Curriculum & Instruction

CHS is offering the SAT Saturday, September 16, and the PSAT will be held on October 11th. Juniors are encouraged to take the PSAT if they haven't taken a similarly timed test before and to register for the SAT in the spring. Sophomores are also welcomed to take the PSAT.

The Fall MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) benchmark began Monday, September 19. This year we have decided to test 9th-11th graders to provide our teachers with the rich instructional data provided by the test. The test is adaptive, measures growth and progress, provides years of longitudinal data, and helps teachers to make appropriate instructional decisions for both whole groups and individual students. Our students are testing in the following areas:

Math: statistics and probability, the real and complex number systems, geometry, and operations & algebraic thinking Reading: informational text, vocabulary, and literary text Language: writing, grammar, and mechanics

Once the data is in, our staff will spend time analyzing it to identify positive and negative trends and create plans to address student needs.

Postsecondary Prep has had retired military members as guest speakers and students are working on applications, taking placement classes/tests, and learning financial literacy.

Biology students traveled to Crab Creek to measure the temperature and salinity gradients that salmon pass through as they migrate upstream to spawn. They determined that the salinity of the open ocean is 35 ppt, but by the time salmon have traveled 200 feet upstream from the mouth, the salinity has dropped to 0 ppt. This is the kickoff for their first unit, which will focus on the ways salmon cells and organ systems are adapted to help the salmon survive in both saltwater and freshwater.

US History students are evaluating student writing samples using a scoring guide to establish inter-rater reliability. This is done in preparation for their first major assignment, which requires them to write a reflection apprising their understanding of the events on 9/11 and how this understanding has grown over the course of their first unit.

Concert Band is starting strongly by preparing auditions for Honor Band and All-State. Several students have a good chance of being involved in these ensembles this year.

The Woodshop class is making bandsaw boxes and Native Arts classes are making deer calls. Art students are printmaking by doing linoleum reduction prints.

British Literature students are comparing & contrasting characters in *Beowulf* and their attitudes towards revenge by citing textual evidence. World Literature students are explaining how mythological heroes are shaped by the cultures that created them.

Our staff and student body are grateful to have a fulltime **PE/Health** teacher in the building again. Students have been utilizing the weight room for their conditioning class and the PE classes are in the middle of a badminton unit.

Cross-country is off to a commendable start and have exceeded Coach Steffen's expectations. Freshman, Aulis Nelson, has 3rd place on Craig High School's record board. The team travels to Sitka this weekend with a full team and there are
