> Levy and Financial Planning

Our upcoming operating levy remains a key focus as we work to ensure sustainable funding to maintain the high-quality programs and the necessary support for our students. It continues to be the goal of the district to ensure all questions are answered and our residents feel informed when they cast their ballot. With the remaining time prior to election day, we're happy to answer questions, meet with individuals or groups. Our collective message regarding the levy remains clear: this funding will provide the resources to continue the excellence in Owatonna Public Schools.

School Perceptions Survey

This process provides us with an invaluable opportunity to listen and learn. > Grant Opportunities

Pursuing grant funding is an important strategy for Owatonna Public Schools as we strive to enhance educational opportunities while maintaining fiscal responsibility to our community. However, it is important to note that grant funding is highly competitive, time-limited, and never guaranteed, making it a valuable but temporary supplement to the district's long-term financial plan.

Roosevelt Community Ed

- Members of the Adult Education staff recently participated in professional development about how adult brains learn. The training was at a high level and allowed staff to process the research as well as network in "job alike" groupings to capture the nuggets of this new research. This annual professional development training is a priority the SE ABE Consortium and staff from across the regional program sites participated.
- SAC sites are fully staffed for the first time since the pandemic. Professional
 development and site routine training is underway as staff configurations have
 changed and we want to build quality sites around the needs of children and their
 families.
- All SAC sites are undergoing a security audit and having their training needs
 reassessed Enrollments are beginning to shift as families are facing financial decisions
 impacting their ability to purchase child care. Requests for part-time and on-call care
 have also been noted. Site wait lists will be addressed as a result. Alternative
 enrollment options will continue to be a topic of conversation in an effort to meet
 community needs.

Teaching and Learning

As I write this, we just finished our first additional PD day the board was kind enough to approve for this year. What a day of learning it was! Some of the highlights of the day:

- K-5 had a full day of Wit & Wisdom training with three separate trainers here to work with our staff
- Early Childhood continued their work with early reading skills and their new Heggerty curriculum
- Special Education had all teachers together for the afternoon for due process training
- 6-12 Language Arts, Social Studies, and Math worked on standards alignment
- OHS did business tours that people were excited about
- So much more happened on this day!!

We are hyper focused on early reading skills and ensuring our students are prepared for the next level. Adopting a new resource will not result in an overnight change, but we are headed in the right direction with structured literacy and strong foundational programs. We are doing regular classroom walk-throughs and will continue to support our classroom teachers as they implement this new resource. In addition, OHS did its first run with the required reading testing from the state. All students in first semester English classes took the ROAR assessment. After that, students who showed a need for further diagnostic testing took the CaptiBasix test last week; this is a requirement from the state that all schools across the state have to implement this year. This test will allow us to see who at the secondary level still needs support with reading skills. This year is laying the groundwork for how this will work next year with interventions at the secondary level.
