RE: Fall Housing 2017

Each year school districts must report to ISBE the number of students enrolled as of the last day in September.

Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, the school-level fall enrollment counts are based on enrollment and exit dates reported for individual students in the ISBE Student Information System (SIS).

Attached are the Fall Housing Figures for 2016-17 and 2017-18. Our low income percentage for 2017-18 is 18.2%. That is a 2.3% increase for the district compared to last year.

Schools listed in green are Title 1 schools. For 2017-18, District 97 Title 1 schools are again identified as elementary or middle schools that have a percentage of low income students that is higher than the district average.

The same elementary schools that qualified last year for Title 1 Targeted Assistance, also qualified again this year. Beye, Brooks, Holmes, Irving, Julian, and Whittier are our 2017-18 Title 1 schools.

Note: Although the district low income percentage rose by 2.3%, the same schools qualified for Title 1 Targeted Assistance services again this school year.

Two schools experienced a significant jump in low income students this year beyond the district's overall increase; Beye increased 6.3% and Holmes increased 4.0%.
