# W-E-M BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES REGULAR MEETING Monday, October 27, 2025, 6:30 p.m.

The WEM Board of Education met in regular session on Monday, October 27, 2025 at the Waterville Building. The meeting was called to order by Board Chair Gary Michael at 6:30 p.m.

Board Members Gary Michael, June Rezac, Jon Bakken, Jay Schneider, Brenda Heuss, Troy Tolzman, Jeff Stangler, Grace Bartz, and Jocelyn Brown attended the meeting. Also present at the meeting was Superintendent Mark Winter and Business Manager Margaret Jewison.

Motion by Schneider and seconded by Heuss to approve the agenda with the elimination of one item. Seven members voted in favor - motion declared passed.

Motion by Rezac and seconded by Stangler to approve the Regular Meeting Minutes from September 22 meeting. Seven members voted in favor - motion declared passed.

Motion by Bakken and seconded by Schneider to approve the September-October Financial Report. The bills and payroll from the report were \$2,694,810.48, deposits were \$1,229,767.86, and transfers of \$2,810,000.00. Comments included a payment of \$72,500 to Met-Con Construction, Inc. for bathroom grant construction from the State of Minnesota, the changing of descriptions on three payments to football officials, and the acknowledgment of state aide payments.

Motion by Bakken and seconded by Rezac to Designate Authorized Users and Signers
The Superintendent and Business Manager, currently Mark Winter and Margaret Jewison, are
authorized users for all district accounts at the official district depositories and have discretion to
designate one responsible employee as an additional authorized user on each account to assist in the
day-to-day district operations, currently Jeanne Morsching, Administrative Assistant, at Frandsen Bank, in
Waterville, and Carridy Nelson, Administrative Assistant, at Lake Country Community Bank, in
Morristown.

Additionally, authorized signers for check writing purposes will be the Board Chair, Board Treasurer, and Board Clerk for the district checking account, currently Gary Michael, Chair, Jon Bakken, Treasurer, and Jay Schneider, Clerk.

Seven member voted in favor - motion declared passed.

# **VISITOR COMMENTS**

There were three individuals who took part in the open forum portion of the meeting. They were Tim Flaten, Nancy Velzke, and Melanie Hopman.

All three discussed the Morristown building closure. Hopman presented a petition which had 420 signatures with concerns about the closure and subsequent potential sale of the building.

We have had a great start to the year! Here are a few updates from the Middle School:

- PBIS Rockstar Student Assemblies: Rockstar Student of the Month assemblies are back, and our school spirit is stronger than ever! These assemblies are a special way for us to recognize outstanding students who go above and beyond in showing kindness, leadership, and responsibility. After the recognitions, we keep the fun going with a friendly staff vs. student competition. Last year, the teachers claimed the overall crown in the year-long series, but the students kicked off this year with a big win in September during a game of "Cup Toss and Catch." We love celebrating our awesome students and seeing the entire school come together to cheer them on!
- Two Special Education Teachers: Having two full-time special education teachers at the middle school has made a tremendous difference for both staff and students. - Safe and Secure: This fall, we made important updates to our before and after school procedures, as well as our SACC drop-off and pick-up routines, to ensure our building isas safe and secure as possible. Families have been very supportive of the changes and appreciative of the added focus on student safety. We also began utilizing the cafeteria after school to house our late bus riders rather than having them wait in the entryway. This adjustment has greatly improved supervision, reduced behavioral issues, and created a calmer, more organized environment to end the school day.

WEM Senior High Principal Brandon Tagg submitted the following report.

I can't tell you what a breath of fresh air it was to see Homecoming Week at WEM High School. From the "Meet the Candidates" Monday to Homecoming Volleyball Night to lunch kick-ball tournament to the Friday day of float making/door decorating, it brought me back to my own high school days where all students participated in the dress up days, celebrated each other's events and shown an overall excitement about their school and being a Buccaneer!

It wasn't a couple of days and we were at conference week where we connected with kids about the halfway point of grades and making sure all were on track to pass the classes we had started just four weeks ago.

Great student meetings in the early part of the week with parent conferences towards the end made this a successful week of expectations and progress coming together. With a football/volleyball conflict, conferences were not attended very well, but for those that did show up, we had great discussions and hope that students would work hard to get grades up or stay the same. We will see as the quarter continues.

MEA week was then upon us and a nice short week was enjoyed by all. Upperclassmen were discussing schools they were going to visit over the break and underclassmen discussed how they were going to sleep in for the first time in months. As breaks usually do, it came at the perfect time for all and enjoyed by most. With Halloween/Quarter 1 ending in a few days, we are excited to see what next quarter brings and hoping we have all learned something this first time around. Personally, I have learned a ton and hope that our year will continue on this positive journey.

We recently reported to MDE about our A & I grant. We had three goals to accomplish in a three year span. Our first goal was to improve ACT test scores from a 19.8 in 2023 to a 22.0 by June 30, 2026. We did not meet our goal or even our baseline by students scoring a composite score of 17 in 2023 and that lowering to a composite score of 16.7 last year. We are going to monitor what we do for ACT prep, work with this year's juniors to come up with a plan to make sure that scores improve in some fashion and build into our school day, a way to assist these students in preparing for and accomplishing a goal of doing well for college prep.

Our second goal was to raise the students' feelings of being safe at school, from the 81% baseline to a 100%

in the three-year span. From the School Perspectives survey given last year, it looked like 85% of the students did feel safe at school. Even though we are moving in the right direction, we are not gaining as many percentage points as we need to meet the goal. It is something I would like to find out from our student body, but feel school board approval would need to be agreed upon for a survey to be sent out to students.

Finally, our third goal was to hire and maintain a staff with some diversity going from 3% to 5% by the next school year. It was told to me that we have had a couple of part-time employees with a diverse background a few years ago, but they have since left the district with no new employees making up this category for us. We will continue to monitor applications and promote a culture of diversity allowing all types of staff to be hired across the district.
