Child Care and Development Block - Wage Supplement Grant	The Workforce Solutions for North Central Texas Rising Star Wage Supplement Program provides funding to create a temporary wage supplement for childcare workers. Childcare staff continue to place themselves at higher risk of COVID-19 infection while caring for children. This temporary wage supplement acknowledges the hazards they face and the incredible value of their work, as well as employers' difficulties in recruiting and retaining qualified staff.	\$ 76,220
Head Start	Head Start is a federally funded program that delivers comprehensive early learning, health, nutrition, and family support services to children ages three (3) through five (5) experiencing poverty and their families.	\$ 1,716,257
Principal Residency Grant Cycle 7 Continuation	As part of this grant program, LEAs and EPP partners must provide residents with a year-long, full-time residency consisting of the following: (1) Sustained and rigorous clinical learning in an authentic school setting (2) Evidence-based coursework focused on best practices in campus leadership, including a concentrated focus on instructional leadership (3) Ongoing support from an effective mentor principal or school leader that includes short cycle coaching with an existing district protocol (e.g. the observation & feedback protocol by Paul Bambrick-Santoyo) (4) Authentic leadership opportunities (5) An opportunity to practice and be evaluated in a school setting.	\$ 647,000
Adult Education & Literacy (EL Civics and AEFLA)	Adult education and literacy programs funded by the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) provide English language, math, reading, and writing instruction to help students acquire the skills needed to succeed in the workforce, earn a high school equivalency, or enter college or career training.	\$ 1,963,169
Title IV, Part B - Nita M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Centers (Communities in Schools)	The purpose of the 21st CCLC program is to assist students in meeting state and local academic achievement standards in core subjects, such as reading and mathematics, by providing the students with opportunities for academic enrichment activities and appropriate supplemental activities during non-school hours or periods when school is not in session.	\$ 35,655

Title I, Part A	Title I, Part A provides supplemental resources to help schools with high concentrations of students from low-income families acquire the knowledge and skills in the state content standards and to meet the state student performance standards.	\$ 4,400,840
Title I, Part C Migrant	Title I, Part C provides supplemental instructional and support services for migrant students and out of school migrant youth.	\$ 4,808
Title I, Part D, Subpart 2	Title I, Part D, Subpart 2 supports programs to improve the educational services to children residing in facilities for delinquent children to acquire the knowledge and skills in the state content standards and state student performance standards.	\$ 331,366



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Title II, Part A	Title II, Part A is to increase student achievement through improving teacher and principal quality and increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in classrooms and highly qualified principals in schools. Denton ISD will utilize the Title II and Title IV transferability option to support additional Title I, Part A allowable activities that strengthen student achievement in high-need schools.	\$ 850,175
Title III, Part A ELA	Title III, Part A ELA is to develop programs for limited English proficient students to attain English proficiency, develop high levels of academic attainment, and meet the state content standards and student achievement standards.	\$ 715,726
Title III, Part A Immigrant	Title III, Part A Immigrant is to develop programs for immigrant children to attain English proficiency, develop high levels of academic attainment, and meet the state content standards and student achievement standards.	\$ 41,079

IDEA-B Formula	IDEA-B Formula and IDEA-B Formula-ARP provide supplemental resources to help LEAs ensure that eligible students (ages 3-21) with disabilities are provided with a free appropriate public education as required by federal statute.	\$ 6,478,743
IDEA-B Preschool	IDEA-B Preschool and IDEA-B Preschool-ARP provide supplemental resources to help LEAs ensure that eligible students (ages 3-5) with disabilities are provided with a free appropriate public education as required by federal statute.	\$ 74,358
IDEA-B Discretionary Deaf	IDEA-B Discretionary Deaf helps ensure that eligible students with disabilities (ages 3-21) are provided with a free appropriate public education as required by federal statute.	\$ 71,753
High Cost Funds	High Cost Funds (HCF) help offset the financial impact on Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) that provide educational services to high need children with disabilities. High need children with disabilities receive educational services which exceed three times the state's average per pupil expenditure (APPE). Only those costs associated with providing direct special education and related services to the child, and identified in the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP), are considered when determining whether a child qualifies as a high need child.	\$ 462,099
