ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

Welcome back! The English staff is so happy to have our students back in school and ready to learn.

In 9th and 10th grade English, students are working on writing, reading, speaking, grammar, active listening, and critical thinking skills. Students will be working through the curriculum of both the StudySync Literature Program, and the NoRedInk Writing Program. In 11th grade English, we are also using the programs stated above and are implementing a classroom discourse tool called "SLANT", which is designed to assist students in positive body language and encourage them to be attentive listeners and speakers. Our hope is that this tool will help our junior students feel more comfortable with public speaking and more confident in all forms of communication. In 12th grade English, students have been discovering their specific personality traits and individual learning styles in order to create Two-Word Retellings as a means of an introduction of themselves to their teacher. Students are also taking diagnostic tests through our English curriculum (StudySync) and our district writing program (NoRedInk) in order to identify current abilities and possible gaps in learning. This will allow us to work on topics and skills that will help further students' knowledge and assist them with upcoming assignments.

Science Department

Our Science Department is excited for 2 new teachers to join our crew, and we are collaborating on a number of field trips and hands-on labs.

Classes: Biology, Earth Science Jim has been teaching at BHS for 26 years. He is focusing on project-based learning and will be doing activities with his classes including dissection and educational games.

Sonya Gobert

Classes: Astronomy, Forensic Science and Earth Science

Sonya is coming to us from the BHS math department, where she taught for 2 years. She is planning on doing fingerprinting with her forensic classes and her astronomy students will be learning traditional star stories.

Cody Henderson

Classes: Earth Science, Chemistry Cody has been a district employee for 8 years, and already knows many of his freshman students from previous teaching at the middle school level. His classes will start by focusing on the scientific method and then progress to chemistry.

Kevin Kicking Woman (MIS) Leo Bird Blackfeet Native American Studies (Blackfeet Language, Blackfeet History, & Montana History)

A study of selected ethical systems; origins, worldviews; religious ceremonies and the way they have been affected by western civilization. Traditional Native philosophy and worldview differs markedly from Euro-American or Western philosophy and worldview, providing a spiritual grounding for Native societies, in contrast to the secular basis of contemporary American culture. These courses will provide students with an understanding of the historical and contemporary basis of Native philosophy and worldview, how that is expressed in various societal contexts, including everyday life, language, song, social institutions and rituals, and how that has both remained consistent and changed from ancient through modern times. Ethical practices and questions related to both Native American religions and efforts to suppress those religions will provide a focus for discussion throughout the term. The course concludes with a review of contemporary religious and philosophical issues of greatest concern to American Indian tribes today.

Course Objectives

1. Understand roles and manifestations of language, spirituality, philosophy and religion in Native American life, past and present.

2. Understand Western impacts on Native American social and religious life, culture and worldview.

- 3. Understand contemporary issues related to spirituality and worldview.
- 4. Understand various related ethical issues.
- 5. Understanding, reading, writing, annunciation of the BPS writing system.

All students will be receiving t-shirts and planners. I look forward to working with all the students this year and helping them prepare for their future.

The Health and Physical Education Department is focusing on the Wellness Framework. Students are focusing on their Physical, Mental Emotional, Family Social and Cultural Spiritual wellness. Students are creating Medicine Wheels in health class and the Physical Education and Conditioning classes are working on pre-assessments regarding the elements of fitness.

Social Studies Department

This year, the Social Studies Department consists of Colin Sibbernsen, Glenn Castle and Leo Bullchild. Mr. Sibbernsen teaches World History and World Geography. He is putting an emphasis on a broad world perspective in both classes. His classes will be investigating key historical events that help us understand the complexities of our world today. Mr. Castle is teaching Government and a Dual Enrollment Psychology class. Government students recently took a portion of the citizenship test as a pretest for the semester. His class will be focusing on investigating the founding principles that guided the establishment of the U.S. Government as well as analyzing civil rights and liberties granted to U.S. citizens. Mr. Bullchild is teaching United State History and Blackfeet History. His class is exploring key events, defining moments and unique individual contributions that have shaped the nation.

<u>Music</u>

The music department is offering your student a performance-based discipline, which effective learning occurs through creating, performing, responding and connecting through artistic ideas. The skills that are developed include math/science, reading/analyzing, listening/observing, performing, singing, using musical instruments, movement, acting, playing, responding, composing, and creating. Our overall music goal is to align our teaching to correlate with the Montana Music Concept Standards. We want to give our students a memorable music experience, and to share their efforts and achievements with our community.

<u>Art</u>

In Art this semester we are focusing on Color Theory; Line, Value, Shape/Form, Color, Texture, Space; Focal Point/Emphasis, Pattern, Balance, Movement/Rhythm, Unity, Contrast; Art History & Criticism; and building connections, relationships, and class culture. For Graphic Design, students will be introduced to The Design Process - How to create a successful graphic design piece from start to finish: Step 1 - Define the Problem; Step 2 - Learning/Research; Step 3 - Generate Ideas. We are super excited for our students to start their creative journey!
