United States History Reworking Themes and Chronology

Rationale:

- Concurrency: Events relevant across themes, happening simultaneously have impacts on each other (ex: Civil Rights and Cold War).
- 2. Anchoring Events: The process of revisiting the same eras multiple times throughout the course disrupted the comprehension of cause and effect.



Adjustment to Civic Action Investigation

Rationale:

- 1. Inspire, but not mandate civic action. An "investigation" is more realistic within the timeframe and scope of course.
- 2. An investigation allows for deeper examination multiple perspectives and produces similar metacognitive results without the discouragement and frustration for all parties involved.




Rationale

DSM Two revisions since publication, so students receive conflicting information

> 2022 APA released new recommendations for introductory psychology course content and skills

New course framework rolls out for 2024-2025 school year; at least 2nd course revision since publication of current text


