2019-2020 GOALS FOR MT. ECCLES ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Our goals, chosen from the rubric of the STEPP indicators (School Continuous Improvement Components) for the domains of 1) Curriculum, 2) Assessment, 3) Instruction, 4) Supportive Learning Environment, and 5) Professional Development, are as follows:

*2.4 – School staff use multiple data sources, including state assessment data, to evaluate how school programs impact student performance including specific sub groups and specific grade levels.

Progress this month: RtI efforts continue, and we are preparing to add the next component in our plan, which will be provided by TSI grant money – another facet of the NWEA suite of programs called MAP Skills. NWEA describes it this way: "MAP Skills is ideal for students in intervention programs because it pinpoints the missing skills that are holding them back so teachers can individualize instruction. And because it can be administered as often as needed, it helps teachers closely track student progress and see how they're responding to interventions." This program will be in play during the second semester.

*3.2 – School staff implement a coherent, documented plan throughout the school to ensure that all students receive core instruction and all low-performing students receive additional support to help them meet or exceed the state content standards.

Progress this month: During RtI time, students are continuing to work through their skills package on Edgenuity Pathblazer, and teachers are working with small groups on skills needed for the work they are doing in Math in the classrooms.

4.3 – School staff communicate school-wide behavior expectations that are understood and achieved by students, and staff provide positive behavioral supports.

Progress this month: Eighteen students received Compassion Awards at Morning Assembly on Nov 4th. In November, we are going to focus on Gratitude.

4.7 – School staff communicate effectively with parents about learning expectations, student progress, and reinforcing learning at home; staff implement effective strategies to increase parent engagement.

Progress this month: During parent/teacher conferences, teachers were able to speak with parents about the first standards-based math reports which came out at the end of October.

*These goals are the main focus of our School Improvement Plan and Grant.

SITE COUNCIL SUMMARY

The Mt. Eccles Site-Based Council met on Tuesday, October 22nd at 5:00 pm in Mt. Eccles Room 220. The main topic was the School System for Success score for Mt. Eccles from the State of Alaska. The score factors in PEAKS data on achievement and growth, attendance data, literacy for 3rd graders, and ELL literacy. Our score was considerably higher this year than last. Due to our small sample size, hills and valleys would not be unusual from year to year. In 2019, all of our subgroups scored such that our school has moved from School Needing Targeted Assistance status to School Needing Universal Assistance. This meeting also reviewed the standards-based reports that were being sent home that week and the new character awards.

The next Site-Based Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 12th at 5:00 in Mt. Eccles Library. This will be a joint meeting with the CHS Site-Based Council, and we will be discussing place-based learning opportunities with the help of our community partners from Prince William Sound Science Center and Copper River Watershed Project.
