

FIRST READING OF SCHOOL BOARD POLICIES

POLICY ISSUE/SITUATION:

Attached are OSBA and BSD staff suggested changes presented for a first reading. The policies are:

- **IGBAJ** Special Education Free and Appropriate Public Education
- **JECA** Admission of Resident Students
- JHCCA Students HIB, HBV and AIDS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Departments are continuing to work to reach compliance of the policies pertinent to their areas. During this school year we will continue to present various sets of new policy changes for review.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the School Board review these first readings.

The Beaverton School District recognizes the diversity and worth of all individuals and groups. It is the policy of the Beaverton School District that there will be no discrimination or harassment of individuals or groups based on race, color, religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, national origin, marital status, age, veterans' status, genetic information or disability in any educational programs, activities or employment.

Special Education – Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)**

The District admits all resident school age children with disabilities and makes special education and related services available at no cost to those:

- a. Who have reached five years of age but have not yet reached 21 years of age on or before September 1 of the current school year, even if they have not failed or have not been retained in a course or grade or are advancing from grade to grade;
- b. Who have not graduated with a regular diploma;
- c. Who have been suspended or expelled in accordance with special education discipline provisions; or
- d. Who reach age 21 before the end of the school year. These students remain eligible until the end of the school year in which they reach 21.

The District determines residency in accordance with Oregon law.

The District takes steps to ensure that its children with disabilities have available to them the variety of educational programs and services available to non-disabled children in the area served by the District and provides a continuum of services to meet the individual special education needs of all resident children with disabilities, including resident and children with disabilities who are enrolled in district public charter schools located in the district.

State law prohibits the District from recommending to parents, or requiring a child to obtain, a prescription for medication to affect or alter thought processes, mood or behavior as a condition of attending school, receiving an evaluation to determine eligibility for early childhood special education or special education, or receiving special education services.

If a parent revokes consent for a student receiving special education and related services, the District will not be considered to be in violation of the requirement to make FAPE available to the student because of the failure to provide the student with further special education and related services.

Beaverton School District

Admission of Resident Students**

A student is considered to be a resident student if they reside permanently or continuously with a Parent or person in a parental relationship within the District attendance area. School age students between the ages of 5-19, who live within the District attendance area, attend school without paying tuition.

- 1. Residents over age 19 who have a diploma may be admitted with the approval of the Superintendent and upon payment of tuition at the rate established by the Board. Students who turn 19 years of age during the school year shall continue to be eligible for a free and appropriate public education for the remainder of the school year.
- 2. The District may admit otherwise eligible students who have not yet attained 21 years of age prior to the beginning of the current school year if they are receiving special education services <u>and</u> or if they have not earned a <u>regular</u> diploma; or age 21 if receiving special education services and have not yet received regular high school diploma. These students may attend school without paying tuition for the remainder of the school year
- 3. Students with disabilities voluntarily placed outside the home by their parent may continue to attend the school the student was attending prior to the placement as a district resident <u>based upon the</u> <u>factors set forth in ORS 339.134</u>. when the student's parent and school staff can demonstrate it is in the student's best interest.
- 4. The District will not deny school admission to students who have become residents and who are under expulsion from another school district for reasons other than a weapons policy violation. The District will place students appropriately. The District will uphold the conditions of expulsion for the designated time remaining for the expulsion.
- 5. The District shall deny for at least one calendar year from the date of the expulsion regular school admission to students who have become residents and who are under expulsion from another school district for a weapons policy violation. The Superintendent may modify the time period as warranted by circumstances.
- 6. The District will not provide alternative programs of instruction to students who are currently under expulsion for a weapons policy violation.

STUDENTS - HIV, and HBV and AIDS

This policy applies to students six years or older who are HIV or HBV* and are not special risk.

"Special risk" students as used in this policy and as defined by Oregon Department of Human Services, Health Services, means students who lack control of their body secretions or who display behaviors such as biting, spitting or scratching and/or who have uncoverable, oozing lesions.

The district will adhere strictly to policies and procedures in the Oregon Revised Statutes and the Oregon Administrative Rules as they relate to a student infected with HIV or HBV or diagnosed with AIDS¹.

The district recognizes a parent (student) has no obligation to inform the district of an HIV, or HBV or AIDS condition and that the student has a right to attend school.

If the district is informed <u>of such a student</u>, written guidelines shall be requested of the parent (student). These guidelines shall include who may have the information, who will give the information, how the information will be given and where and when the information will be given.

When informed of the infection, and with written permission from the parent (student), the district will develop procedures for formulating an evaluation team. The team shall address the nature, duration and severity of risk as well as any modification of activities. The team shall continue to monitor the student's condition.

Notification of alternative educational programs shall be made to the parent or eligible student, if an *the student diagnosed with* HIV, or HBV or AIDS student withdraws from school.

The district shall also develop procedures for rumor control, infection control, student accommodations and public relations/media.
