School Bus Safety

- 1. ALWAYS remain seated.

A Family's Guide to the "What" and "Why" of Assessments



DIBELS are...

Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills,

measures designed to quickly and efficiently assess reading and pre-reading skills in Kindergarten through Sixth Grade.

DIBELS is administered 3x a year. The majority of the assessment is given one-on-one and students respond verbally. It only takes a couple of minutes for each student.



STAR™ STAR Readin tered school-w computerized.

STAR Reading and Math tests are administered school-wide 3x a year. The tests are computerized.

WHY? We use the information to tailor instruction to each learner's individual needs. Students who need help with specific skills will be given small group help to target the skills necessary for them to read on grade level. We use the information gathered from DIBELS to make sure ALL students are getting the instruction and help needed to continuously improve.

September is Head Lice Prevention Month

Three Rivers School District has a "No Nit" policy. If your child has nits or lice, they must stay home until treated. They may return to class after passing a head check the front office.

Prevention & Control

- Avoid head-to-head (hair-to-hair) contact
- Do not share clothing such as hats, scarves, coats, sports uniforms, hair ribbons, or barrettes.
- Do not share combs, brushes, or towels. Disinfest combs and brushes used by an infested person by soaking them in hot water (at least 130°F) for 5–10 minutes.
- Do not lie on beds, couches, pillows, carpets, or stuffed animals that have recently been in contact with an infested person.
- Machine wash and dry clothing, bed linens, and other items that an infested person wore or used during the 2 days before treatment using the hot water (130°F) laundry cycle and the high heat drying cycle. Clothing and items that are not washable can be dry-cleaned OR sealed in a plastic bag and stored for 2 weeks.
- Vacuum the floor and furniture, particularly where the infested person sat or lay. However, spending much time and money on housecleaning activities is not necessary to avoid re-infestation by lice or nits that may have fallen off the head or crawled onto furniture or clothing.
- Do not use fumigant sprays or fogs; they are not necessary to control head lice and can be toxic if inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

We recommend checking your child's hair/head regularly. Head lice are easier to control when found early.
