This agreement is between OAK PARK TOWNSHIP and the enumerated participating local governments: Village of Oak Park, Village of River Forest, River Forest Township, School District 90, School District 97, School District 200, Park District of Oak Park, River Forest Park District, Oak Park Public Library, and River Forest Public Library, hereinafter referred to collectively as PARTICIPATING GOVERNMENT UNITS.

### OAK PARK TOWNSHIP agrees as follows:

- To work with at-risk youth engaged with (or disengaged from) local agencies that provide multiple services.
- To work with any youth who are residents of Oak Park and River Forest or attend the community schools. The interventionists will work with youth who need help with depression/anxiety, crisis and trauma, gang involvement, school refusal/attendance issues, and behavioral/aggression problems.
- To closely monitor youth, through a case management model which focuses on the individual strengths and needs of clients and their families and helps in linking them to services, managing those services, and tracking outcomes.
- To respect and maintain the confidentiality of registered Youth Interventionist clients and their families and share information about clients with partner agency staff as appropriate and only when a Release of Information has been signed by the appropriate party; and reporting.
- <u>To report</u> program outcomes, such as <u>school performance and contact with law</u> <u>enforcementreasons for discharge, demographics, referral reasons, and assessment</u> <u>information</u>, in the aggregate only.
- To continue to provide intense intervention by employing support staff and threetwo Youth Interventionists for the positions as described in Appendix I and one Youth Interventionist Supervisor.
- To act as the administrative agent of the Youth Interventionist Program, hiring, training, supervising, insuring and housingproviding office space to the Youth Interventionist Program staff.
- To provide the necessary support, services, materials and equipment, such as, duplication, printing, postage, telephone and computers.
- To distribute monthly reports via email on the activities of Youth Interventionist staff to all board members and the chief administrators of each participating government unit.
- To work with participating government units to establish additional meaningful outcome measures based on shared client data.
- To report on program activities and outcomes at least annually, or more often as needed or requested, at the Council of Governments meetings in Oak Park and in River Forest.

- To offer services listed in Appendix II: Menu of Services to partner agencies and to work responsively with partner agencies to develop other specific services based on emerging needs.
  - To contribute up to \$59,040 (2018-19) and \$60,221 (2019-2020) for each year of this joint effort plus the administrative overhead of housing the program.

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- To maintain an appropriate level of liability insurance and provide certificates of insurance to partner agencies as requested.
- To bill each participating government unit on a quarterly basis the actual dollars spent to provide the Youth Interventionist Programat the quarter amount listed in this IGA.
- To establish agreements with partner agencies to share confidential information that will allow the Township to report on program outcomes for the Youth Intervention caseload in the aggregate.
- To engage a third-party program evaluator to evaluate the program's impact and outcomes.

#### The other participating government units agree as follows:

- To support the Youth Interventionist Program through referrals, offering space to meet with youth and families; (including virtual access during e-learning school days), sharing information about high riskyouth behaviors and situations, participating in training events and planning meetings, and by providing outcome data.
- To bring policy and operational concerns and recommendations to the Youth Services Director or Oak Park Township Manager or Supervisor and then, as needed, to the community's Council of Governments for discussion and response.
- To work collaboratively and cooperatively in the common interest of helping youth develop while avoiding involvement in gangs, drugs, and violence, learn problem solving skills and to become engaged positively in the community.
- To <u>consider enteringenter</u> into data sharing agreements, where appropriate, so that the Township may collect and analyze data in the aggregate for youth that are participating in the Youth Interventionist program.

• To support the cost of this joint endeavor in an amount not<u>listed</u> to exceed each agency's share as presented be billed Quarterly in four equal amounts. The total budget for the table below: Youth Interventionist Program for the first year of this agreement is \$244,974.

To the extent permitted by law, each party shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other parties, their elected officials, employees, officers, directors and agents from and against any third-party claims, demands, losses, damages, or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising from or relating to any claim for harm, injury, or death to any person, or damage to tangible personal property arising out of or in connection with the performance of the services under this Agreement to the extent of the negligence, fault, or willful act or omission of the indemnifying party, its personnel or agents during the course of performance of the services hereunder or otherwise in connection with the performance of this Agreement.

This Intergovernmental Agreement will be in force for two years from July 1, <del>2018</del> – June 30, 2020. Any party may terminate its participation in this Intergovernmental Agreement effective June 30, 2019, by providing notice of termination to all other parties on or before June 1, 2019<u>2020</u>.

#### Job Summary

: The Youth <u>Services</u>-Interventionist <u>provides individual</u><u>builds collaborations between systems</u> and family treatment <u>agencies</u> to <u>prevent</u>, intervene, and combat negative youth involved in or at risk of becoming involved in gangs, drugs or violent activities; works closely with Youth Interventionist Team and Youth Services Director to discuss <u>behavior</u> in Oak Park and <u>developRiver Forest</u> <u>Communities</u>. The interventionist assists youth and families, and implement treatment plans. Collaborates with a variety of community agencies and resources to decrease risk and connectidentified families with appropriate, long-term services. programming geared toward youth in the Oak Park and River Forest Communities. This is an ideal position for recent grads!

#### Essential Job Functions:

- 1. Performs crisis intervention in situations such as suicide, homicide, rage, juvenile arrest, violence, community, family tragedy, self-injury, running away, etc. Assesses risk; provides direct consultation services; provides referrals and stabilization services, coordinates and provides support during the hospitalization process, crisis counseling, brief mediation and notification of appropriate authorities; serves as member of school crisis and trauma debriefing team.
- 2. Assesses youth and family for potential for violence, communication patterns, boundaries, alcohol and drug addiction, gang involvement, sexual and physical abuse, neglect, mental health status, suicidal or homicidal plans or thoughts, criminal activity, risk of running away, cutting and other risk factors. Assessment includes evaluating the client, family and any unregistered youth in contact with.
- 3. Creates, monitors and implements treatment plan agreed upon by both client and family.
- 4. Provides counseling to youth involved or at-risk of involvement with gangs, drugs, potential violence, etc.; meets with youth as needed to decrease risk or involvement through therapy and referrals to other community agencies; provides resources for alternate living situations if required; works with youths at-risk and assists them by linking them with services in the community; provides consultation regarding juvenile laws. Heavy emphasis on group work.
- 5. Provides family therapy and counseling to identified families; conducts home visits to assess living environment, refers family to community agencies for financial assistance and long-term therapy as needed; provides crisis stabilization to family as need arises; works with family to advise on state laws regarding abuse and neglect, family law, juvenile delinquency, as well as potential for locking out their child. Emphasis on youth/family trauma and generational trauma counseling.
- 6. Consults with various community agencies including schools, Police Department, Health

Department, Park District, libraries, probation, inpatient and partial hospital programs, community counseling centers, mentoring services, and psychiatric evaluators to optimize assessment and treatment planning. Participates in other agency meetings including disciplinary/school placement, inpatient hospital discharge planning and collaboration with police officers, etc. Searches for new services, builds relationships with staff and distributes information on new providers to other collateral resources in the community.

- 7. Conducts mediation sessions between youth and/or families who are currently involved in a conflict; assists to resolve differences and decrease probability of violence in community between parties.
- 8. Conducts informational presentations to community mental health professionals, school teachers and high school students regarding drug and violence prevention, peer relations and other applicable subjects.
- 9. Maintains client files, intake and assessment forms, client interview questionnaire, consent forms, ratings scales, progress notes, progress note logs and any other essential materials.
  - <u>Monitors youth trends in the community such as gang movement, drugs, cults, etc.;</u> performs bike patrols and community walks in search of <u>Ability to show knowledge or ability</u> to gain knowledge in the following areas: Gangs, school attendance/refusal issues, anxiety and depression, substance abuse, trauma, aggression, and behavioral problems.
  - Carries a caseload of 20 individuals for counseling and interventions. Performs crisis intervention, making social diagnostic assessments, and assists in developing a comprehensive treatment plan for clients.
  - Run groups during school year that focus on current events, trends, and needs.
  - Collaborates closely with families, school personnel, mental health professionals, and other agencies associated with client. See clients in the office, their homes, school, and other areas outside of the office. Transport youth, if necessary.
  - Help provide wraparound services by encourage and referring youth, families, parents/ guardians to other community services and activities.
  - Knowledge of the DSM 5 and ability to diagnosis is a plus.
  - Able to maintain and complete documentation related to job duties in a timely manner. Must have good time management skills.
  - Initiate and maintain in contact (via phone, email, or in person) with youth, parents/ guardians, families, mentors, therapist, police, and other community agencies involved in youth's case.
  - Maintain relationships and partnerships with current agencies and organizations that serve youth in the Oak Park and River Forest Communities
  - 10.• In the summer, carry a small park caseload (around 7) to visit weekly looking for gang graffiti, drug paraphernalia-and cult remnants in community, litter, and other suspicious acts to help keep parks-safe.
- 11. Identifies gaps in service delivery system and reports to Director; participates in formulating and implementing solutions when appropriate.
- 12. Operates pursuant to federal and state laws as well as professional codes of ethics and codes of conduct. Maintains licensure through continuing education.
- 13. Plans and co-facilitates groups for at-risk youth in school settings.
- 14. Participates in various committee/council meetings, task forces and networking events as needed.
- 15. Remains current on mental health research and clinical theories.

The Township's Interventionist Program staff have advanced degrees and specialized trainingare Masters Level Social Workers and Counselors, all with backgrounds in education, criminal justice, law enforcement, intelligence gathering, substance abuse, violent-working with youth/adults, therapy/counseling, PTSD, training, instructional design, crisis intervention and de- escalation as well as skills in mediation and negotiation on a variety of issues. The Youth Interventionist Program is constantly conducting needs assessments to address youth issues within the communities. Through the Youth Interventionist Program, they provide the following services to individuals, families, agencies, and community organizations in Oak Park and River Forest.

- Restorative Justice practices, such as Cargo Peace Circles
- Anti-bullying training and presentations-
- Prevention, identification, and response to issues of gangs, drugs, and violence\_
