TITLE Graduation Requirements

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to set forth requirements for graduation from the school district.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

It is the policy of the school district that all students must pass the Minnesota Graduation Basic Standards tests or the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments Second Edition (MCA-II's) per state requirements or higher guidelines and must satisfactorily complete, as determined by the school district, all course credit requirements and graduation standards, as established by the school board, in order to graduate-must demonstrate, as determined by the school district, their satisfactory completion of the credit requirements and their understanding of academic standards. The school district must adopt graduation requirements that meet or exceed state graduation requirements established in rule or law.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Course eCredit" is equivalent to a student's successful completion of one semester of study or a student's mastery of the applicable subject matter, as determined by the school district.
- B. "Department" means the Department of Education.
- C. "Credit" means a unit measuring education achievement based on successfully completing the requirements of a given course of study.
- DB. "Section 504 Accommodation" means the defined appropriate accommodations or modifications that must be made in the school environment to address the needs of an individual student with disabilities.
- EC. "Individualized Education Program," or "IEP," means a written statement developed for a student eligible by law for special education and services.
- FD. "Limited English Proficient" or "LEP" Multilingual Learner or ML student means an individual whose first language is not English and whose test performance may be negatively impacted by lack of English language proficiency.
- E. Required standard a statewide adopted expectation for student learning in the content areas of language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, physical education, health, and the arts. Locally developed academic standards in health apply until statewide rules implementing health standards under Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.021, subdivision 3, are required to be implemented in the classroom.

IV. TEST ADMINISTRATOR

A Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment Teaching and Learning shall be named the school district test administrator. Said person shall be in charge of all test procedures. and shall bring recommendations to the school board annually for approval.

V. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

A. All students must satisfactorily complete, as determined by the school district, either the basic skills requirements for students enrolled in grade 8 before the 2005-2006 school year or the MCA-II's for students enrolled in grade 8 in the 2005-2006 school year.

BA Credit Requirements

Students beginning ninth grade in the 2004-2005 school year and later must successfully complete, as determined by the school district, the following high school level eourse credits for graduation:

- 1. Eight credits of language arts sufficient to satisfy all academic standards in English language arts;
- 2. Six credits of mathematics, encompassing at least algebra, geometry, statistics and probability sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in mathematics; or make successful progress through four years of math;
- 3. Six credits of science, including at least one—two credits to satisfy all the earth and space science standards for grades 9 through 12, two credits to satisfy all the life science standards for grades 9 through 12, and two credits to satisfy all the chemistry or physics standards for grades 9 through 12 in biology;
- 4. Eight credits of social studies, encompassing at least United States history, geography, government and citizenship in either grade 11 or 12 for students beginning in grade 9 in the 2025-2026 school year and later or an advanced placement, international baccalaureate, or other rigorous course on government and citizenship under Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.21, subdivision 1a, and a combination of other credits encompassing at least United States history, geography, government and citizenship, \(\frac{Ww}{W}\) orld history, and economics \(\frac{\text{or seven}}{\text{eredits}}\) of social studies, encompassing at least United States history, geography, government and eitizenship and world history, one one-half eredit of economics taught in a schools social studies or business department sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in social studies:
- 5. Two credits in the arts sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in the arts; two credits of physical education; and 2 credits of health; and;
- 6. One credit in physical education sufficient to satisfy the state standards in physical education;
- 7. One credit in health;
- 68. A minimum of twelve elective course credits.
- 9. Students who begin grade 9 in the 2024-2025 school year and later must successfully complete a course credit in personal finance in grade 10, 11, or 12.
- 7. Options for meeting graduation requirements

Waivers

Students who choose to take more rigorous course work in any particular subject area may waive a requirement in that area. Reasons for waiving a requirement might include scheduling difficulties. Students must have permission of the respective Department Chair and a counselor.

Health

Students who will be taking International Bacealaureate and Advanced Placement preparatory course work in 10th grade may take Health 10 in summer school instead of during the school year.

Physical Education

Students who will be taking International Bacealaureate and Advanced Placement preparatory course work in 10th grade may take P.E. 10 in summer school instead of during the school year.

B. Credit equivalencies

- 1. A one-half credit of economics taught in a school's agricultural, food, and natural resources education or business education program or department may fulfill a one-half credit in social studies if the credit is sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in economics.
- 2. An agriculture science or career and technical education credit may fulfill the elective science credit if the credit meets the state physical science, life science, earth and space science, chemistry, or physics academic standards, or a combination of these academic standards as approved by the school district. An agriculture or career and technical education credit may fulfill the credit in chemistry or physics academic standards as approved by the school district. A student must satisfy either all of the chemistry academic standards or all of the physics academic standards prior to graduation. An agriculture science or career and technical education credit may not fulfill the required biology credit.
- 3. A career and technical education credit may fulfill a math or arts credit requirement.
- 4. A computer science credit may fulfill a math credit requirement if the credit meets state academic standards in math.
- 5. An ethnic studies course may fulfill a social studies, language arts, arts, math, or science credit if the course meets the applicable state academic standards. An ethnic studies course may fulfill an elective credit if the course meets applicable local standards or other requirements.

[Note: Starting in the 2026-2027 school year, a high school must offer an ethnic studies course; in elementary and middle schools by the 2027-2028 school year.]

- C. All students must satisfactorily complete demonstrate their understanding of the following required Graduation Standards academic standards:
 - 1. Commencing with the 2003-2004 school year, all students entering the ninth grade must satisfactorily complete the following Minnesota Academic Standards, in accordance with the standards developed by the Department of Education:
 - a) Minnesota Academic Standards, Language Arts K-12 (2003);
 - b) Minnesota Academic Standards, Mathematics K-12-(2003);
 - c) Minnesota Academic Standards, Science K-12 (2004);
 - d) Minnesota Academic Standards, Social Studies K-12 (2004); and
 - e) Minnesota Academic Standards or locally developed standards, Arts K-12 (2003);
 - f) Minnesota Academic Standards, Physical Education; and
 - g) School District Standards in Health, Career and Technical Education; and World Languages.

VI. EARLY GRADUATION

Students may be considered for early graduation, as provided for within Minn. Stat. § 120B.07 upon meeting the following conditions:

A. All course or standards and credit requirements must be met.

VII. NOTICE

The school district will notify students and their parents of the school district's graduation requirements within 30 working days of a student's entry into ninth grade.
