New Before School Procedures

At TMS we have a number of students who arrive or are dropped off early in the morning at a time we do not have staff to supervise them. This creates a problem for us in the hallways before school when teachers who are trying to prepare for their classes, are interrupted by the noise of students near their classrooms. Students should not arrive at school before 7:45 am. If they must be dropped off earlier than 7:45 am. students will now need to use entry Door 4 (by the cafeteria) and remain in the cafeteria until 7:45 am. Preparing Students to be College and Career Ready

As part of our mission to prepare students to be college and career ready, TMS 8th graders participated in the annual Heavy Metal Tour, sponsored by Nicolet College of Rhinelander. It was an extraordinary experience for our students. Our 8th graders visited local manufacturers Northland Stainless and Daigle Brothers. At these sites they experienced firsthand, all aspects of working for a manufacturer, from entry level workers, to skilled laborers, to project managers. They were able to see real-life applications of the subjects they experience every day at school. These subjects included not only the core areas, but the arts as



well. Here are some examples:

- Technology
- Math/Science/English
- Art/Design
- Basic Life Skills

Our students were able to see the production process from start to finish. They even received some samples of the finished product, and many were able to actually weld pieces of metal together. The message was made clear about the importance of life skills. Employers want people who are on time, are hard workers, have a desire to learn new skills, and get along well with others. They need workers who can communicate effectively and work safely.

The 8th graders also visited Nicolet College of Rhinelander. Here they were able to see what it takes to get the necessary training to gain a position in manufacturing. They learned of differ-

ent options for post-secondary education and the costs of those choices. They also received information about careers. Currently there is a high demand in Wisconsin for skilled laborers, and this trend will only continue to grow.
