Technology Update - Changes to Student Laptop Policies/Procedures for SY 25-26

Elementary Schools

This year, we experimented with sending laptops home with 5th graders. Our usage data shows that 5th graders were either not using the laptops at home, or using them for predominantly non-educational purposes. We will return to the previous practice of keeping the 5th grade laptops at school.

Middle Schools

Starting in school year 25-26, FMS laptops will be issued to middle school students for use at school only. This decision was made in collaboration with FMS Middle School principals, and is based on multiple data points.

- 1. Weekday, after-hours Internet usage data for middle school students indicates the following:
 - a. 30-35% of students are not using their assigned computer at home.
 - b. 45-55% of students are accessing non-educational resources, primarily YouTube.
 - c. Only 20-25% of students are accessing resources categorized by the FMS Internet filter as Educational.

- We have seen an increase in damage of FMS computers, primarily at the Middle Schools. Middle school students account for 70% of secondary school computer damage but represent only 40% of the secondary school population. In financial terms, this has cost FMS over \$350,000 this fiscal year.
- 3. There is a growing body of evidence that excessive use of electronic devices is detrimental to student brain development and social/emotional health. This has significant impacts on student academic achievement and behavior.

Each middle school student will be assigned a specific computer once the FMS laptop contract is signed by a parent or guardian. Families will be charged up to \$100 per repair for any accidental or deliberate damage.

Laptops will be stored in classroom carts to charge overnight, with distribution based on school size (25 laptops per cart). Self-contained classrooms will receive smaller stations. A homeroom system will manage daily laptop check-in/out.

Middle schoolers taking high school classes will receive a laptop and charger for home use, following high school policies. For others, laptops will remain at school, with internet disabled after hours and YouTube blocked at all times. Teachers can use Classwize to unblock content during their class times.

More detailed, standardized procedures will be developed to guide computer use across middle schools, including protocols for special projects that require at-home access. These exceptions must be planned in advance with campus tech and office staff—no same-day approvals.

High Schools

The only change at this level is to return to the policy of charging families up to \$100 per repair for any accidental or deliberate damage.
