

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRINCIPAL

Student attendance is the most important predictor of success!

In fact, it is the most important of all factors that impact student success at school. Neah-Kah-Nie School District has adopted a 90% attendance rate expectation for all of our students. Regardless of the reason, we carefully monitor student attendance and work hard to communicate with families in an effort to remove attendance barriers. We work hard to hire the best and most highly qualified staff, purchase up to date curriculum and provide excellent professional development in the most effective instructional strategies. Our number one focus is preparing our students for success in and beyond high school. We offer a wide variety of extracurricular activities, elective courses and support services so that academic, social, and physical health are part of a rich and well balanced program. In order for our investments to pay off, we need our students at school every day, on time.

This year as we focus on attendance, we want to reward students that either improve their attendance or achieve the miraculous perfect attendance status—zero tardies AND zero absences for any reason!

Out of our total of 222 high school students, after the first five weeks of school, we currently have 64 students that have perfect attendance. 208 have maintained our goal of at least 90% attendance with only 19 students slipping below that standard for a variety of reasons.

We ask families to support high standards for attendance in every way you can. Please do not make appointments during the school day if possible. Parents should give the school at least two days advance notice. This allows teachers to communicate with the student important information regarding their classwork and students can be responsible to complete assignments while absent. When students are sick, it is important to carefully evaluate the severity of the illness. Please do not send students to school if they have a fever, are vomiting or have diarrhea as these could be symptoms of contagious diseases that we, of course, do not want to expose others to. Your family doctor should be consulted and provide guidance about when it is safe to come back to school. In cases of chronic, non-contagious issues, please contact us so we can create a plan that will enable students to participate fully. LUNCH PROGRAM & ACCOUNTS:

The school cafeteria continues to provide healthy and nutritious breakfasts and lunches meeting the federal school lunch guidelines. A student breakfast is \$1.85 and lunch is \$3.15. If qualified for the Free & Reduced Lunch Program, breakfast is free. Those qualifying for reduced lunch, the cost is \$.40 – please remember if your son or daughter is on the Free & Reduced Lunch Program, if they choose to eat more than one breakfast or lunch, the additional meal is at the paid lunch pricing listed above. The application for the Free & Reduced Lunch program MUST BE RENEWED EACH SCHOOL YEAR PRIOR TO MID-OCTOBER. It is preferred you apply directly online by visiting the district website, clicking on the parent tab and access Mealtime Online. If you have not yet applied for the Free & Reduced Lunch program for the current school year, please do so at your earliest convenience to insure there is no lapse in the program for your son/daughter. We will have a computer available during Student Led Conferences you may use to complete your application. A paper application will also be available in the high school office if you prefer.

UPDATE CONTACT INFORMATION:

To insure we are effectively communicating with families, it is important to have current contact information – including phone numbers, physical and mailing addresses and e-mail. If there have been any changes in this information over the summer, please contact the office with your updated information. STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

Students have been working diligently to have their portfolios and presentations ready. (i.e. noon – 12:30 pm) The second 30 minutes of each hour will be a time parents can meet one on one with specific teachers if needed or wanted. (i.e. 12:30 p.m. – 1:00 p.m.) There will be signup sheets outside of each teacher's door to schedule individual teacher conferences. During conferences, we are offering a 30-minute Adolescent Mental Health Workshop starting at 1:00 p.m. and at 6:00 p.m. in the high school library. Sara Todd, Licensed Clinical Social Worker, from Rinehart Clinic will be presenting the workshops.

We hope to see each of you here on the 18th as Student Led Conferences are an important part of the Advisory curriculum and all student are required to participate. However, if you are unable to attend on the 18th, please contact your student's Advisory teacher to make arrangements for an alternative presentation time. 'TIS THE SEASON for Financial Aid and College Applications

This month seniors and their parents should be completing their FAFSA application for the 2019-2020 school year (required for all seniors). Our goal is to have 100% submitted by the end of October. Feel free to contact the counselor if you have questions. (esthert@nknsd.org)

- 1) Student and parent need to apply for an FSA ID. This replaces the pin that we used to use for the FAFSA. If you haven't done so yet, visit the website at https://fsaid.ed.gov. Please note: This is not the FAFSA application just the FSA ID! One for the student...and one for a parent...Have your Social Security number handy!
- 2) FAFSA Application can be found online at https://fafsa.ed.gov/. The FAFSA serves as the foundation for almost all financial aid packages and is required by most colleges and trade schools. Students will be filling out the 2019-2020 application using your 2017 tax information. It is strongly suggested that you use the data retrieval tool embedded in the FAFSA which makes the process very easy and less likely to be flagged for verification.
- 3) Next up we'll begin working on the OSAC and Oregon Promise applications. Students can begin working on their personal essays now in preparation!

DID YOU KNOW? The majority (61%) of Oregon high school seniors enroll in college or a university within a year of graduating. The state has set a goal that by 2025, 80% of students will go on to postsecondary education.

COLLEGE MYTHS (AND REALITIES)

MYTH: A 4-year college and degree is better than a 2-year college and degree.

REALITY: The experiences and degrees offered by 2-year and 4-year colleges will be different, but one is not necessarily "better". Students should choose the type of college they attend and degree they get based on what they might be interested in doing and the kind of college experience thev interested in. As the chart shows on the first page, a higher degree usually translates to increased income, although there are many 2-year degree programs whose graduates earn more than those with a Bachelor's degree.

PARENT CHECKLIST

- □ Talk about future career options with your student. Discuss interests and research the type of degree needed for potential occupations. Check out mynextmove.org to browse careers and get a sense of how much education your student will need.
- Explore college options. After choosing the type of degree your student is interested in, visit bigfuture.collegeboard.org to search for schools that offer the programs and other characteristics your student might be interested in (close to home or out-of-state? big or small?)
- □ Continue talking to your student about the importance of college and doing well in school. Your opinions and high expectations matter!

THE #1 THING COLLEGES LOOK FOR: GRADES

Colleges care most about the work your student has done in high school. They look for students who have earned strong grades in challenging courses.

Your student's school might offer Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) classes, or dual enrollment options with a local community college. These will be more rigorous options for your student and might even result in college credit.

Some colleges have a minimum grade point average (GPA) for acceptance. If a student

does not meet the minimum GPA, the college may review applications individually and

choose to admit students based on test scores, extracurricular activities or other merits.

Different colleges require other items as part of the application for admission, so be sure to encourage your student to check what he or she will need. These might include specific classes or number of credits, successful completion of state standardized tests, college admission tests (the SAT or the ACT), essays, letters of recommendation, or portfolios.

Stellar grades and challenging courses are also used in determining some scholarships, so encourage your student to do the best they can!

DID YOU KNOW?

College admission isn't as selective as you might think. 77% of applicants are admitted to Oregon's public universities.

COLLEGE MYTHS (AND REALITIES)

MYTH: It's better to get good grades than take challenging courses.

REALITY: Even modest success in advanced or accelerated courses indicates to a college that your student seeks and can handle challenging courses - like those your student will find in college. A challenging college preparatory advanced program, placement courses, or dual enrollment options might help your student get into more selective schools or even get college credit.

PARENT CHECKLIST

- □ Talk to your student about their top college choices and go over admission requirements. Talk to a school counselor to make sure your student is on track to graduate and enter the postsecondary institution of their choice. Check out bigfuture.collegeboard.org to compare colleges and view application requirements.
- ☐ Visit a college or attend a college fair with your student. Join as a chaperone on a school field trip or attend a local college fair. You can also visit a school virtually by checking out websites, looking at student reviews, and requesting informational brochures from colleges.
- □ SENIORS Encourage your student to apply to college during the school's College Application Week event. Your student will get dedicated time and support in school to complete college applications so make sure he or she is prepared to participate. Your student might be eligible for a fee deferral or waiver for college applications talk to the school counselor.
