Here is a space where Turner staff will offer families a glimpse into classroom activities, special projects, and important milestones, fostering collaboration and communication between home and school. This dedicated space allows parents to stay informed about their child's learning environment and the exciting developments taking place throughout the school.



K/1- Mrs. Goolish

Literacy: Students are continuing to work on knowing all our uppercase and lowercase letters along with the sounds. Students are working on words with syllables. They are still working with words that rhyme. While listening to a story they are answering wh questions.

Math: Students are showing 1:1 correspondence for numbers up to 20. They are also working with simple addition and subtraction problems. They have been introduced to coin names and values along with knowing we use money to buy things we need. Functional: We are working hard to show whole-body listening within the classroom and use the Zones of Regulation to help identify how others feel.



Kindergarten

Kindergarten students are continuing to work on letter names and sounds. In Spanish, they are working on reading short, two-syllable words with taught consonants and vowels. In English, they are working on reading and writing short CVC words (like "mat" or "pat"). Kindergarten students are working on identifying and writing numbers 0 to 10. Kindergarten students are working on counting out loud to 40 or above. We are working on following directions.



1st Grade

Literacy: First Grade is working on consonant digraphs and will begin long vowel sounds in English Language Arts. They are also studying animals. In Spanish students are working on consonant blends and syllable reading as well as the Social Studies unit on How We Help One Another Meet Their Needs (Wants and Needs).

Math: First Grade is working in Module 2 adding and subtracting through 20. We will finish this Module before Winter Break.



2nd Grade

Literacy: Students are learning about Ancient Greek Civilization with a continuation into Greek Myths.

Math: Students are learning about Place Value with and without Regrouping.



3rd Grade

Students completed their Amplify Unit on Human Body Systems. They worked on asking and answering questions as well as identifying the main ideas and key details. We have just begun a unit on Ancient Rome, where students are reading both legends and nonfiction texts about the Roman Empire. Through these readings, students are developing a greater understanding of close reading skills.

In math, the students have recently completed a unit on measurements. They worked on rounding, estimation, and time skills. The unit we are currently focusing on revolves around the properties of multiplication. Students are using the commutative, associative, and distributive properties to solve more complex multiplication problems.

In social studies, the students are learning more about how people can impact the world around them through our leadership unit.

Students are learning about leaders and activists around the world and are applying this to their own lives, identifying ways that they can be good leaders in their own communities.



4th Grade

4th Grade Literacy

Students are exploring nonfiction standards in the ARC Animal Lab.
Students are working on finishing their web pages!
Coming soon! Our 4th grade historians will read American historical fiction texts from different time periods and write their own Historical fiction narrative.

4th Grade Math

Students are working on Module 3: Multi-digit multiplication and division.

4th Grade Science

Students are working through the energy unit via hands-on experiences.

Coming soon! Students will learn about the state of Illinois and will complete a state project.



5th Grade

We are starting our ecology reading and writing unit. We are finishing math module one. We will continue working with division and multiplication with decimals in module 2. We will start our revolutions unit in social studies soon.



Art

Kindergarten- Practicing cutting and gluing by making turkey collages.

1st Grade- Practicing cutting, gluing, and mixing paint colors by making turkey collages.

2nd grade- Learning about patterns by creating turkey zentangles.3rd, 4th, 5th grade- Learning about art supply maintenance and care.



SEL/Health

K-2 Healthy Practices & Hygiene

Kindergarten, 1st, & 2nd graders are learning/reviewing how and why to wash our hands, brush our teeth, exercise, and get good sleep to stay healthy. **1st graders** are adding new information about making good food choices and keeping their hearts, lungs, muscles, and bones healthy. **2nd graders** are also learning there can be negative effects of poor hygiene including disease and illness.

3rd graders are learning to stay healthy by eating the proper balance of foods from the 5 food groups.

4th graders are developing an understanding of the circulatory and respiratory systems, and how these relate to keeping them healthy.

5th graders are learning the healthiest food sources to find the six essential nutrients.



Music

Kinder: We have been using the songs The Itsy Bitsy Spider and Row Row Row Your Boat to practice our Whispering, Speaking, Shouting, and Singing voices. We also have been practicing our high and low voices in following vocal pathway lines. Students have been exploring how to create their own vocal pathway lines as well! Students also learned how to be good audience members by showing respectful listening skills while the 3rd and 5th grade students performed in their music program on November 19th.

1st Grade: We are learning how to identify and perform Quarter notes and Quarter rests in music. Students composed Quarter note and Quarter Rest patterns on Thanksgiving Turkeys and we performed each pattern in class. Students also learned how to be good audience members by showing respectful listening skills while the 3rd and 5th grade students performed in their music program on November 19th. *Save the date-February 7th, 2025 will be the 1st and 4th grade music program at 2:00pm*

2nd Grade: Students are learning to identify and perform tied quarter notes, half notes and half rests. Students have been working on

identifying rhythm patterns based on Thanksgiving foods. Students did a scavenger hunt around the music room and then took the food rhythm words and made a food rhythm composition. Students also learned how to be a good audience members by showing respectful listening skills while the 3rd and 5th grade students performed in their music program on November 19th.

3rd Grade: Students did a fantastic job in preparing for their music program "Let's Go Camping" on November 19th. Students worked on how to transition in their groups by being able to get their own instruments and supplies on their own, move in their spaces or on the risers, and be able to perform their songs for the audiences. They also learned how to be a good audience member by showing respectful listening skills while other students were performing.

4th Grade:

We are learning about theme and variation, and how music can use a melody and change part of it to make a variation. Students even created their own variations of Caramel apples. We are working on performing and composing our sixteenth-note variation patterns by using animal rhythms. We explored how to play these rhythms on the tubano drums.

Students also learned how to be good audience members by showing respectful listening skills while the 3rd and 5th grade students performed in their music program on November 19th.

5th Grade: Students did a fantastic job in preparing for their music program "Let's Go Camping" on November 19th. Third Grade is working on alphabetical order to the first and second letter in preparation for learning more about Library location skills.

Fourth Grade read Balloons Over Broadway by Melissa Sweet in honor of National STEAM Day. We learned how Tony Sarg invented the balloons we see today in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade then used our VR headsets to view the studio where the balloons are made today.

Fifth Grade finished up their bookmarks and we are waiting for our 3D printers to be fixed so we can print them! We also reviewed how to find materials in the library catalog and place holds.
