





Why a Local Option?



- Stabilize school funding providing local revenue of up to \$3.5 million a year for 5 years
- Lower and maintain class size, keep vital programs, add essential support for students

Parkrose: A Recent History of Budget Reductions

2010-2011: Pay Freeze and 10 furlough days, cut MS Athletics, Elementary PE

2011-2012: Pay freeze and 10 furlough days

2012-2013: 5 furlough days

2013-2014: 5 furlough days

2015-2018: No cuts

2018-2019: \$1,483,000 and 5 furlough days

2019-2020: \$1,700,000 4 teachers cut, 8 non teaching staff cut

2020-2021: No cuts due to COVID 19 - Emergency Relief

2021-2022: \$1,500,000- Used ESSER

2022-2023: \$1,806,732, 4 teaching positions cut, 5 non-teach positions

cut/ESSER

2023-2024: \$3,000,000, \$1,000,000 in savings, \$1,000,000 transferred, SIA

Our Reality



5 of last 6 years our school budget has faced a deficit and we've made reductions to programs and staff

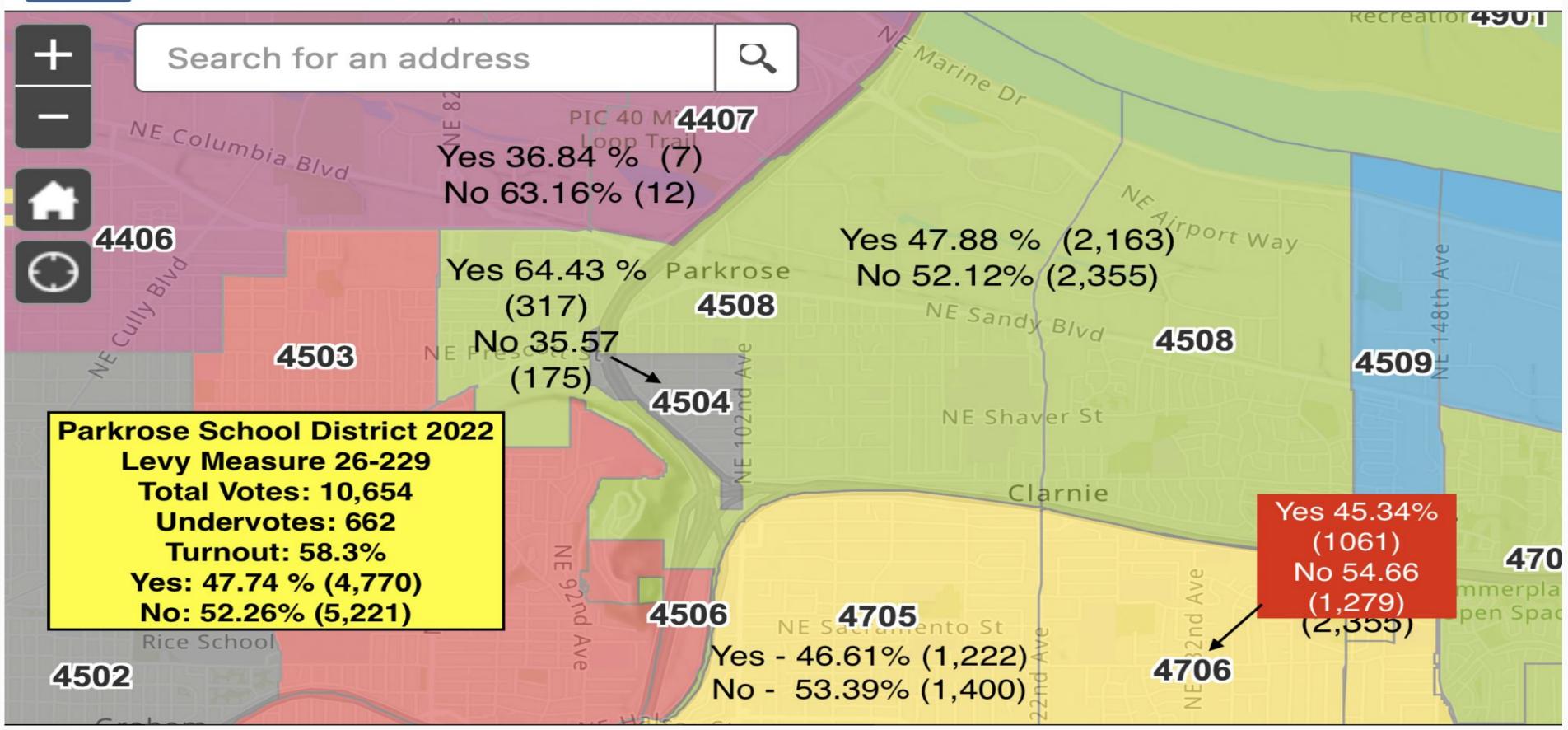

What are the risks?

- A \$3,000,000 deficit without use of one time funds results in these potential outcomes:
- 24 teaching positions (8 at HS, 7 at MS, Each elementary lose a minimum of 2) OR
- o 40 classified positions OR
- Eliminate programs MS Sports: \$125,000, Art
 Programs: \$250,000, Music Programs: \$800,000
- Reduction in teaching positions results in higher class sizes and less support for classrooms (Special Ed., EL, Mentoring)

Strategy for Information Campaign

- District Messaging about the upcoming Local Option
 - **Key facts:** 3 to 4 million in potential cuts next school year that could result in staffing cuts and cut days
 - A Local Option would provide approximately 3.5 million in revenue directly to Parkrose to maintain class size, provide additional support for Kindergarten, offer new electives that support student college and career readiness. Maintain existing extracurricular programs.
 - A \$1.25 per \$1,000 has an approximate impact of \$175-\$300 a year on a single family home. A \$150,000 assessed value is \$187 a year, and \$200,000 totals \$250 a year. This in turn provides up to 24 staff in Parkrose.

Strategy for Information Campaign

What does this do for Elementary

- Elementary: Prescott to 13 classroom teachers (At 12 now), Sacramento (Stay at 12 or add 1, depending on enrollment), Russell (Stay at 13 or add 1), Shaver (Stay at 13, or add 1)
- Additional staff to consider: Counselors, Social Workers, Paraprofessionals for all Kindergarten Classes, Suggested cap of 20 per Kindergarten
- Reductions would include cuts to classroom staff

Strategy for Information Campaign



What does this do for Secondary?

- Lower class size in core classrooms (Math, Science, LA, Social Sciences
- Broaden offering of elective classes, increase career technical opportunities
- Increase counseling support

What's Needed?



- Need a team of committed patrons to meet and discuss community based campaign to promote the ballot title
 - A non-school district location to organize and discuss fundraising. We need an organizer (Parents, Board, Staff, and Students)
 - Raise money for a campaign to promote once it's on the ballot
 - Campaign strategy to communicate the need and ensure we are addressing the questions from our community.
