District Updates

- At tonight's board meeting, you will be asked to consider approving the sale of bonds for our LTFM projects at OEC/McKinley and the pool project at OMS. Additionally, you will be considering approving bids for the LTFM Indoor Air Quality project at primarily OEC and McKinley. These bids came in nearly \$400,000 under budget!
- ➤ You will also be asked to consider approving the 24-25 amended budget that was presented at our work session on March 10.
- The 2025-2026 school calendar will require some revision to accommodate additional READ Act training for staff and for the new math curriculum. October 20th and February 16th will become staff development days in lieu of student contact days.
- You will be receiving a separate document indicating the staff that are not being renewed as a reflection of our budget reductions that have been discussed and approved at the school board meeting in February.
- As a Governing Board member of AASA (National Superintendents Organization) we received word that the most recent congressional budget approval will provide no fiscal change to most of the federal funding that we receive in Owatonna. IDEA, Title I, Title IV-A funding will remain intact. Title II funding (class-size reduction and professional development) funding remains in limbo. I have penned a letter to our congressional delegation urging them to keep our funding in place as any further cuts would result in reduced programming and further teacher cuts.

- Now that the 24/25 Amended Budget has been completed, work has begun on the 25/26 budget.
- Payroll & Benefits Specialist Mallory Herman is leaving the district for another opportunity. We wish her well in this new endeavor.
- 2 positions are now posted Payroll & Benefits Specialist and Accounts Payable.
- The sale of general obligation facilities maintenance bonds is scheduled for Monday, March 24, 2025. Bids on the project funded by this bond issue came in lower than expected, so I am working with Ehlers and SiteLogiq to determine the exact amount of the bond issue.

- Our previous Youth Coordinator position has been reconfigured into 2 specialist positions; one for SAC and one for Youth Development. Our new SAC Program Specialist is Kayla Kummerfeldt and she will begin her leadership on March 31st. We are delighted to have her with the program. We had wonderful candidates for the position and look forward to the expertise and vision that Kayla will bring to the program.
- Our SAC sites remain full. We've grown a small wait list for 2 of our locations. We remained challenged keeping staff in place, with the Lincoln site again without a Site Supervisor, and no applicants for the posting.

- Summer program marketing has begun with a large array of programming for both youth and adults. Summer SAC begins registration on April 7th.
- The Adult Learning Center is anxiously awaiting announcement of the Integrated English Language and Civics Education grant award. The \$94,814 annual request is renewable for three-years beginning in FY'26. Funding will be used to underwrite innovative career pathway and language acquisition programming for adults acquiring English language skills and citizenship.

We recently made the decision on purchasing a new elementary LA resource; we are moving forward with Wit & Wisdom, one of the approved knowledge-based curricular resources through the state. We will be presenting this to the District Curriculum Advisory Committee in April. After research, looking at other resources, and doing site visits, Wit & Wisdom has the components we need to move our reading instruction forward. We are also in the midst of looking at a new math resource for the elementary as well. If we move forward with a purchase, that will be decided by the end of April. We have listened to three resource presentations and have done multiple site visits. These are important next steps for the district. We are also headed into testing season although we already wrapped up our ACCESS testing; MCA testing will be in full swing after Spring Break.
