District Updates

- At this board meeting, you will be asked to consider a farm lease agreement. This is in regards to the property the district owns east of Owatonna off of Rose St. We have been leasing and renting this property for crop production since we have owned it. This agreement puts our FFA chapter and our Agriculture Department as the beneficiaries of the proceeds.
- Mark Stotts will be presenting the insurance renewal the upcoming year. This year will include an increase of 9%, which is higher than previous years. This year we experienced higher than normal claims which drives the increase higher. That being said, we are still in a better position than most districts who are facing double-digit increases.
- > Dr. Champa and I have been in weekly communication to start the transition work. She has scheduled a few full days in the district before her start here. Additionally, she plans to attend most, if not all, of the upcoming school board meetings.

Community Ed/Roosevelt

- Walking Track at OHS closes for public walking on May 2. We still have 2 weeks of walking data to collect, but to date we have a total of 3,680 walks taken this program year which compares to 3,427 walks taken in the 2024-2025 program year. We recorded 506 registrations, down slightly from a year ago, but more determined walkers! User profiles include stronger participation from the community with a number of community members with disabilities accessing the track. Participation by district employees showed a decrease. Requests for "day passes" increased this year.
- Summer School Age Care has completed registration with 126 contracts submitted. The Summer 2025 program will be hosted at Roosevelt Community School.
- 2025-2026 School Year SAC registration opened on April 21st. Returning families have spoken for just over half of available care slots. Families new to the program will register in the coming days, with anticipation that all care slots will be spoken for. A wait list will be maintained as approximately 20% of our registered families will have their childcare needs change over the summer and no longer need services when we open on September 4th.
- We are pleased to welcome Kayla Kummerfeldt as the SAC Program Specialist on the Community Education Team. Kayla began serving families on March 31st.
- Please stop by the Enviro Show on Saturday, May 10th from 8:00-4:30. Over 70
 environmentally-friendly vendors will be on hand to share their skills and knowledge
 with the community. This event is a family-friendly, community partnership.Lydia
 Yahnke, Adult Programs Coordinator represents the school district in showcasing this
 innovative project!
- The Adult Learning Center is preparing to wrap up its academic year and move right into summer programming. Staff have worked hard to stay current in strategies that encourage attendance and retention with our adult students. We are anticipating a 33% decline in our contact hours, which will impact our funding awards for 2025-2026. We remain hopeful that an Integrated English Language and Civics grant submission will be awarded to the Center to further our innovative work in adult learning through the combined lense of education, training and workforce readiness.

Special Services

➤ School Social Workers and Counselors completed a three-day series of trainings facilitated by the MDE School Support Professional Consultant. Professional development focused on developing our district-wide Multi-Tiered System of Support for Social Emotional Behavior and Mental Health (MTSS SEBMH)

- ➤ Submitted a Demonstration Project grant to MDE to support MTSS SEBMH. The project's focus is on Tier 2 interventions and staff development to be incorporated into PLC work.
- ➤ Introductory training for Social Workers to begin Medical Assistance billing in Fall 2025
- District-wide special education staff participated in Raptor training
- ➤ Meet with District-wide Special Education Leadership Team; discussed internal systems for documenting time and effort; ongoing review and input for special education programs, process and procedures

Teaching and Learning

Without a doubt, it has been a busy year in my department, but there are some exciting outcomes of this work. First, our READ Act training continues to move along with building principals following up with the learning work at staff meetings, ensuring the learning has a purpose. By mid-June, all of our year one participants should have completed the training. In August, our coaches and Kelly Kruger will be trained in the system that will be used with our support personnel next year.

We have landed on a new K-5 Language Arts resource as well; Wit & Wisdom will be implemented next year and is highly aligned to the Science of Reading and is the highest rated knowledge-based resource approved by the state of MN. We are excited to align this resource to the new state standards and the best practices we have learned about when it comes to reading instruction. In addition, after more than a year of research, we have landed on a new math resource for K-5 for the 26-27 school year. Wendy Eggermont led this process, which included presentations from three different vendors, multiple visits to schools to see these resources in action, and much dialogue with the math committee. Last week, the committee came to a unanimous decision to adopt Illustrative Math through Imagine Learning. This next year will be work to align the new standards to this new resource. Although there will likely be some teams/schools piloting this next year, full implementation will happen the following year.

Finally, one more big shift is the adoption of a new data warehouse system. Viewpoint has long been the system we have used, but they were bought out by Educlimber. Kenneth led the research into a variety of tools, but we ultimately landed on Educlimber, which offers a deeper platform for tracking student progress. That will be in place starting this summer into next year.
