Plans for the 2014-2015 school year:

WE will INNOVATE through:

 Enlisting the help of professionals in the field of technology to enrich our curriculum and provide real life experiences for our students.

Summary of Progress:

Our fall coding/programming residency with Saturday Academy instructor, Terry Alexander, concluded on Dec. 18, 2014. Every class received three sessions with Terry that lasted for 45-60 minutes each. A parent volunteer recently created an online survey for parents to help determine if Jacob Wismer should continue to have additional technology residencies in the future or explore other fields such as the creative and/or performing arts. Student reaction to the technology residency has been very positive.

Because both of our computer labs will be used from February through the end of the school year for state testing, our committee has explored the possibility of having Intel employees give presentations to our students in classrooms focusing on possible careers in engineering and technology. Another possibility we are exploring is providing our students with field trips to Intel.

Jacob Wismer has also partnered with a number of local organizations that have provided informative presentations to our classrooms. These partners include: The Musicality Network, Mad Science, Washington County Mobile Museum, Portland General Electric, Doernbecher Children's Hospital, Intel, Oregon Humane Society, Port of Portland and the Oregon Zoo.

Plans for the 2014-2015 school year:

- *Acumed place 2 volunteers in each 4th and 5th grade classroom (total of 18 STEM volunteers) for a series of classroom STEM projects and other school support.
- *SMART approximately 15 volunteers read with selected students twice a week and supply the children with books to take home.
- *Well Fargo Readers approximately 15 volunteers regularly read to classrooms as guest readers.
- *San Juan Diego Catholic Church provides 35 weekend food backpacks every week for families in need.
- *Chess for Success community volunteers provide a regular after school chess club for students.
- *Big Brother Big Sisters, Beyond School Walls mentor program provides a mentor for 20 4^{th} and 5^{th} grade children.
- *Sunset Presbyterian Toys for Joy program during the holidays providing toys and meals for 40-50 families.

Summary of Progress: (please use additional pages if needed)

*Acumed coordinator has made contact with 4th and 5th grade teachers, is recruiting volunteers from her end, will provide volunteer training and then in late January, early February volunteers will begin work with their classrooms. This year, BEC will include a student survey component of the program. Student surveys have been administered and collected by the BEC. Volunteer have been partnered with classrooms and some classroom presentations have taken place.

*SMART is up and running. Teachers have identified students who would benefit from this program and who meet the criteria. The SMART coordinator has paired volunteers with students and they have had their first reading session.

SMART readers come and read with students Kinder-3rd every Tuesday and Friday from 9:00-1:00.

*Wells Fargo Readers – classrooms that were interested in having Wells Fargo Guest Readers have been paired with a reader and the visits have begun.

Readers have made contact with classrooms and several classrooms have welcomed readers into their rooms.

*San Juan Diego Catholic Church works with counselor and family liaison to identify families who would benefit from the backpack food program. Every week on Fridays (or the last day of the week) students from our self-contained special education classrooms help deliver the food for students to take home to their families.

Back packs continue to be delivered every week's end, coordinated and monitored by the office staff but actually delivered by the special education students – continues to help families in need and provide a positive leadership opportunity for the special education students.

*Chess for Success – a community volunteer is partnering with staff members to bring an after school chess club to McKinley. Chess sets were donated and the club has been meeting for several weeks. Continues to meet with the same 20 students once a week with community volunteers and support from staff.

*Beyond School Walls (Big Brother Big Sister mentor program) -4^{th} and 5^{th} grade students have been identified, or carried over from last year, paired with a mentor and the weekly lunch meetings have begun. On Wednesdays, students leave with the counselor and the coordinator to walk or ride the bus to Leupold Stevens and to Wells Fargo to eat lunch and meet with their mentors. Periodically the mentors are invited to the school to eat lunch here at school with their mentees.

Going strong. Students have been going to Wells Fargo and Leupold Stevens for their lunch meetings. They look forward to welcoming their mentors to the school cafeteria.

*Sunset Presbyterian Toys for Joy program – counselor and family liaison have identified families and made contact with Sunset Pres.

Was a huge success and much needed support for several of our families.

At the last Community Partnership Meeting, the Volunteer Coordinator and I decided that we needed to organize a spring get together to invite representatives from as many partnerships as we can, with the goal being sharing the state of partnerships, share ideas and look forward to next year. We are hoping to have this meeting of the minds, so to speak, sometime in April...more to come... \odot

- Partner with BSD Diversity Administrator, Sho Shigeoka and Nike to bring the Nike Global Citizenship workshop to the Oak Hills School Community in order to increase and sustain a welcoming environment for all students and parent groups.
- Work with Oak Hills to team to continue identifying specific projects that will enhance the work our community/school partnerships.
- Develop a relationship and partnership with the Oak Hills Church.
- Develop goals and build stronger connections for the 2014-2015 school year with an eye to projects that will continue to develop over the course of several years.
- Explore the opportunity to fence the perimeter of the Oak Hills school grounds with the Oak Hills HOA, BSD Facilities Department, Home Depot, and the Oak Hills PTO to provide a safer environment for students and staff.

- Continue to enhance the connection that currently exists between Oak Hills School and the Oak Hills Homeowners Association. Projects include use of facilities with a focus on school and community safety.
- Oak Hills School is currently working with Sunset Credit Union to develop a program to help students build an understanding relative to the value of saving money. Currently, the credit union is visiting Oak Hills weekly to establish and maintain savings accounts for students. Fifth grade students assist Sunset Credit Union staff members with this endeavor. Sunset Credit Union Staff visit classrooms to teach about banking practices.
- Work with Sunset Credit Union to enhance the Oak Hills Elementary Earth Day activities and a calendar project for the upcoming year.
- Expand partnership with Champions to enhance opportunities for students to receive quality before and after school care.
- Continue to work with Bales Thriftway to provide seasonal artwork on grocery bags created by our students. Bales Thriftway has been a generous donor for Staff Development Days and our Volunteer Dessert.
- Continue to partner with Bales Thriftway to support one of the school's selected charities. The store assists with the collection of community donations for LLS in memory of former Oak Hills teacher, Mark Lynch.
- Continue to develop a partnership with the Outback Steakhouse.

- We decided to work on meeting the basic needs of students as outlined in Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs. So far, we created a Clothes Closet in house that is being stocked and replenished by Village Baptist members. Students are able to "shop" for free by contacting their counselor.
- · Also to address the basic needs of our highly impacted population, we wrote a grant through the "Take it to the Court for Education" program for supplies that will eliminate part of the opportunity gap for students so they are able to concentrate on the most important aspect of school, which is learning. We are happy to report that we received the grant for \$1,000 and we will be presented with the check on March 2nd at the Moda Center. The money will be used to place supply boxes filled with pencils, pens, etc. for every student in every class. Boxes will be available for those who need them and returned before going to the next class. Every class will have these boxes available for students. This will hopefully eliminate the power struggle between teacher and student so the focus remains about the learning and not so much on the actual pencil or pen OR the need to teach them responsibility. We will choose other creative ways to teach students how to be responsible so they have those academic behaviors for high school and beyond.

At Meadow Park Middle School, 48% of the students receive free or reduced lunches. Currently we have 48 students that are considered homeless. The number of students in these situations is growing and there

is no infrastructure to help these students with basic school supplies. In the not so distant past, teachers would penalize students for not showing up to class prepared with a pencil. The administration has helped the staff understand that many of the students are worrying about their next meal and not whether or not they have a pencil. We would like to provide each teacher in the school with the basic supplies such as pencils, pens and paper so that students that cannot afford these basic necessities can do their work and it does not fall on teachers to find creative solutions or buy the supplies themselves.

OES: Whitford and OES administrative teams conducted shared school and classroom visits to better learn more about our schools shared goals and instructional practices. Whitford and the Beaverton School district showed renewed commitment to our partnership with OES at the "Friendraising Event" which helps fund "AASK" an after school tutoring and summer school program that is in it's 16th year of serving students from the Beaverton School District and OES. This partnership includes Students from Beaverton High School and OES working together to support students at Whitford through an after school tutoring program. We are also collaboratively planning an additional day of academic support tied to student interest. These "Wow Wednesday" offerings will include extended learning opportunities based on the talent and skills of our High School tutors and OES staff and the interests and needs of our students. Pacific University and OES leaders are also collaborating to strengthen the after school and summer programs.

BEF: This quarter also included a growing Partnership with the Beaverton Education Foundation (BEF). BEF has made a commitment to support Whitford and district implementation of AVID by facilitating a donation of hundreds of binders to support our AVID implementation. BEF has also increased their support of our extended day learning programs with financial and consultative support. Whitford will also partner with BEF to host a district-wide middle school soccer tournament followed by a "Family Fiesta". We have scheduled this event for the 3rd quarter of the year. We will be offering after school math instruction during the second semester due to the support of BEF.

University of Oregon: Whitford 6th grade students are currently participating in Project Algebra Readiness (PAR). With support from U of O,

6th grade students are receiving instruction in addition to their grade level math course to prepare them for Algebra.

Pacific University: Pacific University has increased their presence in our school through the implementation of the Whitford Café, an after school program to provide our students with extended and varied learning opportunities to enhance student learning and tap into student interest. We are continuing to work with Pacific University leadership to expand our partnership with opportunities for adult learning and staff development in the area of writing.

Portland Community Church: PCC partnered with Whitford to provide support to families in need of assistance. Thanks to PCC, St. John Fisher Church, and Season of Atonement, more than 60 Whitford families received clothing, food and other support over the winter break.

Young Life: Young Life will be hosting a March 3 on 3 basketball tournament at Whitford in Partnership with our PTO. This event will raise funds for our PTO and provide a chance for our students to have fun and compete in a basketball tournament.

• Participated in monthly Policy calls for December, January & February. These monthly policy calls with stakeholders help SFF determine its on-going policy agenda and priorities for helping to school food to be "more healthful, regionally sourced and sustainably produced".

• Corresponded with a faith-based organization (St. Andrew Lutheran Church) regarding ways that we can partner to decrease hunger amongst BSD students.

Support Legislation that will improve students' access to school meals

- Provided written testimony for hearings in Salem on several bills that are being considered for Oregon House of Representatives.
 - o HB2545 Would provide state funds to pay the 40 cents price of lunch for students eligible for reduced-price meals. This means that these students would receive lunch at no charge. Currently, the state legislature is reimbursing districts for the 30 cents cost of breakfast for these students, so that they can get a breakfast at no charge. If this bill is proposed and passes, then these students' participation in school meals programs would very likely increase (this has occurred in Vermont and Minnesota), and it could mean an additional \$100,000 more in federal funds for BSD alone.

- Breakfast After the Bell (no HB number yet) this bill would make it easier to set-up breakfast-in-the-classroom programs by ensuring that up to 5 minutes of time that students eat breakfast while instruction is being provided could count as instructional time. Often, lower income students don't eat breakfast before school due to the time they arrive at school. This is especially true for High School students who may not wake-up early enough to get breakfast before the bell rings. Breakfast-in-the-classroom programs allow students to grab a breakfast and eat it in class, thus providing them with fuel for learning.
- HB 2404 Smart Snacks Consistency Bill this bill would adjust amend ORS 366.423 so that nutrition standards in Oregon for foods and beverages sold separately from school meals would be the same as the federal standards. Currently, Oregon has a set of standards implemented in 2009 that overlay the federal standards that went into effect July 1, 2014. This additional layer of regulation makes it very confusing and limiting for school nutrition programs, as well as school-sponsored fund raisers to determine what can be sold and has caused a loss of \$88,000 of revenue for Nutrition Services so far.
