## Southeastern Wisconsin Schools Alliance (SWSA)

Legislative Priority 1	Develop a comprehensive predictable and sustainable funding system for public school district students.
Background	Since 1993, public school districts faced mandated minimum salary increase (QEO) that effectively resulted in larger-than-inflation increases and an arbitration process that effectively neutralized any efforts to bring those costs down.
	Revenue limits were enacted in 1993 and tracked inflation for many years. This precedent was changed and increases were well below inflation for 2009-10 and 2010-11, prior to Act 10.
	Act 10 was enacted and eliminated both of these constraints and public school districts have aggressively utilized the tools provided.
	In the State of Wisconsin, revenues available to school districts have not kept pace with the rate of inflation for many years. Since Act 10, per pupil revenues available to <b>districts</b> continue to be significantly below the rate of inflation. Current law limits the increase in the total amount of revenue per pupil that a school district may receive from general school aids and local property taxes in any school year. During the 2015-17 budget, revenue limits remained flat with a 0% increase. Per pupil aid was added; however, the uncertainty of subsequent revenue makes it extremely difficult to budget and plan for future innovative opportunities for students.
	The result is that public school districts continue to face a structural deficit. This is not a <b>sustainable business model</b> for any organization.
Long term Goal	Create a more sustainable K-12 funding system to improve learning opportunities for students while protecting the taxpayer.
2017-19 Session Advocacy Goals	<ul> <li>a. Increase funding available for public schools by the Consumer Price Index in order to begin building a sustainable model.</li> <li>b. Provide an adjustment to school district resources with the goal to provide an additional \$200.00 / student in each year of the biennium. Adjustments could be accomplished by an increase in revenue limit authority along with an increase in aid to reduce the tax burden and/or increases in per pupil aid.</li> </ul>

Legislative Priority 2	Improve state support for the educational needs of students with disabilities.					
Background	Over the past 20 years, funding for special education has continued to decrease forcing school districts to use funds from the general fund to support students with disabilities. Today, school districts are reimbursed at a rate of XX% for students with disabilities.

Legislative Priority 3	Provide taxpayers with a transparent and valid accountability system for all publicly funded schools.					
Background	STATE CURRENT LAW- WORK IN PROGRESS					
Long term Goal	All publicly funded students should take the same assessments and results should be reported in the same manner. Transparency of information is critical for parents and taxpayers to make decisions about the quality of their schools and the use of taxpayer dollars.  Ultimately, we believe meaningful measures that guide improvements and the sharing of best practices across public education should be instituted.					
2017-19 Session Advocacy Goals	Continue to build upon the existing system to improve state report cards and the inclusion of all publicly funded students in all facets of the system.

Ensure that SWSA is part of the conversation as changes in accountability systems (or new report cards) are discussed.</li> <li>c. Legislative Priority 4	Develop framework for an Education Academy to serve as an educational tool for new and continuing legislators and staff.						
Background	There is a need for a biannual learning opportunity for elected officials and staff so they better understand K-12 finance and programming. School Functional and college/Caren Recolege.						
Long term Goal	50% of the legislative offices attend Education Academy at the beginning of each biennial budget cycle.

Action Steps	a. Monitor DPI and Governor Walker budget recommendations.  b. Understand concern regarding some of the proposals for screening for mental health (SBIRT).  c. Examine opportunities to coordinate with community grants.  d. Background	The political landscape is a primary factor in determining the priority level of a legislative proposal for most organizations. Often a topic that may have been at one priority level suddenly becomes a higher priority and vice versa. SWSA must be poised to respond to policy proposals as they are introduced during the legislative session. Some of these issues could include: teacher recruitment and retention; teacher licensure, open enrollment timeline; AP credits; mandate relief; summer school; Assembly GOP Forward Agenda; early childhood learning; and school safety, among others.					
Long term Goal  SWSA is invited to participate in the development of significant edupolicy before it is introduced and provides a timely response to edupolicy proposals as they are introduced during the legislative cycle.
