

Student Fees 2021

Iowa Law:

In the State of Iowa, public schools are “tuition-free”. But that does not mean that schools cannot charge certain fees. Indeed, the law authorizes districts to charge seven (7) types of fees, as follows:

1. Textbook Rental Fees,
2. Eye Protective Devices,
3. Ear Protective Devices,
4. Summer School Courses,
5. Driver Education Courses,
6. Discretionary Transportation, and
7. School Supplies.

Not all supplies may truly be called “school supplies.” If an item is essential to the instruction of a class, the item is part of tuition and must be supplied for free. For instance, a district may *NOT* charge a fee for art supplies for art class and chemicals for science class because these are items necessary or essential to the instruction of those classes. On the other hand, if a student voluntarily desired to “upgrade” his materials in a project in a woodworking course (for example, go from pine to cherry wood), the student would have to pay for the upgrade. The district must provide the basic pine for the instruction, but the student pays for voluntarily choosing a better quality of wood. Expendable worksheets are part of instruction and must be provided for free.

Full Waiver. A student shall be granted a waiver of all fees if:

- a) The student or student’s family meets the financial eligibility criteria for free meals;
- b) The student or student’s family meets financial eligibility criteria for the Family Investment Program (FIP);
- c) The student or student’s family is eligible for transportation assistance; or
- d) The student is in foster care.

Partial Waiver, if the student or the student’s family meets the financial eligibility criteria for reduced price meals.

Temporary Waiver. A student may be granted a temporary waiver of a fee or fees in the event of a temporary financial difficulty in the student’s immediate family.

Prohibited Fees. There are some fees that school boards must be careful not to charge.

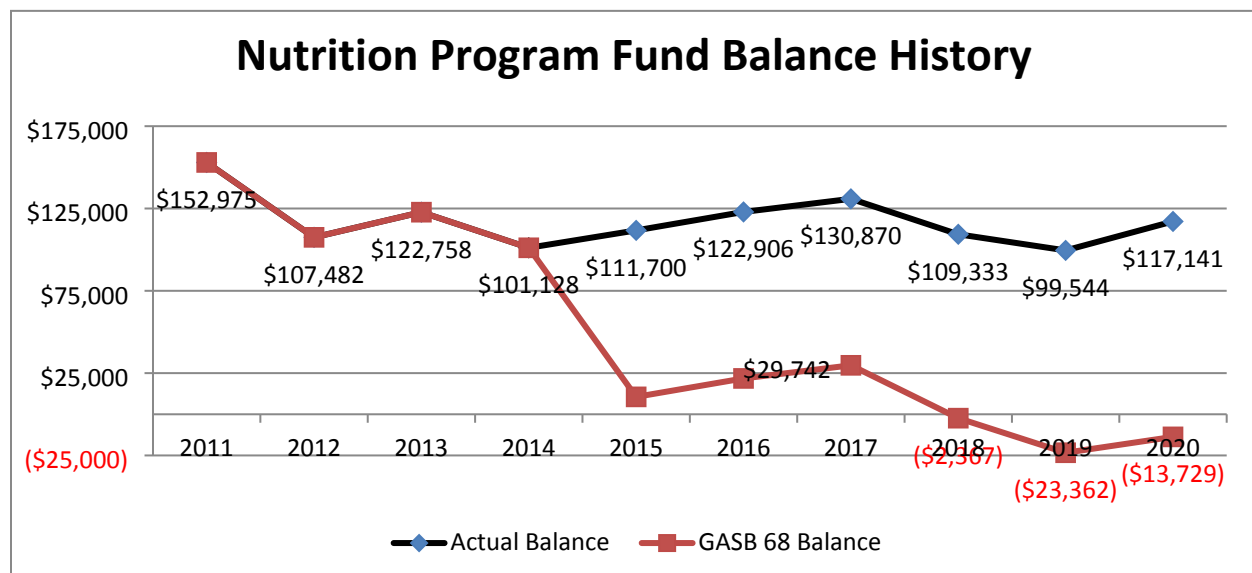
- A school cannot *require* all students to purchase an activity ticket.
- A school cannot use or allow a booster club or parent teacher organizations, etc., to charge a fee that the district is not allowed to charge directly.
- A school cannot charge a student a fee to participate in an extracurricular activity.

Our Nutrition (Food Service) Department historical fund balances appear in the graph below. The red line represents book balances. However, in 2015, governmental accounting practices required schools to begin to represent IPERS retirement obligations on the books in case IPERS goes broke, and local schools are required to make up the difference. Therefore, the black line more closely represents our actual cash balance which is in a healthy position.



Normally, in past years, schools used a business model for food service and raised meal prices according to the financial needs of the program. However, the new federal law, the Healthy Hunger-free Kids Act, requires schools to raise our lunch prices according to state mandates.

Recommended Action:

Currently our fees are near average for schools in our area. I recommend no changes this year. Therefore, I recommend the fee schedule on the next page with the highlighted changes.
