1. Call to Order, Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance

Manuel Alcozer, Board President, called the regular meeting of the Belton Independent School District Board of Trustees to order at 6:15 p.m. He stated that a quorum of Board Members was present, that the meeting had been duly called, and that notice of the meeting had been posted in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act, Texas Government Code Chapter 551.

2. Recognitions

Student Pledges – Lakewood Elementary School

The evening's pledges were led by Lakewood Elementary students Adriana Durham, first grade, and Killian Rush, fifth grade.

Student Showcase – BHS Magic Belles

The evening's showcase highlighted the Belton High School Magic Belles dance team. Under the direction of Rachel Hill and assistant director McKenzie Urteaga, the team is led by Captain Payten McNeely and junior lieutenants Addison and McKenna Christopher. The Board celebrated the Magic Belles for their talent, dedication and trailblazing spirit.

Math Stars National Finalists

Belton ISD recognized five elementary students who were named National Math Star Finalists—one of the nation's most selective math enrichment honors. The students who earned this achievement were: Elizabeth D'Arcy, Giuliana Durham, and Aayana Jain (Lakewood Elementary), Roger Wilson III (James L. Burrell Elementary) and Rosalinn "Rosie" Canto (Sparta Elementary). From this group, Aayana and Rosie advanced further and were named National Math Stars, joining just over 100 students nationwide selected this year. The National Math Stars program is a rigorous 10-year initiative that provides up to \$100,000 in support through academic advising, tutoring, technology and enrichment opportunities to nurture long-term success in STEM fields.

Department Showcase - Fine Arts

The evening's department showcase celebrated Fine Arts in Belton ISD. At the secondary level, more than 4,450 students are enrolled in Fine Arts programs, while every elementary student has the opportunity to express themselves through music and art. These experiences give students a creative outlet, build confidence and foster a lifelong appreciation for the arts. Across 18 campuses, 80 inspiring Fine Arts educators bring art, music and performance to life each day. Their passion and expertise help students discover their talents, develop new skills and find joy

in creative expression. Leadership and vision are provided by Keith Zuehlke, while Julie Utley ensures that programs remain strong, coordinated and impactful across the district.

Community Partner – Lisa's Dance Connection

Since fall 2023, Melinda Kuntz of Lisa's Dance Connection has worked with the Magic Belles and LBHS Silver Spurs every other week on ballet technique. As the studio's lead ballet instructor—and mom to both a Magic Belle Officer and a Silver Spur Officer—she brings expertise and passion to her work with our students. The Board expressed gratitude to both Cara and Melinda for their dedication and the strong community partnerships that enrich fine arts in Belton ISD.

Community Partner – Pivot Performance Arts

Belton ISD proudly recognized two community partners who are making a difference for Belton ISD Fine Arts students: Pivot Performance Arts and Lisa's Dance Connection. Cara Janczak, owner of Pivot Performance Arts, has opened her studio to the Magic Belles for acro training and routine preparation, also providing access to a Marley floor as they get ready for the Dance Team Union Nationals in Orlando this February.

Senate Bill 12 parental rights resolution was discussed (covered earlier in the meeting), and the Senate Bill 10 requirement to display the Ten Commandments if donated, and the guidelines surrounding this change.

Board members expressed gratitude for district leadership's thoughtful and efficient work in implementing complex legislative changes from the 89th Legislative Session.

Dr. Malinda Golden shared several positive updates and observations across the District, focusing on student achievement, community involvement, and facility success.

Rucker Preston shared his attendance at sporting events, the Charter Oak garden ribbon cutting, and a Belton City Council meeting. Erin Bass expressed gratitude toward high school athletics and fine arts for including elementary and middle school students in high school activities.
