### BISD Recycling Program



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### **BACKGROUND**



The Recycling Program of the Brownsville ISD was initiated in September of 2009 through five grants awarded by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality in cooperation of the Lower Rio Grande Development Council. The initial grants were funded at a level of \$110,000 for the purchase of equipment to initiate the program. Equipment procured included: truck, shredder and bailer. (*Please see attached – photos*). Additional funding for the program is an annual district allocation of approximately \$30,000 which is used for expenses related to maintenance and operations not including payroll costs. Beginning this year, funds collected will be reinvested in the program to upgrade equipment capacity and provide incentives.

### **Policy CL - RECYCLING**

The entire District shall be expected to actively participate in the recycling program and waste reduction efforts, which shall involve four distinct activities:

- 1. Recycling of paper, cardboard, and the like.
- 2. Using source reduction, which includes but is not limited to making double-sided copies, increasingly using e-mail instead of memos, reusing surplus furniture, and the like.
- Purchasing products made from recycled materials. The long-term success of recycling programs depends on the creation of markets for recycled materials. All campus and departments shall purchase recycled products wherever economically feasible, i.e., remanufactured cartridges, cleaning products, and printer and copier paper.
- 4. Encouraging District <u>employees to participate</u> in the recycling effort by following instructions regarding the separation of recyclable and non-recyclable materials and by placing recyclable materials in appropriately marked recycling containers. Students shall also be expected to participate in campus recycling efforts.

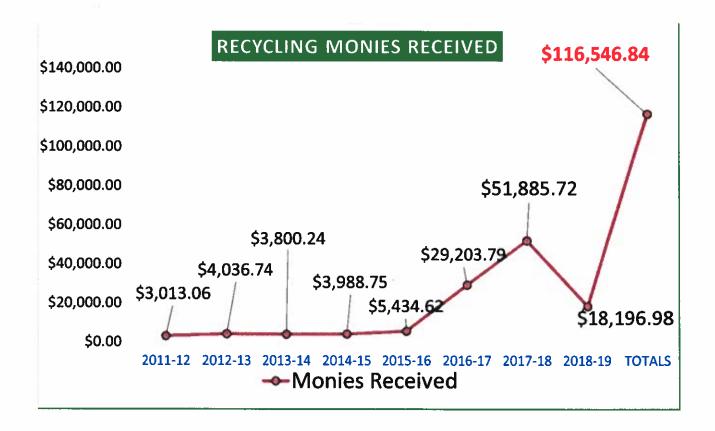

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### **Food Services**

- TIN Recycling
  - During the School Years 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 150,000 pounds of TIN were recycled generating revenues of approximately \$14,000 for each year.

### **Proposed:**

- During the second semester all elementary schools will begin serving lunch with reusable hard plastic trays. These will eliminate the use of Styrofoam plates reducing approximately 80% of trash volume. Trays have already been purchased and will be phased in during the month of January.
- Styrofoam Recycling at Middle Schools and High Schools through the purchase and use of Thermal Densification Machines (\$15,000 approximate cost). The process includes the removal of air from Styrofoam and turning it into liquid resin.
- The introduction of reusable trays and recycling of Styrofoam will allow for future utilities (garbage) savings by reducing the number of pick up days or reducing trash bin size.

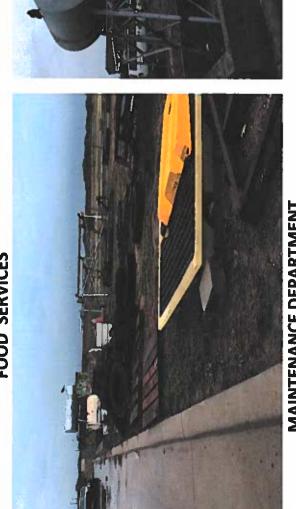
