


Bridges Math Curriculum Has Arrived

Spring aReading Results by Grade Level




Literacy Focus and Progress at Menahga Elementary



It was the perfect way to wrap up a year!









High School Fastbridge and STAR Data (Thanks Andria)

7 - 8 Fastbridge Data



The Minnesota Reading to Ensure Academic Development (READ) Act includes new requirements that impact secondary education. Here are the key updates:

Key Updates and Requirements


- Professional Development Deadline Extended
 Phase 2 educators (grades 6-12) now have until July 1, 2027 to complete required professional development. This extension allows more flexibility as schools implement updated ELA standards.
- Evidence-Based Literacy Interventions
 Starting in the 2025–2026 school year, districts must use only evidence-based literacy interventions.

The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) recommends using materials approved under the READ Act. We will work as a Leadership Team to study best practice High School Intervention Processes.

- Paraprofessional Supervision Requirement
 Beginning in 2026–2027, paraprofessionals or unlicensed staff providing Tier 2 literacy interventions must be supervised by a licensed teacher who has completed the approved training.
- Universal Screening
 Districts must use MDE-approved screening tools for literacy:
 - o Grades 4-12: Starting in 2025-2026

Student Survey Summary - 2024-2025 School Year

As part of our end-of-year reflection, 215 students in grades 7–11 completed a survey sharing feedback on their experiences during the 2024–2025 school year. The survey asked students to identify what they enjoyed most, areas for improvement, and staff they could rely on for support.



Key Findings:

What Students Enjoyed Most:

The majority of students (81%) said the best part of the school year was being able to spend time with friends. Other top responses included new class opportunities (10%) and a variety of individual interests (9%).

• Areas for Improvement:

Students offered suggestions, including interest in a four-day school week, more elective options, longer passing times, more hands-on learning, increased after-school activities, and other ideas reflecting their desire for more flexibility and engagement.

• Supportive Staff:


Notably, 98% of students listed at least one teacher or staff member they trust and feel they can go to for help or support.

Senior Survey Summary - 2024-2025 School Year

As part of our year-end review, graduating seniors were asked to complete an exit survey reflecting on their experiences at Menahga High School. The survey gathered feedback on academic preparation, school culture, support from staff, and suggestions for improvement. Responses will help guide future planning, celebrate areas of strength, and identify opportunities to better support students as they prepare for life after high school.


Do you feel like you have one person you would identify as a positive and caring adult at the school?

45 responses




If Yes, who would you identify as that positive and caring adult?

44 responses





Menahga Principal Goals for 2024-2025

- 1. Support Staff
 - a. As school leaders we will provide clear communication on the happenings of our buildings while maintaining open lines of communication to support staff and their work with students.
 - i. Staff Newsletters are coming, monthly
 - ii. Staff meetings are happening, monthly
 - iii. Committee meetings are happening, monthly
 - iv. The Culture and Climate Survey was given to gather feedback on what went well in 2024-2025 and to gather ideas for future growth and development in 2025-2026.
 - v. ALICE

- vi. End of the Year Feedback is being collected as the school year closes in an effort to continue to grow and improve.
- b. Specific, valuable feedback will be provided to staff in an effort to continue ongoing growth for our teachers as instructional leaders.
 - i. "Train the Trainer" session slated for summer. This opportunity allows Menahga to have a staff member in-district that could provide the mandated paraprofessional READ Act training.
 - ii. Bridges math professional development is being worked on for the 25-26 school year.
 - iii. New Science Curriculum professional development is being worked on for the 25–26 school year.
 - iv. The Professional Development committee will meet and pre-plan for the 25-26 school year.
 - v. Summer Professional Development opportunities have been supplied to staff.

2. Facilitate Strong Student Achievement

- a. We will collaborate with all staff to provide purpose and professional development around assessments and using data to drive instruction.
 - i. Local Literacy Leads, Andria Bristow and Lisa Parrish continue to attend Sourcewell monthly for additional planning around Minnesota's Literacy changes.
 - ii. Sourcewell provided training and support with AI and the impact it has on teachers, differentiation and student support.
 - iii. Summer professional development opportunities have been rolled out to staff.
 - iv. Leadership Meetings have been scheduled for June to continue planning for 25-26.
