INTERIM DIRECTORS REPORT 23 May 2016

Notes on Library Services, Programs, and Staff:

- Comparing April 2015 to April 2016 our circulation statistics are above slightly. The yearto-date figures are also up slightly and I believe that we are on our way of topping two million circulations again this year.
- Reciprocal borrowing continues strong as well, with CCPL continuing to lend more than 74% of the items borrowed by Hamilton County residents. Hamilton East Public Library is second, lending just over 18% of the total.
- THE BIG program, Summer Challenge, began on Monday, 16 May and will continue through 15 August. If you have not experienced this thrilling program, check out our website http://www.carmel.lib.in.us/challenge/ and delve in. Renee' and her incredible team of staff from all departments have done a commendable job getting this three month program up and running.
- The Reference Department's "ISIS is not Islam" program on Monday evening (16 May) was well attended with over 80 people. The next day a patron called with this comment: "Very, very good. Would like a part two or an extension. Two hours not long enough!"
- The CYS Department partnered with Prairie Trace Elementary for the first annual second grade Mini Maker Faire. The second graders brought in their projects for display and proudly explained the problem they solved with their creations. It was amazing evening with over 300 in attendance throughout the time frame. Renee' posted on Facebook that their creative ideas included vending machines, edible bowls, a shower foot, sibling blinders, new cleaning tools and many other creative ideas.
- Another CYS program was Campfire Fun presented on Tuesday 17 May at 5:30pm and 7pm. Each session had about 40 patrons that joined the staff for a camping adventure that included telling stories, singing songs, making crafts and preparing S'mores.
- The YA Department and CYS co-sponsored a Star Wars event, May the Fourth Be with You, on 4 May. Over 300 attendees participated in the fun. Another Star Wars event was held on Friday, 13 May. David Edwards from our Technical Services Department had a Friday Night Game Challenge, Star Wars X-Wing program.
- The YA Department partnered with the Carmel High School, and Barnes and Noble for "The Creative Writing Con" over two days. Almost 1,700 students attended.
- The Foundation has continued its Author Series. (See Foundation Report).
- The Mobile Library is gearing up for summer. Jane (our new mobile library supervisor)
 has been visiting our current stops. The two EduCare stops will be on hiatus until the Fall
 school schedule begins. In the meantime, more parks have been added to the schedule.
 They will also visit two parks during the Kids Concerts in June and July, and stop at the
 Storytime Express West and Kids in the Kitchen programs with our CYS department. We
 will attend the special event at West Park Family Campout on Friday, 3 June and also
 Touch a Truck on 20 July. If you look at the Parks Summer Event booklet, our ccpl2go
 logo is attached to the park events we are attending. We have added another

retirement/senior living facility. Beginning in June the mobile library will stop at The Bickford on Thursday mornings.

Budget/Finance:

• Dan and I met with Mike Reuter last week to discuss the Financial Plan and the 2017 budget. I have asked Managers to send in their budget requests in preparation for formulating the 2017 budget. Mike will be at this month's Board meeting to discuss the Financial Plan.

Building and Grounds:

- Use of the Flex Room has increased so much that we ordered three more tables and twelve more chairs. The chair in the Infant Feeding Room has been recovered in the "easy to clean" vinyl. All staff chairs will be cleaned by Carpet Concepts on Friday, 20 May.
- AAA Roofing repaired the roof problem above our server room earlier this month. They did not charge the library for this repair since it had fallen through the cracks during a staffing change at their company.
- Engledow has finished the landscape renovation that we encumbered funds for last Fall. The dead/dying junipers have been removed and replaced with Euonymus coloratus groundcover, daylilies, and Allium. Concrete step stones have been installed in the southwest corner where people have made a 'walking trail'.
