Nuigsut Trapper School

Good afternoon from Nuiqsut Trapper.

Great things have been going on here at Trapper School. As we started the year, we hosted a Day of Caring with Conocophillips. Our initial concept was for painting some stripes on the walls and sprucing the place up a bit. We were blown away with what actually occurred. Over the course of two days, we had over twenty volunteers who painted from our front doors down through our cafeteria. Our school has begun a transformation from bleak beige walls to bright green and yellow Trapper colors all around. The plan is to continue with painting the interior while also incorporating ideas such as a community hand print wall. While here the volunteers also helped with many other tasks and projects ranging from fixing and replacing lighting to building shelves and assisting with other much needed maintenance tasks.

We then began welcoming our veteran and new staff back. Twelve out of sixteen certified teachers returned giving us a strong base to continue the hard work from last year. We welcomed Matthew Brown as our new SPED teacher and Andrew Nason as our new middle/high social studies teacher. Since this time, we have also welcomed Bethany Gray for kindergarten. We are still in need of a counselor and an ILT teacher to be fully staffed.

In addition to our certified staff, we have welcomed Rosemary Ahtuangarook as our Home School Facilitator and Misty Plymale as an instructional paraprofessional. Both ladies have already brought community connections and a huge amount of knowledge and love when it comes to helping out our kids.

As the first day of school approached, we hosted a Meet the Teacher Day that was very well attended by our families. Students and family members were able to see our new improvements as well as get their schedules and meet their new teachers. We were all so happy to be starting the year in green with kids in our buildings.



We managed to stay in green for about three weeks and during that time, we had students participate in activities such as cross country, EXCEL Alaska, and student council. We began collecting data through various tests and observations so we can better differentiate instruction for all students. Students are excited to be in school and participating in the planning of more events both academic and social for the upcoming year.

On September 9th, we were informed of multiple cases in Nuiqsut causing us to go to RED. Active case numbers hit over fifty and this will keep us in red until they come back down. While in red, we are continuing to interact with our students through zoom classes and phone calls. Work packets are being delivered weekly and we now have a system in place for picking up the completed work as well. In addition to work, we are also trying to keep our kids engaged with activities for suicide awareness and character trait building. We are also hoping to begin food delivery even though we do not have a bus driver yet.

Our cultural in-service time has also been very informative and exciting this year. Our teachers have participated in activities to include but not limited to the Blessing of the Whaling crews, helping with the harvesting of whale, learning how to prepare various hides, cooking, picking berries, baleen separation, and even presentations on hunting cabins and how allotments were distributed to families. We are all looking forward to learning and doing even more.

In addition to the cultural learning, we are pushing hard for our teachers to engage in ongoing professional development to increase their pedagogy skills. Teachers are embracing new strategies for engagement and teaching while continuing to focus on trauma informed practices that support the social emotional learning skills our kids need as well. We believe students need to see us as life long learners as well and we can always learn new and different things for all parts of our lives.
