





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HOW WE GOT HERE

- Since the beginning of the 23-24 School Year:
 - \$6,592,071 School Health and Related Services (SHARS) loss of funding
 - \$7,438,226 Transportation funding gap
 - \$4,440,228 Safety and Security requirements annual funding • gap from House Bill 3, 88(R)
 - **\$256,338** Denton County Appraisal District cost increase \bullet
 - \$2,529,103 (and climbing) Utilities cost increase \bullet
 - \$1,545,452 Property Casualty Insurance cost increase \bullet
 - **\$10,000,000** in raises in 2023 based on assurances that the \$4 \bullet billion in the state budget would be flowed to public schools


