Principal's Report

We continue to have a very cohesive staff district wide, one of the best in years!

The holiday season is well upon us and each school site has been going above and beyond with their Friday activities, swim lessons, holiday plays, fundraiser dinners, Veteran's Day programs, food drives, and many other activities. Lead teachers and site staffs organize these activities in addition to the educational day. I am very proud of them for creating and maintaining a bridge between school and community. As you can see from their board reports and pictures below...these are exciting times at our schools.

We have a **Food Service audit** coming up at the end of January so we will be performing site visits in December to do impromptu inspections at our sites. I have completed the one in Port Alexander and will complete Hyder's inspection in early January when I do my scheduled site visit.

The Thorne Bay Cafe has been running on one adult staff and at least one paid student worker as well as a student intern from the culinary arts program. The new scaled down menu is out and Sydney has hot soups each weekend made fresh from the culinary arts students. Sydney has done a great job of organizing the cafe labor force to include members of her culinary arts class. Each student has to do at least a 15hrs internship as part of the requirement of the class. There have been some students that have already completed this internship and have requested that they be allowed to continue to volunteer down at the cafe. This is quite a testament to how Sydney has endeared herself as a classroom teacher and cafe manager to many of the students at the Thorne Bay School. She will be girls head basketball coach starting up in early December. Keep up the good Sydney!!!

Thursday night fundraisers at the Cafe have been a nice success. We have had three of these thus far and have had good crowds. Christy Plate has organized a list for all of the Thursdays through April. Great job Christy!!! The cafe has been a pleasant change away from the school to stage these fundraisers.

Curriculum

The Social Studies committee members continue to meet and evaluate the current curriculum and related resources. The State has very "loose" social studies standards so we are striving to clarify ours so that each grade level learns about current events and geography as well as world, US, and local history. Monies have been allocated for this committee to meet on a few weekends and give the district feedback as well as a proposed direction to head. Lisa Cates leads up this committee.

The curriculum webpage is fully up to date and staff is being encouraged to use this as a tool not only for instruction but also assessment. We continue to add elective class syllabi

to the curriculum webpage. These are in Word format so that teachers can modify them to fit their individual school and student's needs.

Professional Development

We are looking to send a couple of teachers to the annual ASTE conference this year. The travel and lodging are made available through a math/science grant. Cheryl Bobo is managing this grant and has been very good about getting us the information about training opportunities for our staff. Thank you very much for all that you do for our staff here at SISD and HCSD Cheryl!!!

November 18th saw our staff come together at Thorne Bay School for our teacher inservice to continue training on the Renaissance Leaning program, gain an introduction to "Ed Camp" presented by Colter Barnes, and learn about how our current teacher evaluation instrument has been converted to an on-line instrument. This new on-line version has the advantage of allowing teachers to upload supporting documentation that aligns to the teacher standards. It also allows them to view classroom walk through documentation as soon as it is completed. A big thanks to Julie Vasquez and Lisa Cates for volunteering to pilot it in the Spring semester.

Whale Pass School

Whale Pass School continues to run smoothly on a daily basis. Our October ASC dinner was a great success serving Spaghetti to all our Veterans in the Community. The students


have created a wall to celebrate Veterans and their families. Each family has brought in and placed pictures of family members serving from WWII to present day. See pictures below.
