Subject: Certification of Provision of Instructional Materials 2026-2027

Background Information:

- [HB 1605](#) was passed during the 88th Texas Legislature (Regular Session) and established an expanded process for the State Board of Education (SBOE) to approve high-quality instructional materials (HQIM), increased funding for HQIM, supported parent transparency with instructional materials, created clear teacher protection guidelines for planning time, and provided new requirements for Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) review and revision.
- HB 1605 allocated more funds to the [Instructional Materials and Technology Allotment \(IMTA\)](#). IMTA was created during the 82nd Texas Legislature, First Called Session, 2011, which created an Instructional Materials and Technology Allotment (IMTA) (formerly IMA) for the purchase of instructional materials, technological equipment, and technology-related services.
- Since the creation of the Instructional Materials Allotment allowed districts greater flexibility in the types of instructional materials purchased for students, the requirement was created that each school district annually would certify that instructional materials collectively cover all elements of the (TEKS) for the required curriculum (Texas Education Code [§28.002](#)).
- In accordance with [TEC 31.1011](#), school districts and charter schools are required to certify annually to the State Board of Education (SBOE) and the Commissioner that students have access to instructional materials covering all the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for all required subjects, except physical education.
- Districts are required to certify that they protect against access to obscene or harmful content in compliance with the requirements for certification under (i) [Children's Internet Protection Act \(Pub. L. No. 106-554\)](#); (ii) Section [28.0022](#); (iii) Section [43.22](#), Penal Code; and (iv) any other law or regulation that protects students from obscene or harmful content.
- Since Lewisville ISD consistently conducts an instructional materials selection process when the state issues proclamations for state adoptions, this ensures access to state-adopted materials that align with the TEKS for the courses and subject areas in the required curriculum.
- Additionally, through a partnership with the Purchasing Department, processes and

procedures are in place to support campuses in acquiring supplemental materials that align with the TEKS. Supplemental instructional materials help teachers differentiate for the needs of English language learners, special education students, and gifted students to ensure mastery of the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). LISD teachers will be able to utilize these supplemental materials in teaching the LISD curriculum and state standards.

Administrative Consideration:

- Instructional materials cannot be ordered for the 2026-2027 school year until the Board of Trustees approves the Certification of Provision of Instructional Materials.
- TEA requires the Board's approval before materials can be purchased through the state's online instructional materials ordering system, Educational Materials System (EMAT).
- The legislature appropriated IMTA funds to purchase materials for the 2025-2027 school years.

Recommendations:

- Staff recommends approval of the Certification of Provision of Instructional Materials for the 2026-2027 school year.

Timeline/Report:

- The state online instructional materials ordering system (EMAT) will close for annual maintenance on March 31, 2026, with a scheduled reopening to occur in mid-May 2026.
