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7310 - DISPOSITION OF PERSONAL SURPLUS PROPERTY

The Board of Education requires the Superintendent to review the <u>personal property</u> of the District periodically and to dispose of that material and equipment which is no longer usable in accordance with the terms of this policy. <u>The disposition of real property is governed by Policy 7300 - Disposition of Real Property.</u>

"Personal property" means property other than real property. It may be tangible, having physical existence, such as vehicles, equipment, or instructional materials or intangible, such as intellectual property.

"Real property" means land, including land improvements, structures, and appurtenances thereto, but excludes moveable machinery and equipment.

A. Instructional Material

The District shall review instructional materials (i.e. textbooks, library books, manuals, support materials, etc.) periodically to determine the relevance of such materials to the present world and current instructional programs. The following criteria will be used to review instructional materials for redistribution and possible disposal:

- 1. Ceoncepts or content that do not support the current goals of the curriculum
- 2. Iinformation that may not be current
- 3. <u>W</u>worn beyond salvage
- B. Equipment

The District shall <u>periodically</u> inspect the equipment used in the instructional program <u>and other equipment owned by the</u> <u>District periodically</u>, to determine the condition and usability of such equipment in the current educational program <u>or</u> <u>other District operations</u>. Should the equipment be deemed no longer serviceable or usable, the following criteria will be used to determine possible disposal:

- 1. <u>R</u>repair parts for the equipment no longer readily available
- 2. <u>R</u>repair records indicate the equipment has no usable life remaining
- 3. <u>Oobsolete_equipment</u> and no longer contributing to the educational program<u>or usable for other operational</u> <u>purposes</u>
- 4. <u>sSome potential for sale at a school auction</u>
- 5. Cereates a safety or environmental hazard

C. Disposition

The Superintendent is authorized to dispose of obsolete instructional and other property by selling it to the highest bidder, posting on the website, auction, rummage sale, by donation to appropriate parties, or by proper waste removal.

Disposal of <u>personal</u> surplus property purchased with Federal funds shall be disposed of in accordance with Federal guidelines.

When original or replacement equipment acquired under a Federal award is no longer needed for the original project or program or for other activities currently or previously supported by a Federal awarding agency, the District shall request disposition instructions from the Federal awarding agency if required by the terms and conditions of the Federal award. Disposition of the equipment will be made in accordance with disposition instructions of the Federal awarding agency.

Items of equipment with a current per unit fair market value of \$5,000 or less may be retained, sold or otherwise disposed of with no further obligation to the Federal awarding agency.

Except as provided in §200.312 Federally-owned and exempt property, paragraph (b), or if the Federal awarding agency fails to provide requested disposition instructions within 120 days, items of equipment with a current per-unit fair-market value in excess of \$5,000 may be retained by the non- Federal entity or sold. The Federal awarding agency is entitled to an amount calculated by multiplying the current market value or proceeds from sale by the Federal awarding agency's percentage of participation in the cost of the original purchase. If the equipment is sold, the Federal awarding agency may permit the non-Federal entity to deduct and retain from the Federal share \$500 or ten percent (10%) of the proceeds, whichever is less, for its selling and handling expenses.
