



## Michigan August 2018 Primary Elections Highlight

### It's Schuette V. Whitmer In November For Michigan's Governor

- Both candidates won landslide victories in their primaries, running past - in Mr. Schuette's case - allegations of violating state law barring political activity on state property and an increasing interest in a more progressive candidate - in Ms. Whitmer's case - among Democrats. Both won outright majorities in their primary races. With 92 percent of the vote counted, Ms. Whitmer had 51.56 percent of the votes cast, with 535,735, some 215,000 votes ahead of her nearest rival Dr. Abdul El-Sayed. On the Republican side, Mr. Schuette garnered 50.79 percent of the votes cast, 465,838 votes to Lt. Governor Brian Calley's 229,593 votes. And Democrats could take some cheer that Ms. Whitmer seemed to get both a bigger percentage and more total votes than Mr. Schuette (though such comparisons are meaningless when it comes to a general election campaign). Leading right from the beginning and winning counties across the state by margins that in some places were as much as 3-to-1 to her closest opponent, Gretchen Whitmer accomplished on Tuesday half the task she set for herself in January 2017 by winning the Democratic nomination for governor.

### John James Wins U.S. Senate Republican Primary

- Detroit-area businessman and Iraq War veteran John James (who was endorsed by President Donald Trump) defeated Sandy Pensler to win the Republican nomination to run against Democratic Sen. Debbie Stabenow this fall. Stabenow, who was unopposed in the Democratic primary, was first elected to represent Michigan in the U.S. Senate in 2000. Polls have suggested that Stabenow is in a strong position to hold on to the seat for now and the Cook Political Report, which handicaps races, has the outcome in November currently listed as "likely Democrat."

### Former State Rep. Rashida Tlaib to Win Congressman Conyers Seat

- Former state Rep. Rashida Tlaib appears to be headed for a victory over Detroit City Council President Brenda Jones Wednesday morning in a tight race to replace former U.S. Rep. John Conyers. With 96% of votes reported, Tlaib appears to have narrowly beaten Jones, making her the assumed Democratic candidate for the 13th congressional district. She is likely to face Republican David Dudenhofer, who didn't make the party's ballot but who was running as a write-in candidate. Historically speaking, the seat is likely to go to the democrat in November.

### Knezek Upset Expected to Send Little-Known Betty Jean Alexander to Michigan Senate

- Unofficial results from Wayne County for the 5th Senate District Democratic primary with all precincts reporting Wednesday morning had little-known candidate Betty Jean Alexander taking 53.8 percent of the vote, defeating incumbent Democrat Sen. David Knezek who earned 44.9 percent. Little is known about Ms. Alexander, a Detroit resident who had received a reporting waiver for campaign finances and had no plans to raise or spend \$1,000 on the race. She has no campaign website, social media presence or even any photos or biographical information available online.

### Voters OK 94% Of Local Ballot Props, 88% Approval of New Money Asks

- Voters across the state were largely OK with the tax proposals on their ballots Tuesday, approving 94 percent of the 848 local proposals, including 88 percent of the new or increased money asks. Renewal proposals did as well as they typically do - a 97 percent approval rate, or 536 of the 548 total, with 5 proposal results still outstanding. Fire and emergency services-related questions were the most common category on local ballots, and 96 percent of those were approved, with 5 proposals still outstanding. As for roads proposals, 161 of the 169 questions were approved, or 95 percent, with 1 outstanding. And police-related proposals were approved 96 percent of the time, with 1 still pending. School proposals were approved at a 92 percent rate, or 88 of the 95 proposals, with 1 result still outstanding. On the big money asks, voters OKed the \$107 million bond for Traverse City Area Public Schools, and the public delivered on a \$32 million bonding ask from Haslett Public Schools.

## All 29 Snyder Judge Appointments Clear Primary

- Only four of the 29 Gov. Rick Snyder-appointed Michigan judges -- excluding two Supreme Court justices -- who appeared on the ballot for the first time faced challengers in the primary elections today. The largest field of candidates was the 36th District Court bench in Wayne County where Snyder appointees Judges Christopher Blount and Aliyah Sabree are two of 12 candidates seeking 11 judgeships.

## Winners - US House Seats

With several members of congress retiring and equally mobilized political bases, campaigns for Michigan's congressional seats saw contested primaries and tough races.

- Democrat **Matt Morgan** will be on the ballot to face incumbent Republican **U.S. Rep. Jack Bergman** in November's general election for Michigan's 1<sup>st</sup> congressional district. According to Morgan's campaign, unofficial vote counts from 20 counties in the 32-county district indicate there were 20,000-plus write-in votes cast in his name for the Democratic race for Congress. Morgan is the only candidate running as a write-in.
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. Bill Huizenga**, and Democratic challenger **Rob Davidson**, an emergency room physician from Spring Lake, both ran unopposed in their respective primaries. They're headed for a matchup on the general election ballot in November. Davidson initially got into the race to challenge Huizenga's disapproval of the Affordable Care Act and has leaned on his experience as a physician throughout his campaign
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. Justin Amash** ran unopposed in the Republican primary for the 3rd Congressional District. **Cathy Albro**, a former teacher and small business owner, edged out a local minister to win the Democratic primary. The general election race will also have an independent candidate, **Douglas Smith**.
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. John Moolenaar** ran unopposed in this year's Republican nomination for Michigan's 4<sup>th</sup> congressional district, which historically leans Republican. In the contested Democratic primary, **Jerry Hilliard** was called the winner.
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. Dan Kildee** ran unopposed in the Democratic primary for Michigan's 5<sup>th</sup> congressional seat, which he has held since 2012. In the Republican primary, Drain Commissioner **Travis Wines**, ran unopposed.
- The Republican primary for Michigan's 6<sup>th</sup> congressional district was similar to elections past, with longtime incumbent **U.S. Rep. Fred Upton**, running unopposed. The Democratic primary was a competitive four-way race, with former YMCA national health officer **Matt Longjohn** emerging as victor.
- In the Republican primary for Michigan's 7<sup>th</sup> congressional district, incumbent **U.S. Rep. Tim Walberg** ran unopposed. He will be facing former state Rep. **Gretchen Driskell** in November, who ran against Walberg in 2016 and lost.
- Incumbent Republican **U.S. Rep. Mike Bishop** defeated his primary challenger in Michigan's 8<sup>th</sup> congressional district. In the Democratic primary, former U.S. State Department and Department of Defense official **Elissa Slotkin** defeated Michigan State University professor Chris Smith. The race in November is considered highly competitive.
- Democrat **Andy Levin** won his primary to fill retiring U.S. Rep Sandy Levin's seat in Michigan's 9<sup>th</sup> congressional district. Levin will face Republican **Candius Stearns** in the general election, who ran unopposed in the Republican primary, and Green Party candidate **John McDermott**.
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. Paul Mitchell** ran unopposed in the Republican primary for Michigan's 10<sup>th</sup> congressional district. **Kimberly Bizon** won her three-way Democratic primary to join independent candidate **Jeremy Peruski** and Green Party candidate **Harley Mikkelsen** in taking on Mitchell in November.
- In the five-way Republican primary, businesswoman **Lena Epstein** was declared the victor in Michigan's 11<sup>th</sup> congressional district. Clinton-endorsed **Haley Stevens** was declared the Democrat winner. The seat is being vacated by Republican **U.S. Rep. Dave Trott**, at the end of the term.
- Incumbent **U.S. Rep. Debbie Dingell** ran unopposed in Michigan's 12<sup>th</sup> congressional district Democratic primary, and Republican **Jeff Jones** also ran unopposed. They will face off in the November general election, along with Green Party candidate **Steve Young**.
- The six-way Democratic primary in Michigan's 13th congressional district was a race to replace former

**U.S. Rep. John Conyers Jr.** Former state Rep. **Rashida Tlaib** was declared the winner and will also serve out the remainder of Conyer's term.

- **Incumbent U.S. Rep. Brenda Jones** ran unopposed in Michigan's 14th congressional district Democratic primary. She will face Republican **Marc Herschfus** in the general election, who also ran unopposed.

## Winners - State Legislature

All 148 of Michigan's legislative seats are up for reelection this November. Currently, the MI House GOP has a nine-seat advantage, but due to and expected increase in Democrat votes this November, this may not be the case. Minority leader **Rep. Sam Singh** is termed out with numerous Democrats vying for his position.

In the MI Senate, the GOP is expected to maintain a majority, potentially losing 2-5 seats. The new Majority Leader is expected to be **Sen. Mike Shirkey**, with Minority Leader **Sen. Jim Ananich** likely to be reelected into that role.

The following races are of note:

## Michigan House

- 2<sup>nd</sup> District: Democrat **Joe Tate** will go on to face Republican **John Palfy** in November. This seat is expected to go to Tate, who won in a seven-way Democratic primary.
- 11<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent Democrat **Rep. Jewell Jones** will return for his second term in the 11th House District after defeating Garden City Mayor Randy Walker, who was running a serious primary challenge, in yesterday's election. He will go on to face Republican **James Townsend** in November.
- 17<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent Republican **Rep. Joe Bellino** will face Democrat Clerk-Treasurer **Michelle Lavoy** in November.
- 40<sup>th</sup> District: Republican **David Wolkinson** won a six-way primary for this open seat. Democrat **Mari Manoogian** won her primary, for the opportunity to turn this seat.
- 41<sup>st</sup> District: Republican **Doug Tietz** won a three-way primary to face uncontested Democrat **Padma Kuppa**. This district has potential to switch from Republican to Democrat.
- 62<sup>nd</sup> District: With Republican Rep. John Bizon termed out, **Dave Morgan** ran uncontested for the Republican nomination. He has been endorsed by House Speaker Tom Leonard and will be facing **Jim Haadsma** in November.
- 71<sup>st</sup> District: **Christine Barns** won in a contested four-way Republican primary to face Democrat **Angela Witwer** in November.
- 76<sup>th</sup> District: Termed out Democrat Rep. Winnie Brinks endorsed her successor as **Rachel Hood**. She will face Republican **Amanda Brand** in November.
- 85<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent Republican **Rep. Ben Frederick** will be facing Democrat **Eric Sabin** in November.
- 91<sup>st</sup> District: Termed out Republican Rep. Holly Hughes endorsed her successor as **Greg VanWoerkom**, a former district director for U.S. Rep. Bill Huizenga. He will be facing Democrat **Tanya Cabala**.
- 108<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent Republican **Rep. Beau LaFave**, who won on slim margins in 2016, will again be facing union-backed Democrat **Bob Romps** in November.

## Michigan Senate

- 4<sup>th</sup> District: Democrat **Marshall Bullock** defeated Rep. Fred Durhal to cinch the Democrat nomination. He will likely go on to defeat Republican **Angela Savino** for the seat currently held by Sen. Ian Conyers.
- 5<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent Democrat Sen. David Knezek has been ousted by little-known challenger **Betty Jean Alexander**. This upset victory will lead her to face Republican **DeShawn Wilkins** in November.
- 6<sup>th</sup> District: Democrat **Rep. Erica Geiss** won her primary to face Republican **Brenda Jones** in November.
- 10<sup>th</sup> District: Republican **Michael MacDonald** won a contested primary to face Democratic **Rep. Henry Yanez** in November. The seat is expected to remain Republican.
- 12<sup>th</sup> District: Republican **Rep. Mike McCready** narrowly defeated Rep. Jim Tedder in a four-way primary to take the Republican nomination. He will be facing Democrat **Rosemary Bayer** in November. The seat is expected to go Republican.
- 16<sup>th</sup> District: Incumbent **Sen. Mike Shirkey** defeated his primary opponent to cinch the Republican nomination. He will face Democrat **Val Cochran Toops** in November and is expected to win.
- 26<sup>th</sup> District: Former Rep. **Aric Nesbitt** won a three-way Republican primary to face Democrat **Garnett Lewis** in November. Nesbitt is favored to win.
