Family Open Houses are scheduled for December 11-13 at each of the School Age Care sites. It is our time to enjoy activities and friendships with parents and siblings of our charges, with an opportunity to learn more about daily site activities.

Adult Basic Education is finishing up its Consortium-level annual fiscal reporting due to MDE. New programming initiatives continue to be built with local work sites. Regional career pathway work and citizenship instruction are also prepping for post January 1st launch. Programs are designed to upskill or reskill adult learners seeking additional employability skills. Working regionally in the delivery of these programs affords Owatonna area adults with a broader cadre of learning opportunities and instructor expertise that Owatonna does not have the capacity to offer. That being said, Owatonna likewise has expertise that is shared with the SE ABE and

Hiawatha Valley consortiums. Our expertise lies in worksite English language acquisition, bi-lingual Driver's Permit Prep and integrated education and training across a host of career and content areas developed through grants and partnerships designed to meet local labor market opportunities.

Teaching and Learning

As we near the winter break, we are in the process of planning winter benchmark assessments that will occur in January. This is a big undertaking but provides us with valuable information on student progress. This data is analyzed to make sure students are receiving the supports they need. The elementary math team will have had their second meeting by break and are teeing up their learning of the new standards and practices to help identify a new resource for K-5 math. Our elementary social studies committee had their first meeting around the new standards on Tuesday, December 3. The elementary LA committee is also deep into standards work and assessing the core resource we have to ensure we have what we need to meet the new standards. As I write, the CoGAT testing process has started, which is used to identify students for Gifted/Talented services. We are also nearly half way through our READ Act training. In addition, we recently learned that our data information system has been purchased by another company and will no longer be available after June 30; we are in the process of looking into other vendors that can do what Viewpoint offered us with additional features. As you can see, the T&L team is keeping very busy!
