# **Culture & Climate Update**


### 1. Academic Support Program Launch


#### 5. Red Ribbon Week—Schoolwide Success

# **Challenges & Responsive Measures**

As enrollment continues to climb and COSSA Academy functions with a relatively new staff team, we have experienced some behavioral challenges, primarily tied to disruptive behavior. While these issues represent a small subset of our population, they do impact classrooms, and we are actively addressing them.

We have utilized lunch detentions and Friday School (held for three Fridays so far) to address repeat behaviors. More importantly, we are working toward proactive, individualized solutions for students who struggle to make behavioral changes. These include:

- Alternative placements within the school
- Online learning options for selected classes
- Blended schedules, allowing students to work partly in general education classrooms and partly in alternative settings
- Close collaboration with parents and guardians to ensure supportive follow-through

Although these challenges can be difficult—especially for newer teachers—our team continues to respond with professionalism and a desire to support students.

Though growth remains ahead of us, we are confident in our trajectory. With continued support, COSSA Academy will become not only a more structured and effective school, but a place defined by quality education, meaningful opportunities, and a shared sense of pride among students and staff.
