Checking Your Child's Grades Weekly

The Home Access Center has a lot of helpful information for families, but is most often used to check on your child's progress in school. The Home Access Center is linked on the District 33 website, as well as the Leman website.

When you log into the Home Access Center, you will see a row of buttons at the top of the page.

 $To see their {\it {\bf daily progress}}, click on the "Classes" button. You can see how your student is doing on their {\it {\bf daily classwork}}. The assignments under the Classes tab are$ updated frequently. We recommend reviewing your child's grades once a week to see their progress.

If you ever have questions about how your child is doing, please reach out to their teacher via email or Parent Square. We would love to hear from you!

ACCESS Testing will begin on January 23, 2025.

This important assessment provides key information for further class selection and supports needed for students.

ACCESS Testing is almost here!

What is ACCESS?

ACCESS is the English proficiency test. It measures the level of academic English a student knows. The test has four different tests: Listening, Reading, Writing, and Speaking.

ACCESS es la prueba de competencia enl inglés. Mide el nivel de inglés académico que sabe un estudiante. La prueba tiene cuatro pruebas diferentes: comprensión auditiva, lectura, escritura y expresión oral.

¿Quién toma ACCESS? Su hijo/a toma ACCESS porque es increible y sabe dos o más idiomas.

When do they take it? The test is taken in January and February. The scores are sent to the district in the Spring. When does my child stop taking the test? Your child will stop taking the ACCESS test when they reach an overall score of 4.8 or passed the test when they enter school.

If your child still takes the ACCESS test they will be reviewing last year's scores and goal setting for the upcoming test during their Advisory class.



- Talk to your child about the importance of always doing their best
 Make sure your child has the mindset that a test is just showing everything that they know. Anything that they don't know just shows what they need to learn. There is nothing wrong with not knowing it yet.

ACCESS Testing will begin on January 23, 2025.

THEMISHT BEFORE

- Make sure your child gets a good night's
- Be encouraging- Let your child know that you think he/she will do well on the test.
 Plan for the morning ahead. Make sure they have everything ready to go.

Updates From the Social Studies Classes at LMS!

6th Grade Update

6th grade social studies has been having a great year so far! We began our year learning about map skills and how our first civilizations functioned. In class, we have been learning about the geography, religion, achievements, politics, economics, and social structure of each civilization. We were able to attend a field trip to the Museum of Ancient Cultures in Chicago where our students had a blast! This museum was an amazing opportunity for our students to connect what they are learning about civilizations like Mesopotamia and Ancient Egypt to physical artifacts. In each of our units we have been using map skills, guided note-taking, reasoning techniques, and various document analysis

This past month we have been learning about Ancient Egypt. We began our unit learning about the importance of the Nile river and the surrounding geographical features. As a 6th grade social studies class we used the Virtual Reality headsets to take a trip to Egypt to sail the Nile river, visit the pyramids of Giza, and some awe-inspiring temples. Students made their own advertisements about Egyptian inventions and voted for the most impactful pharaoh in Egypt (Hatshepsut won!). We are finishing the unit with a written test where students will answer the question "Where would you rather live?". They will use text

7th Grade Update

During this unit, students will focus on the question "Is the history of Reconstruction a story of continuity or change?"

Students will explore a variety of primary and secondary sources to investigate topics like how different viewpoints of the North and South impact Reconstruction, how the Civil War and Reconstruction affected the lives of future generations of Americans, and what were the successes and failures of Reconstruction.

As a final assessment, students will use their notes and apply their knowledge to answer a variety of questions about Reconstruction.

8th Grade Update

8th grade social studies is continuing our study on World War II. This unit asks students to think about how a war changes a society. We will focus on the impact of the War on Women, Latinos, and African Americans, and all Americans as a

evidence to argue which of the three civilizations is the best to live in. After winter break we will begin unit five: Ancient India.

Some important reminders for the rest of the school year. Homework is given to students each week beginning on Monday that is due on Friday, It is of the utmost timportance that students are utilizing their planners and completing their homework weekly. Please check-in with your child to check the progress on their homework. When homework is not completed, it adds to the next week and students then have more homework to complete Please remind your child to come to class prepared with a pencil, take home folder, and planners. This will ensure they are successful during class. Tests in sixth grade can be document-based assessments, multiple choice tests, or projects. Assessments are worth fifty percent of their overall grade and are important to be completed in a timely manner. If a student needs extra time for missing work please speak to your child on speaking to their teacher to get extra help in class or advisory. We are always willing to help! We hope you had a restful break!



Updates From Explore Classes at LMS!

SEL Class Update:

Students in Career Cruising classes are discovering their personal strengths and preferences via both personality and career surveys. This information will help them choose a career to research in depth. In SEL classes, students are drawing upon their knowledge of Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs to understand why people sometimes choose to engage in behaviors that wind up getting them in trouble. With this understanding, students will soon be applying this to a logical decision-making process, using pro-con charts to map out the consequences of choices.

STEM Class Update:

STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. It is an exciting, hands-on learning experience where students explore engineering concepts while integrating math, science, and technology concepts and skills. Our focus is on the engineering design process, where students identify challenges, define criteria for solutions, and work within specific constraints to develop creative solutions. Last week, students created paper circuits with LED lights. They learned about simple circuits and electricity flow while strengthening their problem-solving skills. This week, they are tackling the "Snowman Stretch" challenge, working in teams to design the tallest snowman using materials like paper, straws, and balloons.

Throughout the trimester, students will engage in a variety of hands-on activities, such as building catapults and constructing a paper roller coaster. These challenges will help reinforce STEM concepts and enhance students' understanding of how engineering, math, and science work together in real-world applications.
