


Odysseyware Credit Recovery Program

Counseling Support Services

School and SAS counselors are available to assist students and staff with:

One-on-one counseling services

Student support groups

Character Education

Conflict Resolution

Anger Management and Impulse Control skills

Life skills

Career and Educational planning goals

Truancy issues

Substance abuse

Mental Health referrals

Suicidality

Other family, personal and social issues

SAS counselors have assisted students and campuses in critical situations such as suicidality and student or faculty deaths.



Critical Transitioning Support Services



School counselors provide educational planning at transition grade levels such as Pre-K to Kinder, 5th and 6th to middle school, 8th and 9th to high school and DAEP to the home campus.

Elementary Counselors work with middle school counselors to plan for next year's 6th grade transition to middle school. Middle school counselors go to each elementary campus to meet with potential students and parents.

High School counselors work with middle school counselors to provide educational planning for current 9th graders. CTE counselors provide career assessments to all 8th graders prior to educational planning. High school counselors provide parent meetings and go to the middle school for presentations and individual assistance.

Community Outreach Center (COC) Homeless Assistance Program helps with:


- Identification
- Tutoring for secondary homeless students who may not graduate without additional assistance
- LEP/Homeless Grad lab
- Enrollment assistance
- Transportation and free lunch
- School supplies and uniforms
- Referrals to social services and housing
- Information regarding the rights of homeless students
- Teachers are notified at each grading cycle of who the homeless students are in their specific class periods. Teachers are given general tips on how to help homeless students.
- Food 2 Kids program

Dropout Recovery Grad Lab



- Offers flexible scheduling and smaller environment
- Started by recovering homeless students and, this year, added Limited English Proficiency students who have dropped out.
- The students are enrolled at their home campus but attend full time at the COC. (36 students currently attend full time.)

TPRS

Teen Reach Advocacy Counselors provide services for young parents at all secondary schools. Each high school has three professional support personnel including a counselor, a caseworker, and a teen parent specialist. The students are also served by the homebound teacher. TRAC personnel strive to remove any obstacles the student may face before and after pregnancies, so that students will graduate.

Services Provided:

- Family support
- Transportation to school, child care facility, health services, and community service agencies
- Young mothers are encouraged to nurse and they are provided with snacks
- Senior night is held to celebrate graduating seniors

Working with the Community

First 5 Permian Basin - A division of the UTPB College of Education Provides a free fatherhood engagement program that offers one on one and group education for fathers.

Nurse-Family Partnership - Offers FREE pregnancy and infant care education for first time moms.

Holds a health fair in the fall at UTPB.

Parents as Teachers

Free home visiting program that teaches safety and educates parents during pregnancy and up to 5 years after the baby is born.





Additional Campus Support

- Campus Curriculum Facilitators (CCF) at each campus support teachers in curriculum and instruction, discipline, and organization.
- Reading Specialists assist teachers in the implementation of Balanced Literacy strategies.
- Improvement Required (IR) campuses are supported by the District Coordinator of School Improvement (DCSI) and a Professional Service Provider (PSP).
- Coca Cola Valued Youth Tutors from OHS assist targeted campus by tutoring students during the school day.
- Dyslexia teachers provide services to identified students.
- Reading Coaches provide support to 5 assigned schools.
- Superintendent Leadership Team (SLT) promotes communication and collaboration between campuses and the central office.
