a book about the Nantucket Sea Monster and learned about fake news.

Fifth Grade has been reading Caldecott contenders and participating on a Mock Caldecott Committee to determine the most distinguished picture book published in the last year.

Dear Parents.

Between January and February, students identified as English Language Learners will participate in the ACCESS test. This important assessment helps measure your child's English language proficiency. Students will continue taking the test annually until they achieve an overall composite score of 4.8 or higher.

As the test dates approach, your child's teacher will share specific details about when the test will take place.

To help your child feel confident and prepared, we recommend:

- Ensuring they get a good night's sleep before the test.
- Providing a healthy breakfast on testing days.
- Sharing words of encouragement, such as:
 - "Try your best and show all the English you have learned!"
 - "Use the amazing English vocabulary you know!"
 - "I'm so proud of you, you are going to do great!
