# **Spring Play - Treasure Island**

Over 40 students showed up for auditions for our spring play, Treasure Island. This is the most auditioning in spring since before the pandemic. A lot of the rise in interest is due to students who have participated in the middle school play taking interest in continuing with theatre. As one student put it regarding theatre, "...it helped me grow and actually find people that suit who I am and can bond with non-stop." It is truly a community of like-minded people. Twenty-one students were cast in the show with Isaac Ryder assigned as Student Director and Jacob Bull assigned as Student Tech Director. Twenty-six additional students were signed in as tech build crew for the show. Ten students were assigned to the run crew from this group. As a run crew they dressed as pirates and helped with scene changes by singing old sea shanties as they moved the set. In the booth working with the sound board were Emily DeWolff and Olivia Stoopes, and at the recently donated light board were Jojo Nosbush and Kylie Kelm. Stage manager Britt Drennan and assistant manager Margot Miller were also working in the booth. The cast represented all grade levels including seven seniors: Kadin Anderson as Long John Silver, Olivia Benson as Job Anderson, Maddy Benzer as Joan the Goat, Neve Elo as Dr. Leversey, Franklin Groth as George Badger, Merridew Knoel as Israel Hands, and Olivia Telecky as Red Ruth. ### **Mock Trial**

This year marks the youngest varsity team that I have coached, replacing last year's team as the youngest that I have coached. We had one returning varsity member, Elizabeth Bolin. She was also the only four-year member of Mock Trial this year. We also welcomed senior Jessy Huerta Jarquin up from the JV team. We graduated six seniors the previous year, and we say goodbye to Jessy and Elizabeth this year. They will be missed, as they are very strong assets to the team.

This year saw less committed interest than last season. There were originally 32 team members, but some struggled to commit, and others had scheduling conflicts that did not allow them to continue. We managed with two teams instead of two. Two teams is typical, as we have only seen three seasons with three teams in the 14 years I have been coaching. Two teams versus three gives us a little bit less of a strategic advantage, as we are not able to see as many teams, and practice as many theories of the case during the season.

This year's case was a criminal case. The prosecution was the state suing a business for alleged dumping of a toxic chemical from their printing factory into a local river. The chemical in question, a made-up substance known as jaundithium, is not naturally occurring, and is a forever chemical. The defense argued that it was impossible to determine the exact source of the chemical, as there are two printing plants on the same river who both use the same chemical. The competition this year was in a hybrid format. Half of our trial competitions during region play were in person, and the other half in an online format. This was due to a continued backlog of court cases, and little availability of courtroom space. For the fourth season BHS was placed in the Greater MN Super Region, comprising of 20 teams, BHS making up two (2) of those 20. Mock Trial is unique in that during competition, there is no difference between V and JV. All teams are competing together in the region, regardless of varsity or junior varsity status. Both Buffalo teams performed well, but not as well as we had hoped. The varsity team finished 8th overall, and the junior varsity team placed 12th. The top six teams advance to the final round for the state competition. The top six teams in our

region this year were: Battle Lake, Morris, Apollo, Bemidji, Cambridge-Isanti, and Cloquet. The top three schools that advanced to the state competition were: Battle Lake, Bemidji, and Morris. This was the first appearance at the state competition for both Battle Lake and Bemidji.

The coaches and I agreed that this season was a challenge due to some of the commitment issues we observed among some team members, as well as the fact that many were new, or only had one season of experience entering this season. I would especially like to thank our attorney coach Karen Wolff, who spent a lot of time with the teams this season to help them through the challenges. Karen is an invaluable member of this organization each year, and has been since the 2007 season. She volunteers her time, energy, and expertise, as well as a great sense of leadership and humor that allows this group to grow to their full potential each year.

## **Boys Hockey**

The boys hockey team had a successful 2023-2024 season. This year marked the 50th anniversary of Boys High School hockey in Buffalo. To celebrate we had a great Alumni get together in December to honor former players and coaches. Part of the celebration was a 50th anniversary team that included 20 former players and recognition to former coaches, parents, volunteers, and booster club members who have helped build Buffalo High School Hockey.

On the ice, the team was led by nine seniors including senior captains Max Varner, Eli Tiernan and Ethan Sladky. The team finished with an overall record of 10-17-1. We again played one of the toughest schedules in the state. (11th hardest according to the polls) The tough schedule helped us grow and get better as the year went on and helped us play in the section championship game for only the 2nd time in school history. Although we came up short it was a great experience. The communities of Buffalo and Annandale were very supportive with standing room only crowds for our playoff games.

All Lake Conference members were Max Varner and Eli Tiernan. We also had three players earn All-Conference Honorable Mention: Senior Gri Lind, Junior Harvy Ylitialo, and Sophomore Evan Hinnenkamp.

#### Wrestling

Asst Coaches: Jeff Granrud; Josh Lanners; Eli Riemer; Jonah Anderson, Jeff Granrud Sr. The Bison Wrestling season ended with Junior Ryan Babatz and Freshman Gabe Roehl qualifying for the MSHSL State Tournament. Both were nominated to be the 2024-25 team captains, along with Junior Marcus Boeckers and Sophomore Aiden Herbst. The team finished 3-14 overall in duals this season; going 1-5 in Lake Conference duals, beating Minnetonka at home.

Senior Jacobee Scherber surpassed both 50 and 75 win marks this season while enroute to a 28 win season. Three Bison wrestlers earned Lake Conference First Team Awards: Gabe Roehl, Aiden Herbst, Jacobee Scherber. Two wrestlers earned Lake Conference Honorable Mention Awards: Dylan Keeler and Ryan Babatz. Our 2023-24 Varsity Bison Wrestling Team earned a gold Academic award from MN Wrestling Coaches Association with a cumulative GPA of 3.76! We have a lot of momentum across all levels of our Bison Wrestling program, and I'm excited to be a part of our bright future. Go Bison Wrestling! Face the Storm!

#### **Buffalo Dance Team**

We continued to see increased scores in both jazz and high kick at each of our meets, finishing with season high scores. We also had a program high score in High-Kick. Both varsity and JV teams grew a lot and learned many new skills-- we are so excited to see the talent continue to grow in the coming seasons.

In addition to this, we also welcomed some new members to our coaching staff-former BDT dancer Kailee Jarland joined us as an assistant coach, and Mackenzie Ackerman, a new math teacher at BHS joined on leading our JV program. Some team highlights were our annual overnight meet. This season we chose to attend the New Prague invitational and spent the night at Shakopee. This event brings together all of the Lakes Conference teams for our final conference meet. At this event we were able to recognize conference seniors, as well as our two graduating members: Kailey Shaap and Josie Halderson.

Kailey Shaap and Amelia Pence were recognized as All-Conference dancers, while Amelia Hirman, Emma Zelinski and Rylee Tetrault were recognized as Honorable mention dancers at our Conference Finals event.

20 students participated in the One-Act Play program during the 2023-2024 season. \*\*\*The MSHSL only allows a competition ensemble of no more than 20 students.\*\*\*

Play selection is key to success in the competitive One-Act play arena. This year, director Tracy Hagstrom Durant selected the Triangle Factory Fire Project, another moving and educational piece of challenging theater that tells an important and painful true story in American history. This particular play stretched the students as theater producers and further prepared them to be educated, open-minded consumers of theater. The Triangle Factory Fire Project is a heartfelt look at loss.

The March 25, 1911, Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire in a New York City sweatshop was the worst industrial disaster to take place in New York prior to 9/11. The Triangle Factory Fire Project is a painful look into this event in American history that significantly impacted the world we live in today. The students (and director) learned so much through research, rehearsal and performance. Once again, the theatre students worked diligently and produced another winning show. Relationships were formed and

tremendous education took place. Although they missed a trip to the State Festival by one point...this experience was a GREAT SUCCESS!

## \*\*\*From HD\*\*\*

One of my most important education goals is to teach our students how to both win and lose with grace. I wish each school board member and administrator could witness our kids managing both of those opportunities. When the kids win, they are not haughty or arrogant but instead modest and humble. When they lose, they control their emotions and congratulate the winners. Regardless of the outcome of each competition, the entire ensemble (both actors and technicians) spend a great deal of time discussing, analyzing and learning from each play we saw. This is often the kids' favorite part of the One-Act Play experience. It certainly is mine.

Synopsis: The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire of 1911 took the lives of 146 workers, most of whom were young women immigrants between the ages of 13 and 23. This tragedy was among the worst industrial fires in New York City history, but its aftermath was even more shocking. Beyond the very dramatic human story, and the historical, political and social ramifications that resulted from this seminal event, the play explores the continuing modern-day concerns of corporate greed and responsibility and the moral and ethical issues surrounding the question. What is the value of a human life? The Triangle Factory Fire Project paints a heartbreakingly clear picture of a disastrous day in American history and explores the human toll such a tragedy takes on us all.

#### 2023-2024 Season Performance Record

Lakes Conference – The Lakes Conference does not have a One-Act Play Festival. Sub-Section 5AA – 1st place Section 5AA Finals – 2nd place - missed a trip to the State Festival by one point.
