JOINT PRIORITIES DURING the 86th SESSION of the TEXAS LEGISLATURE For ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District is a proponent and advocate for a healthy, expanding and profitable local business community; and

WHEREAS, the Mission Statement of the Denton Independent School District states that the organization shall empower lifelong learners to be engaged citizens who positively impact their local and global community; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Denton Independent School District does hereby affirm:

- 1. Support for legislation to extend the sunset date of Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code to allow for the continued use of property tax abatements.
- 2. Support continuation or expansion of funding of the Skills Development Fund of the Texas Workforce Commission to promote workforce training.
- 3. Introduce and seek passage of legislation that enables the creation of a Tourism Public Improvement District (TPID).

JOINT PRIORITIES DURING the 86th SESSION of the TEXAS LEGISLATURE For TOURISM PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes the importance of the Denton Chamber of Commerce as the lead marketing and support entity for conventions, tourism and the hospitality industry in general by virtue of its contract to administer the Denton Convention & Visitor Bureau since 1976; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes the Tourism Public Improvement Districts (TPID) are a proven tool for creating more funding to recruit convention business in a highly competitive market, such as Denton's position compared to major area destination cities, such as Arlington, Dallas and Fort Worth; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes the TPID are funded solely by self-assessments from local hotels within a designated district, creation and application of a TPID would not require expenditure of any City of Denton general revenues; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes the City of Denton City Council has approved Resolution 18-1847 advocating the authority to create a local TPID.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Denton Independent School District does hereby:

- 1. Endorse the concept of a Tourism Public Improvement District as a valuable supplement for supporting local tourism allies.
- 2. Support the City of Denton's resolution requesting applicable statutory authority through the Texas Legislature to create a Tourism Public Improvement District in Denton.

JOINT PRIORITIES DURING the 86th SESSION of the TEXAS LEGISLATURE For UNITED WAY of DENTON COUNTY, Inc.

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District and the United Way of Denton County, Inc. share the philosophy that Denton County's strong economic productivity depends on effective education that produces a highly skilled workforce that is healthy, housed, and protected; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District and United Way are allies sharing support from many of the same benefactors, advocating a common pledge to help make the Denton area an attractive place in which to live and work; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Denton Independent School District does hereby endorse the key points of the United Way of Denton County, Inc.'s employable workforce priorities for the 86th Session of the Texas Legislature, to include:

- 1. Integration of academic and workforce development policies that create cradle-to-career pathways, providing a better educated workforce that enables self-sufficiency.
- 2. Increased funding that would expand the entry points for coordinated and comprehensive services for behavioral health that are planned, cohesive, and monitored for effectiveness at the community level that ensures individual wellbeing and community safety for residents of all ages.
- 3. Increased funding for housing, health and behavioral health services for veterans transitioning from military life and for those already in our community.
- 4. Increased access to high quality, affordable child care and early childhood education; and increased access to dropout prevention programs for at-risk students that improve student achievement and post-graduation success.
- 5. Support for prevention and intervention programs that make homelessness rare, brief and nonrecurring, and policies that promote an increase in affordable, available and accessible housing throughout the state.
- 6. Reform the statutory framework for regulation of predatory lending to provide protections for financially vulnerable Texans from aggressive and harmful lending practices.

JOINT PRIORITIES DURING the 86th SESSION of the TEXAS LEGISLATURE For LOCAL CONTROL

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes and supports the need for the City of Denton to preserve its ability to determine its own financial destiny in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens and to meet the needs and demands of those citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District has previously supported specific aspects of this position during the 85th Session of the Texas Legislature.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Denton Independent School District does renew its current position to:

- 1. Support legislation that preserves municipal home-rule authority.
- 2. Oppose legislation that would reduce or otherwise negatively impact municipal revenue streams, particularly revenue or tax caps, and, sales tax expansion fulling benefitting the municipality.
- 3. Support the authority of Texas cities to manage and control their rights-of-way or other public property, and to be reasonably compensated for such use.
- 4. Support the current authority of Texas cities to enact a system and set the level of impact fees for new development.
- 5. Support cities' ability to adopt or amend zoning regulations or annex property in their extraterritorial jurisdiction.

JOINT PRIORITIES DURING the 86th SESSION of the TEXAS LEGISLATURE For DENTON AREA INSTITUTIONS of HIGHER EDUCATION

(TWU only)

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District places great emphasis on the quality of education; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District proudly acknowledges the fact that the city of Denton is the home of the University of North Texas and Texas Woman's University, as well as having a central business district campus of North Central Texas College; and

WHEREAS, the Denton Independent School District recognizes the importance of higher education as a critical component for attracting and retaining quality professional career opportunities, major corporate investment for the entire state, and subsequently a year-round contributor to economic development and business assistance, providing a positive impact on the local economy.

NOW, THEREFORE. BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Denton Independent School District does hereby:

- (a) Support Texas Woman's University in its request:
 - 1. Full Formula Funding to address enrollment growth and inflation.
 - 2. Maintain 100% of Base Funding Including Hold Harmless Funding
 - 3. Transfer of Hold Harmless Funding to Institutional Enhancement significantly reducing the need for increased tuition.
 - 4. Tuition Revenue Bond Funding for Health Sciences Center
 - 5. State Financial Support for Students
 - 6. Additional Funds for Nursing Faculty expand capacity to address the growing shortage of nurses
 - 7. Funding for Hazelwood Exemptions; help offset the costs of maintaining a Military Veteran Friendly status for eight consecutive years.
- (b) Support the University of North Texas in its request:
- (c) Support North Central Texas College in its request:
 - 1. An 8%, or \$144 million, overall increase in state formula funding for Texas Community Colleges during the 2020-2021 biennium. The recommended funding level includes increases. Respectfully ask the 86th Legislature to support increasing the biennial rate for Success Points from the current \$173 to \$215 per point.
 - 2. Dual Credit: Broadening Access and Sustaining Quality Texas community colleges completely support dual credit as both a proven means for students to earn college credit even while they are still in high school, and as an important factor in meeting the state's 60x30TX plan.

- Establishing a state goal for dual credit: By 2030, no less than 30% of high school graduates will have earned at least 12 semester credit hours (SCH) in dual credit.
- Establishing a state taskforce to include the THECB, Texas Education Agency, Texas Workforce Commission, and stakeholders from K-12 and higher education to study equitable access to quality dual credit programs across the state and the role of dual credit in meeting the goals of the 60X30TX plan.
- Requiring dual credit students to declare a meta-major/field of study upon completion of 12 SCH in core academic subjects or declare a career path upon completion of 12 SCH in career and technical education (CTE).
- Broadening dual credit access by expanding student eligibility for the Texas Education Opportunity Grant (TEOG) program to high school students enrolled in dual credit for up to 12 SCH in core academic transfer subjects or in CTE courses leading to certifications.
- 3. Recommend increased state investments in community college formula funding to help broaden the reach of CTE and CE programs, and sustained state funding for SDF and JET Texas Community Colleges partner to deliver workforce training through two programs Skills Development Fund (SDF) and Jobs and Education for Texans (JET) Grant.

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
