A-F System Refreshed



A-F is a tool to help meet continuously improved goals for all students

According to state law, the purpose of *A*-*F* accountability is:

- to continuously improve student performance
- eliminating achievement gaps based on race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status
- to ensure this state is a national leader in preparing students for postsecondary success.



Fostering a **culture that supports growth** and continuous improvement when this performance information is public is a difficult but **critical task for education leaders**.

The A-F system has stayed the same during the past 5 years, but statute requires updates to meet goals for students

- To help school leaders reflect on performance improvements, A-F cut points have remained unchanged since launched in 2017.
- But A-F indicators must be updated given statutory requirements guiding the goals of the system. 2023 is the year for those changes.



Evaluating performance will be different this year

- 2022 ratings and 2023 ratings are using different methodologies.
- Because of the *A-F* Refresh:
 - SY 2022-23 ratings will be based on a different set of rules than previous A-F ratings.
 - 2022 ratings and 2023 ratings cannot be compared side-by-side.
 - It is possible a campus with an A rating in 2022 may improve in 2023...
 - ...and yet receive a B rating.

It's not a simple apples-to-apples comparison this year.



In Fall 2023, TEA will publicly share "What If" ratings with 2023 ratings



- "What If" final versions of campus and district ratings from 2022, using the new A-F methodology will be shared alongside 2023 ratings in Fall 2023.
- This will allow board members, educators, parents and the public to get a sense of whether performance ratings issued in 2023 represent higher, lower, or similar performance as ratings issued in 2022 to support continuous improvement moving forward.

TEA will provide an **apples-to-apples comparison** of ratings under the refreshed cut points & methodology in Fall 2023.


Changes to the methodology

* District ratings are now calculated using a weighted average of campus ratings, as opposed to calculating the district as a single K-12 campus. This increases alignment of district ratings with campus ratings.

Domain Campuses*	Changes to methodology	
Domain 1- Student Achievement	No change for elementary and middle schools. High schools have increased standards for college, career, and military readiness and graduation rates. (CCMR)	
Domain 2 -Student Progress	No change in methodology. Continues to be best of Domain 2A or 2B.	
Domain 2A- Academic Growth	Updates methodology to capture growth for more students and includes learning acceleration. (HB4545)	
Domain 2B- Relative Performance	No change for elementary and middle schools. High school recalculated given recent improvements in college, career, and military readiness. (CCMR)	
Best of Domain 1 or Domain 2	No change in methodology. 70% of overall rating continues to be the best of Domain 1 and 2.	
Domain 3 Closing the Gaps	Includes more students with a minimum size of 10. Moves from a yes/no to a 0-4 methodology to improve differentiation. Tabulations now focus on just the student groups most in need. Aligned with updated long-term targets.	
Overall	If a school has <70 in 3 out of the 4 areas (Domain 1, Doman 2A, Domain 2B, Domain 3), the highest overall they can receive is a 69.*	

*This doesn't apply to dropout recovery schools or if Domain 1 is the one area with a score of 70+.

Preliminary ratings compared to 2022 statewide for context



- Applying the A-F Refresh methodology to 2021-22 performance causes some campus ratings to go up, some ratings to go down, and some ratings to remain unchanged.
- 575 campuses would have a higher preliminary rating than their actual 2022 final rating.



Note: The accountability manual is open for public comment until June 20, so "What If" ratings are preliminary.

- May 31: Preliminary "What If" ratings / communications resources released to districts via TEAL
- > May 31: EOC performance levels available to districts
- June 9: A–F Estimator released to districts

- Early September: Final 2023 Accountability Manual adopted into rule and appendices released
- Early September: 2023 A–F district communications toolkit (resources for communicating 2023 accountability ratings)
- September 26: 2023 A–F ratings released to districts via TEAL
 - September 28: 2023 A–F ratings released publicly (e.g., press release, <u>TXschools.gov</u>)

CCMR SCALING CHANGES

Domain I- CCMR is for High Schools only

Scaling of CCMR for 2023

TEA has proposed MAJOR change in scaling
From 2018 through 2022, a CCMR score of 60 scaled to a 90 (A)
For 2023, TEA has proposed that a CCMR score of an 88 will scale to a 90 (A)



GRADUATION RATE SCALING CHANGES

Domain I- Graduation Rate is for High Schools only

Scaling of Graduation Rate for 2023

- TEA has proposed a change in scaling
- From 2018 through 2022, a Grad rate of 96.0 scaled to a 90 (A)
- For 2023, TEA has proposed that a Grad rate of 98.0 scaled to a 90 (A)



Domain II - ACADEMIC GROWTH

- Academic Growth (Domain II-A) will be based on a new calculation (High & Low Approaches)
- Academic Growth will be based on
 - Annual Growth
 - 4545 Performance
- The overall Academic Growth score is then scaled to a number can be used on an A-F grading scale



What will it take to get an A for Academic Growth?

Changes Proposed for Domain III for 2023

- One-year change in calculation of EL Proficiency
- Reduce minimum size for each student group from 25 to 10
- For each campus type (elementary, middle, high school), establish separate sets of targets
- Change from a Yes/No methodology to awarding "gradated outcomes":
- Reduce the student groups evaluated to:
 - All Students
 - 2 Lowest Race/Ethnicity groups from prior year
 - Super Group (a.k.a. High Focus) EcoDis, SpEd, EB, Homeless, Migrant, Foster



A-F Accountability Highlights:

- For campuses, there are NO proposed changes to the BIG PICTURE
- A-F is still a strengths-based system
- There are NO proposed changes to how STAAR Performance is calculated
- The proposed change to the scaling of CCMR for high schools can be offset by Academic Growth
- For Domain I, TEA uses the BEST Grad Rate: 4-Year | 5-Year | 6-Year
- Academic Growth is now simpler to measure <u>AND</u> includes a 4545 bonus
- Relative performance continues to provide the opportunity to reevaluate performance for campuses with high needs (high EcoDis or AEA)
- Domain III will help focus Tier I instructional support for high needs students
