4. Winter Concert - December 16






Athletic Spotlight Christian Espain


Christian is a goalkeeper, he has been playing soccer since he was five years old. He is now a junior in high school, It is his third year playing as goalkeeper.

Heppner Elementary School

MCSD Board Goal #1 emphasizes ensuring academic growth for every student, and Heppner Elementary continues to keep that goal at the center of our work. Our staff is committed to data-informed instruction, and we have built structures that give teachers the time and support needed to deeply analyze student performance. Weekly data team meetings and grade-band PLCs create regular opportunities for meaningful conversations that directly shape instruction and support student growth.

Now in our fourth year with Amplify as our core reading curriculum, teachers are confident and consistent in their use of the science of reading and explicit instruction practices. Acadience progress-monitoring every two weeks provides timely insights into student progress, allowing teachers to adjust small-group instruction and targeted interventions as needed. Our reading interventionist, Samantha Gerry, continues to be an invaluable resource—guiding staff, helping interpret data, and supporting teachers in meeting student needs.

In math, teachers are prioritizing strategic vertical alignment, intentionally building vocabulary and strategies across grade levels. By previewing upcoming concepts and strengthening foundational knowledge, students are developing a deeper understanding that supports long-term retention and prepares them for increasingly complex content.

At HES, every instructional minute matters. Through purposeful use of data, explicit instructional practices, and a shared commitment to helping every student make at least one year of growth in reading and math, we are steadily moving toward our goals. We are excited to see how this hard work is reflected in the winter iReady diagnostic, which opened on December 1st.



Heppner Jr/Sr High School

1. Staffing and Instruction

• This month, I have intentionally increased my presence in classrooms to support instructional quality and consistency. Walkthroughs have been conducted in every classroom, giving me a clear and current picture of teaching practices across the building. We are also in the formal observation window, which allows for deeper feedback and coaching aligned to the instructional priorities we set for the year. The focus remains on ensuring that our staff is implementing the strategies we have emphasized and that students are experiencing coherent, high-quality instruction in every period and every content area.

2. School Culture and Student Engagement

- Our fall athletic season concluded this past week, highlighted by strong postseason performances across
 multiple programs. Girls Cross Country placed 5th at the state meet, Volleyball took 3rd in state, and
 Football finished as the 2A state runner-up. These achievements have brought positive momentum and
 pride to the student body.
 - Winter sports are now underway, with basketball and wrestling beginning competition this week.
- To strengthen school culture this fall, we held several targeted pep assemblies to recognize teams, build spirit, and create shared experiences for students. These efforts had a noticeable impact, contributing to an energized and supportive climate throughout the season.

3. Academics

- Communication with families continues to be a priority. Several departments have elevated their outreach
 this year by providing monthly newsletters that highlight classroom learning, upcoming projects, and cocurricular opportunities. In addition to our standard Mustang Monthly, we now distribute the Music
 Mustang Monthly and have recently added the Career & College Readiness Newsletter through the
 counseling office. These tools give families a clearer view of what is happening in our classrooms and help
 reinforce the relevance of our academic and extracurricular programs.
- As we approach the end of the semester, we will be implementing semester teacher-parent conferences for
 the first time during my tenure at HJSHS. The goal is to provide meaningful, timely communication about
 student progress, celebrate successes, and collaborate with families on strategies that will support students
 heading into the second half of the year.

MCSD Maintenance & Facilities Report – November 2025

In December, we will submit the annual building data collections report to Oregon Department of Education. This report provides an inventory of the school facilities and year-to-year energy usage data, internet connectivity, maintenance expenses and major or minor renovations.

We are continuing the lead in water testing in December. This is an ODE requirement for all schools in the state, and we are required to conduct them every six years. All fixtures that may be used for drinking will be tested and reports posted within 10 days. All mitigation will be done promptly and follow the ODE guidelines. Along with MEC, two additional schools have completed testing and we are waiting for the lab results.

Bond Project Update:

The Wenaha and the District team have weekly meetings to stay on track.

Our first Bond Oversight Committee meeting was informative and provided an opportunity for the committee to learn about the process, ask questions and provide feedback. Our next meeting will be scheduled soon and likely be in February. As a reminder, the committee will meet quarterly through the entire bond process ending in the fall of 2029. The BOC's core purpose will be to carefully monitor the delivery of the proposed bond program to ensure accountability,

fiscal transparency, and community trust. The meetings will be facilitated by Wenaha along with Matt, Gabe and Brandi. Up to three board members are allowed to attend the meetings.

The BOC members include Brett Harrison, Meghan Golden, Don Alleman, Justin Nelson, Tia McNamee, Zac Acock, Debbie Radie, Phyllis Danielson, Torrie Griggs, Frances Glenn, George Shimer and Karen Pettigrew.

The Design Advisory Committee (DAC) meeting was well attended and was a great success! The members commented that the meeting was engaging, thought-provoking and they learned a lot about the process. Our student members were the highlight of the evening – their insights were thoughtful, openminded and they provided a great reminder about how important this process is. The group is tasked with helping to shape the design and vision of the schools and to communicate the work with the staff, community and stakeholders. They will prioritize cost framework, craft the design goals and refine the design to shape the future of our schools. Our architect firm, SAJ, facilitated an outstanding workshop with open discussion and creative activities.

We will continue to combine the DACs for Boardman, Heppner and Irrigon for the next three meetings on December 16, January 20 and February 24. Up to three board members may attend the meetings.

In March, Irrigon will meet for the next seven months separately. Boardman's group will meet from July 2025 – January 2027. Heppner's meetings are September 2026 – March 2027. During those meetings, the DACs will create unique, individual spaces for their buildings.

Boardman's DAC members are John Christy, Marie Shimer, David Boor, Stephanie Simpson, Claude Birt, Smokey Joe Wightman, Veronica Nunez Lezama and daughter Ariana, Richard Rockwell and daughter Kaia and Luis Campos.

Heppner's DAC members are Ryan Gerry, Laura Winters, Marie Shimer, Petra Payne, Jason Palmer, Ashley Beard, Sarah Matheny and son Peyton, Linsey Hanna and son Jasper, Jennifer Wilson, John Doherty and Linda Kenny.

The SAJ Architect design schedule includes opportunities for building staff, students and community members to provide input and feedback. As we move through the process, we will provide more details and communicate with stakeholders.

The Irrigon new build and safety security request for proposal for the Construction Manager/General Contractor was released on October 31. We had 12 firms attend the mandatory zoom meeting on November 10 followed by five firms at the non-mandatory site visit on November 12. The firms received an addendum that included answers to all questions that were posed. Proposals are due on December 9. The evaluation committee will review and interview by January 6 and make a recommendation at the January 12 school board meeting. The Boardman and Heppner CM/GC request for proposals will be available in 2026.

SAJ along with several engineers, Wenaha and the District team visited Windy River and Irrigon Elementary on November 20 for the safety and security upgrades that will be done during the summer of 2026. The group visited with principals about how the spaces work now and what improvements could be made. Safety and security may include updated camera systems, door access control and secure front entries.

Topographic and utility survey reports have been received and shared with Wenaha and SAJ. Hazardous material survey samples have been collected, and the full report is due at the end of December. We selected the company for the geotech surveys and coordination will begin this month. Our next procurements include third party cost estimator, commissioning authority and building envelope consultant. All surveys and consultants are a vital part of the process to help the architects and general contractors know what to expect and provide a checks and balances system which in turn should keep the change orders and unexpected expenses minimal.

Pacific Northwest Communications created our press release which was shared on all schools' social media and area news outlets. This press release centered around the BOC and DAC meetings. Our next task is to create video content featuring the DAC students.

The District team would like to thank all the volunteer committee members for their time, openness and support. We are excited to work collaboratively with the school board, staff, students and the community to create facilities for the next generations.
