COSSA Academy School Climate & Academics

A strong, positive school culture is key to academic success. When students feel supported, respected, and connected to their peers and teachers, they stay engaged, attend more regularly, and perform better academically.

Research backs this up: schools with positive environments can see a 22% boost in reading and math scores (National School Climate Center). The CDC also reports that students who feel connected to their school are 67% more likely to graduate on time.

Right now, all 17 of our seniors are on track to graduate! We've implemented regular STAR testing to help us better understand and support our students. Now, we're helping our seniors take the next big step by assisting with scholarships, FAFSA enrollment, and college applications. Thanks to some help from Parma school counselor Cory Fortin and reps from CWI, five of our seniors are actively working on college applications.
