## Findings of Fact and Conclusions Regarding the Closing of the Morristown Junior High School Building

- The State's funding formula hasn't kept pace with inflation for the past 20 years leaving a funding gap of \$1,356/pupil.
- State funding is linked to enrollment. Our enrollment has declined over the past 10 years resulting in 120 less students today than in 2013.
- Loss of COVID funding provided to districts from 2020-2023.
- 2025 Graduating class size is larger than incoming kindergarten classes. This means we receive less funding from the state as our funding is based on pupil count.
- WEM is operating significantly more space than we need. With the elementary, junior high school, and high school, we have capacity of 1,156 students. Our current enrollment is 777 students. We are spending money heating, cleaning, and operating space that we do not need.
- Despite the investments we made in them, our buildings are old and underutilized.
- By shifting all grade levels to one school, this would allow the District to:
  - Invest more in student learning
  - Increase pathway electives for younger learners
  - Increase academic electives and course offerings
  - Increase Career and Technical Education (CTE) opportunities
  - Save money with less square footage to heat, clean, and operate
  - Reduce duplication of resources
  - Improve staff efficiencies and collaboration
  - Allow greater flexibility to master schedule and improved utilization of staff
  - Eliminate grade level transitions between schools, which are found to be challenging for students
  - Eliminate the need for teachers to travel between buildings, which allows for more time working with students
  - Improve continuity of students support services
  - Increase school/district spirit and culture
