# Principal & Director Reports January 2010

## **AC.** Houghton Elementary

Afterschool Program/Oaks Preparation Update

A continuing two part goal that we are working on this year is the installation of a second computer lab by reallocating computers within the building and organizing our After School programming with the Study Island math and reading software to ensure that all students receive the maximum possible preparation for third-grade state assessment. We have realigned our reading blocks so that we have a little over an hour at the end of the day for third-grade Study Island time. With only one computer lab, we did not have enough time and space to keep ongoing lab use at the same time we needed to do Oaks assessment or the Map assessment for grades K. through 2. Now we will be able to run both programs simultaneously with the two labs. The same programming and lab use will be able to expand during our After School program.

All of the information above is the process of making adequate facilities available to coordinate the educational use of technology. What we will be adding to this is an alignment of Study Island practice exercises and student deficits identified by Oaks assessment. We also are aligning practice sessions with the problems which are like those of the Saxon math curriculum, which is newly adopted this year.

Finally, we are organizing our instructional sessions to be identical to the testing protocols that we have to follow during the regular Oaks assessment. If we can train our kids to be showing their work all the time, then during the real Oaks testing sessions, when we can't prompt them to do their work on paper, they are likely to work out the problems on paper automatically, which can significantly affect their success. These practice sessions will also have the adults to help students understand the math that they are doing.

## **Heppner Elementary School**

It is a privilege to report the recent happenings of Heppner Elementary School. Winter Break seemed to fly by and it is hard to believe that 2009 has ended, and that the year 2010 has arrived. Our enrollment as of today is 197 students; this is up from my December report as we have just recently re-enrolled three students at HES. Our current attendance percentage for the year is 94.71% this unfortunately is again down from last month due to the inclement weather and families leaving for early vacations the week prior to winter break. We will continue to promote the importance of regular attendance to the students and parents of Heppner Elementary School.

December was full of many exciting events which took place at HES, among the highlights was the "Winter Music Concert" directed by Mrs. Michelle Stone and Mr. Joe Lindsay which took place at HES on Tuesday, December 15<sup>th</sup> 2009. It was a wonderful concert and we have had several parents comment on how much they liked the concert format this year. We were also treated to a performance of "Oliver" by the Hampstead Players on Thursday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> 2009 which students enjoyed it immensely.

The HES Geography Bee will be held in the gym on Wednesday, January 6th at 1:00pm.

#### **GEAR-UP**

Through our GEAR-UP grant, we were able to send three teachers and our counselor to a two day training in Portland to better understand poverty and to gain tools for making a difference. They will go back to Portland later this year to receive additional training as a poverty coach. As a result, they will be trained to conduct "Poverty 101" sessions as well as "Communicating and Working More Effectively" sessions for staff. Coaches can serve as local experts for breaking poverty barriers and improving outcomes. They are trained to conduct Poverty Competency Assessments, help organizations and communities to develop one-year action plans, and assist with follow-up on those action plans.

## BE RESPONSIBLE, BE RESPECTFUL, & BE SAFE

We have continued to work with our leadership class on our school's theme for the year: Be Responsible, Be Respectful, and Be Safe. After several meetings thus far, students have been able to define what these three items look like in different parts of the school. In Promotional Graphics students pre-designed and created posters using Adobe InDesign. The Manufacturing Prototype team designed and manufactured 20 duck pull toys. # **College Entrance Exams: SAT/ACT**

Riverside High school has already broken its record number of students taking college entrance exams. After the November test date, we have 15 students who took either the SAT or ACT. This number already doubles the number of test takers in 2008. According to the OUS statistics, Riverside High School only had 6 seniors take the SAT or ACT in 2008. This data only lends optimists to think that Riverside will have a higher percentage of students pursuing post secondary education after graduation in June 2010.

#### **Financial Aid Night**

It's financial aid crunch time all around the post secondary education world! Here at Riverside we are preparing our students with a night of crucial financial aid information. Riverside High School will be hosting a FAFSA/Financial Aid night for our seniors and their parents. This night has been scheduled for February 10, 2010. Co-hosting will be representatives from Western Oregon University who will be providing not only the Financial Aid Information, but also refreshments. We will have bilingual representatives as well as some of our own faculty helping out.

#### **PASS Program Pilot**

Riverside strives to provide each student with the opportunity to be successful academically. Therefore, we have piloted the PASS program, which allows students who are behind in credits, due to English as a Second Language, to catch up with curriculum in the form of packets. We started the program with three seniors and currently 2 of the 3 are now on track to graduate because they were able to retrieve the deficient credit. The program is great and beneficial, but expensive. With all the budget cuts, there are not enough funds for this program to continue. Miss Torres, our counselor, has written a grant to offset the costs of the curriculum packets and we will hear back by the end of January.

**Enrollment:** 311 **Attendance:** The average attendance for December was 88.06%. Our **Winter Concert** was well attended. The students sang magnificently...it has truly become a holiday tradition for Boardman.

Students raised 25,250 pennies during our **Holiday Penny Drive**. Every single last penny went towards purchasing gifts for four children from our very own Boardman community. Gift items included tops, jeans, socks, gloves, hats, and a toy for all four children.

**Site Council** members took a "New Year" look at our school-wide plan to ensure that we are maintaining our focus on our school goals. We have met all of our professional development goals and teachers are continuing their work on Common Formative Assessments during their weekly PLC/Data Team time. We look forward to the winter round of assessments to celebrate the effectiveness of our new approaches for academic improvement.

Site Council revisited our Parent Survey results and celebrated high ratings in most areas. A follow-up survey will be sent to parents of students who ride the bus to better understand concerns for bus safety.

School committees now report to the Site Council. The **Safety** committee will soon release a "School-to-Home Safety" brochure for parents. The **Student Positive Behavior** committee added several activities to highlight our Students of the Month. They also promote reading through AR parties and look forward to the new songs students will create with Buck & Elizabeth. The songs certainly add to our positive school climate. The **Staff Activities/Sunshine** committee simplified our Staff Christmas Party with an after school get together in the staff room. The **Parent** Committee celebrated a huge break-through in helping

to create a PTO for our school. Both an English and a Spanish speaking parent was recruited from each classroom.

**PTO:** 16 parents attended the last PTO meeting. They hosted a holiday gift bag and bake sale making over \$350.00. A great kick-off!

**After-School Program update**: Of the 48 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students currently eligible for benchmark support, 7 have not attended, 6 had sporadic attendance, and 35 attend regularly. Those not attending were re-invited and the 35 attending regularly were recognized with certificates. After our second round of OAKS, some students will not be required to attend our After-School Program. Students still in need of support will also be invited to Friday School which starts February 5<sup>th</sup>. Depending on space, teachers will make recommendations for 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students in both programs.

**English Language Development** continues to be a focus for our school. Eight teachers took opportunity of the three-day institute, Systematic ELD. Our SIOP facilitators report that Systematic ELD has enhanced their ability to create effective language objectives for all students. With two new students from Burma we have yet another opportunity to learn about effective language development and embrace diversity.

Wendy Appleton was awarded a certificate recognizing her participation in the "Take a Veteran to School Day" by the <u>History Channel</u>. She certainly is an outstanding example of teaching U.S. history through musical performances.


