





We are pleased to announce that based on the 22-23 summative testing results, LISA Academy has demonstrated exceptional academic performance. Our district now exhibits one school with an A rating, four schools with a B rating, three schools with a C rating, and two schools with a D rating. The Office for Education Policy (OEP) at the University of Arkansas recognized LISA North Middle, LISA Springdale and LISA Rogers-Bentonville Middle Schools for their ongoing growth scores on the most recent ACT Aspire testing. Additionally, they recognized LISA Springdale for being more effective at getting better results for economically disadvantaged students than the rest of the state, and the difference in achievement between economically disadvantaged students and others was smaller than this difference statewide. These recognitions are considered the best indicator of the positive impact our schools are having on our students.

Demographic Achievement on ESSA '23







NWEA MAP Analysis






NWEA fall to winter 22-23' 3rd grade as compared to 23-24' 4th grade








NWEA fall to winter 22-23' 4th grade as compared to 23-24' 5th grade






