# Early Childhood Education Scholarships Investing in Early Learning

We know the most important investment our state can make is in the future of our children. That is why Governor Dayton's budget makes a major investment in Early Childhood Education. The Governor's budget provides an additional \$44 million for early learning scholarships that will help 10,000 low- and middle-income kids attend quality child care and preschool whose families otherwise may not have been able to afford it.

#### Program Background

In 2011, Governor Dayton worked with the legislature to establish Early Childhood Education Scholarships for Minnesota children, ages three through five. Two milion dollars was made available for scholarships in 2013 and \$3 million is stated for 2014. To date, 460 children have received scholarships of up to \$4,000. Without an additional investment, just 680 students per year would receive a scholarship to attend preschool in Minnesota.

#### Investing in Our Youngest Learners

Since 2005, state investments in early childhood education have been essentially flat, and in recent years Minnesota has ranked 39<sup>th</sup> in access to preschool for 4-year-olds. But Governor Dayton's historic investment in Early Childhood Education Scholarships will expand the state's commitment to our youngest learners, sending 10,000 more kids to quality child care and preschool and dramatically improving access to quality, affordable early learning programs.

- » Minnesota Kindergartners Are Coming to School Unprepared to Learn, Half of all Kindergartners are entering the X-12 system unprepared to learn. Those who enter Kindergarten prepared to learn are more likely to meel or exceed standards in reading and math by third grade and less likely to require special education or remediation.
- » These Scholarships Will Directly Address Minnesota's Achievement Gap. Minnesota has one of the nation's most glaring achievement gaps, ranking 49<sup>th</sup> among the 50 states. Numerous studies show that the best way to close this gap and adequately prepare all children for success in school and life, is through strategic investments in high quality early learning that prepare children for Kindergarten.
- » Investments in Early Learning Deliver a Concrete Return on Investment. Children's school readiness is a predictor of later outcomes, even lifelong outcomes. In fact, economists at the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis have found that every \$1 invested in high quality early learning yields a \$16 return on our investment. Most of that tost savings is in education, human services, and justice system savings, as well as increased tax revenue.

Early Learning Scholarships Program

#### Early Learning Scholarships Program.

The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) is pleased to announce that the Early Learning Scholarships Program is now available for Minnesota families! The scholarships will increase access to high-quality early childhood programs for three-to-five-year-old children with the highest needs in order to improve school readiness for all young children. Priority for scholarships will be given based on family income, child poverty and geographic region. Up to \$5,000 per scholarship will be awarded. MDE estimates that 4,000 scholarships per year will be awarded to families with young children throughout the state. This represents approximately 9 percent of the eligible children in Minnesota.

Eligible children will be able to access the Early Learning Scholarships in one of two ways:

Early Learning Scholarships Pathway I: These Early Learning Scholarships are awarded directly to families who must eligibility requirements including having a child between the ages of three to four as of September 1 of the current year, and who meet other eligibility requirements as outlined in Minnesota 2013 Session Law Article 8, section 1240,165.

Eligible families will receive an Early Learning Scholarships Pathway I award, and the scholarships funds will be paid to the early childhood program that the family chooses. Scholarships to families may be used in any early childhood program familiating in the Parent Aware Quality Rating and Improvement System. The Parent Aware participating programs a family may choose include Head Start, school district prekindergarten and preschool programs, and child care programs. Pathway I scholarships "follow the child" and are awarded to the family for up to 12 months.

Early Learning Scholarships Pathway II: The Pathway II scholarships are awarded to families through an eligible Forn-Star Parent Aware rated programs. Four-Star Parent Aware rated programs include Head Start, school district prekindergatten and preschool programs, and child care programs within geographic regions identified by MDE. Programs participating as a Pathway II site receive Pathway II solicitately funds for up to 12 months.

Calculated Pathway II scholarship amounts by school district attendance areas is included. Four-Star Parent Aware rated programs (including child care, school district prekindergarton and preschool programs, and Head Start) within a school district attendance.

#### We requested:

- Expand the number of days of service at 2 School Readiness sites from 3-4 days.
- Offer a lower child: staff ratio to help increase children's gains on state benchmarks by adding another part-time peraprofessional at 3 School Readiness classrooms.
- Offer a lower child: staff ratio to help increase children's gains on state benchmarks by adding another part-time paraprofessional at 6 Head Start classrooms.
- Partner with Early Childhood Family Education to offer Parent Engagement opportunities through monthly Parent Education groups at 3 School Readiness sites. Parent Education groups will include a light meal, childcare and assistance with transportation.

In addition, we can carryover the EL Scholarship money we have been using this year into next year and do the same type of support to Round-Up and offer Kindergarten Connection programming in the spring of 2015.
